Series Notes: Alabama and Arkansas will meet for the 33rd time on Saturday afternoon in Fayetteville. The Crimson Tide leads the all-time series, 25-7, and have won 15 straight over the Razorbacks. That streak includes last season's shootout in Tuscaloosa that finished in favor of the Tide, 42-35, along with the last meeting in Fayetteville, a 52-3 win for Alabama on Dec. 12, 2020. Crimson Tide head coach Nick Saban is 18-2 in his career against Arkansas and a perfect 15-0 while at the Capstone. Arkansas head coach Sam Pittman is in his third season as a head coach and is 0-2 against the Tide.

OCTOBER DOMINANCE UNDER SABAN: Alabama head coach Nick Saban has been dominant in the month of October during his time in Tuscaloosa. Saban has compiled a 52-3 (.946) mark, including a 29-0 record at home and a 23-3 mark on the road. His first October loss at the helm of the Crimson Tide came in 2010 at South Carolina, followed by a loss in 2014 at Ole Miss. His third October loss came at Texas A&M on Oct. 9. For his career, Saban is 81-18 (.818) in October, including a 3-1 mark at Toledo, a 12-8 record at Michigan State and a 12-6 stretch at LSU in addition to his time with the Crimson Tide.

BEATING THE BEST: The Crimson Tide is 72-18 (.800) against the Associated Press Top 25 since the start of 2008. Alabama finished 6-1 against AP Top 25 teams last season, including wins against then-No. 14 Miami (44-13) on Sept. 4; at then-No. 11 Florida (31-29) on Sept. 18; over then-No. 12 Ole Miss (42-21) on Oct. 2; against then-No. 21 Arkansas (42-35) on Nov. 20; over then-No. 1 Georgia (41-24) at the 2021 SEC Championship Game; and a victory against then-No. 4/4/4 Cincinnati (27-6) at the CFP Semifinal at the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic. The Crimson Tide's lone loss against an AP Top 25 team last season came against then-No. 3/3/3 Georgia, 33-18, in the CFP National Championship Game at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis, Ind., on Jan. 10.

SABAN IN SEC ROAD OPENERS: Nick Saban is 14-1 (.933) in SEC road openers since he arrived in 2007, with the lone loss coming at Ole Miss in 2014. Counting his time at LSU, Saban is 16-4 (.800) in the opening road game of SEC play in his previous 20 SEC seasons.

SEC ROAD GAMES FOR SABAN: Head coach Nick Saban owns a 64-17 (.790) mark in SEC road games across his time at LSU and Alabama, including a 52-9 (.853) record with the Crimson Tide. Saban has notched nine perfect SEC road seasons (2003, 2008, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2020).

SABAN vs. AP TOP 25 IN TRUE ROAD GAMES: With Alabama's win over then-No. 11 Florida on Sept. 18 of last season, head coach Nick Saban ranks third in all-time for road wins against teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 25 with 25 victories. Bobby Bowden is the all-time leader (33), followed by Joe Paterno (27).

SABAN vs. AP TOP 25 OPPOSITION: The Crimson Tide's 27-6 win over then-No. 4 Cincinnati on Dec. 31 of last season was Nick Saban's 96th career win, and 73rd at Alabama, against the Associated Press Top 25. Saban moved past Joe Paterno (86) for the most career wins against the AP Top 25 when he defeated then-No. 22 Auburn on Nov. 28, 2020. The late Florida State legend Bobby Bowden ranks third all-time (82), while Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant is fourth (66). Former Duke, Florida and South Carolina coach Steve Spurrier is fifth (64). Saban's winning percentage against AP ranked teams (96-44, .686) tops Bryant (.592), Bowden (.557), Spurrier (.529) and Paterno (.512).

DOMINATING THE AP TOP 25: Alabama's win over then-No. 14 Miami in the 2021 Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game last season was head coach Nick Saban's 22nd career win by 25-plus points against a ranked opponent. Saban is the all-time leader for the most wins by 25-plus points in the Associated Press Poll era (since 1936), passing Bobby Bowden's previous record of 20. Saban is also the NCAA record holder with 24 career wins of 20-plus points against AP top-15 opponents, including Alabama's 27-6 win against No. 4 Cincinnati in the College Football Playoff Semifinal at the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic on Dec. 31. An astounding 21 of Saban's 24 career 20-plus point wins against AP top-15 opponents have come while at Alabama.

50-PLUS vs. RANKED OPPONENTS: Under head coach Nick Saban, Alabama has posted 50-plus points against Associated Press Top 25 teams on seven occasions, while three of those seven occasions came in 2020. The most recent instance came on Jan. 11, 2021 at the College Football Playoff National Championship Game when the Crimson Tide defeated then-No. 3/3 Ohio State, 52-24. Below is a look at Saban's 50-plus point games vs. ranked teams.

ALABAMA IN THE AP POLL: Alabama's No. 2 ranking in the Sept. 25 release of the Associated Press Poll marked the 234th consecutive week that the Crimson Tide has appeared in the poll. That streak is the longest active streak in college football. The 234 weeks more than triples second-place Georgia with the Bulldogs appearing in the poll for 87 consecutive weeks. Alabama's 234 straight weeks tops the Crimson Tide's previous program-long streak of 71 consecutive weeks under head coach Gene Stallings in the mid-1990s.

ALABAMA IN THE AP SINCE 2008: Alabama began the 2008 season at No. 24 in the Associated Press Preseason Poll. The Crimson Tide opened the year with a dominant 34-10 win over then-No. 9 Clemson in Atlanta, and since that win over the Tigers, UA has not been ranked lower than No. 17 in 232 polls that have followed. According to College Poll Archive, the Tide has now spent 96.6 percent of the 14-plus years ranked in the top 10. A whopping 88.0 percent of that time Alabama has been ranked in the top five. The Crimson Tide has also been ranked No. 1 a total of 108 times since 2008. Only 13 other teams have earned the No. 1 ranking over that time, with the second-most appearances coming from Clemson at 23.

ALWAYS IN THE HUNT: Since the 2008 season, Alabama has played in 167 of 170 regular season games that have had national championship implications. The final three games of the 2010 season marked the only three regular season contests without direct national championship implications over the last 14 seasons.

ALABAMA HAS THE MOST WINS SINCE 2008: Dating back to the start of the 2008 season, Alabama has won 180 games, which is the most in the Football Bowl Subdivision. That total is 20 more than second-place Ohio State, who has totaled 160 wins over that stretch.

SCORING IN ALL KINDS OF WAYS vs. ULM: Alabama scored three non-offensive touchdowns as part of the Tide's 63-7 win over ULM on Sept. 17. The Crimson Tide recorded a pick-six by Will Anderson Jr., a blocked punt for a score from Malachi Moore, and a punt return touchdown by Brian Branch against the Warhawks. The three non-offensive touchdowns were the most by a Tide team since Sept. 17, 2016 at Ole Miss. That game in Oxford saw Eddie Jackson return a punt for six, Da'Ron Payne score on a fumble and Jonathan Allen follow suit with a 75-yard fumble recovery for a touchdown.

NON-OFFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS IN THE SABAN ERA: Alabama recorded its 87th, 88th and 89th non-offensive touchdowns in the Nick Saban era against ULM on Sept. 17. The Tide first had a pick-six from Will Anderson Jr. followed by a blocked punt return by Malachi Moore. Brian Branch added a third on the day when he returned a punt for a score. Since Saban's arrival in 2007, no team in college football has totaled more non-offensive scores than the Crimson Tide. During Saban's tenure, Alabama recorded a single-season record 15 in 2016, which led the Football Bowl Subdivision and was the most in a season by any FBS team in the last 20 years. The Crimson Tide also scored a non-offensive touchdown in 10 consecutive games dating from to the CFP Semifinal against Michigan State on Dec. 31, 2015 to the Texas A&M game on Oct. 22, 2016 for 14 non-offensive touchdowns in that span – four interceptions, four punt returns, five fumble recoveries and a kickoff return.

ALABAMA IN THE AP RANKINGS

Alabama has been ranked in 845 of the 1,206 Associated Press college football polls since 1936, according to the AP Poll Archive. The Crimson Tide owns a 522-134-8 (.792) all-time record in games when ranked in the Associated Press college football poll, including a 163-22 (.881) mark under head coach Nick Saban. Alabama is also ranked in the AP poll for the 234th consecutive week, topping its previous streak set in the mid-1990s when UA was ranked for 71 straight weeks under head coach Gene Stallings. The 234 consecutive weeks is the second-longest stretch by any program in the poll's history, trailing only Nebraska's all-time mark of 348 consecutive weeks. Alabama has started nine seasons at No. 1 (2022, 2021, 2018, 2017, 2016, 2013, 2010, 1978, 1966).

ALABAMA IN THE COACHES POLL

The Crimson Tide has enjoyed much success in the coaches' rankings over the past half century. The United Press International debuted the coaches poll in 1950 and ran the poll through the 1990 season. USA TODAY has administered the poll for the past 31 seasons (1991-2021) with the AFCA coming on the title sponsor of the poll at the start of the 2021 season. Alabama was ranked No. 1 in the 2010 preseason coaches poll after starting out the 2009 preseason poll at No. 5. Alabama remained in the top five the entire season, reaching No. 1 after defeating Florida in the SEC Championship and holding the position to claim the national championship after defeating Texas in Pasadena. The Tide then claimed the No. 1 spot to close out the 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020 seasons. The Tide has compiled four UPI (1961, 1964, 1973 and 1979) and seven USA TODAY (1992, 2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020) coaches poll national titles.

BRYCE MOVING THE CHAINS AS A RUSHER: Bryce Young has been credited with 16 rushes on the season for 150 net yards. Included in those 16 'rushes' are the four times the junior quarterback has been sacked. On Young's 12 carries where he has tucked the ball and run, he has accounted for six first downs and two touchdowns. He has accumulated 181 combined rushing yards on those 12 carries for an impressive 15.1 yards per carry average.

SIX IN THE OPENER: Alabama quarterback Bryce Young accounted for six total touchdowns in the Crimson Tide's home opener against Utah State on Sept. 3. The junior threw for a career-high tying five touchdowns while also rushing for a score. Young's six touchdowns were the most by a UA signal-caller since Tua Tagovailoa's school-record seven scores against Ole Miss on Sept. 28, 2019. In that game, Tagovailoa finished with six passing touchdowns while also rushing for one against the Rebels.

YOUNG USING HIS LEGS vs. UTAH STATE, TOO: Bryce Young not only threw for five touchdowns against Utah State on Sept. 3, but he also rushed for one score. The touchdown on the ground was part of Young's five carries for a team-high 100 rushing yards. He became the first Alabama quarterback to eclipse the 100-yard rushing mark since Jalen Hurts against Ole Miss on Sept. 30, 2017. Hurts carried the ball 10 times for 101 yards and a touchdown in that matchup.

BRYCE AGAINST THE BEST: Quarterback Bryce Young elevated his game each time a ranked team appeared on the Crimson Tide's schedule a season ago. In six games against teams ranked in the final iteration of the College Football Playoff Top 25, Young posted an NCAA passer rating of 157.56 with an NFL rating of 107.36. He threw for 2,140 yards in those six games, which averaged out to 356.7 yards per game, with 17 touchdowns and just five interceptions. Young averaged 8.8 yards per attempt in those six games while completing 64.6 percent of his passes (157-243).

BRYCE AGAINST THE BEST DEFENSES: In 2021, Bryce Young's passing numbers came against some of the best pass defenses in the nation. In seven games against the nation's top 50 pass defenses (then-No. 1 Georgia, then-No. 2 Georgia, then-No. 4 Cincinnati, then-No. 9 Texas A&M, then-No. 39 Florida, then-No. 40 Ole Miss, then-No. 50 Tennessee), Young accounted for 2,192 yards (313.1 ypg), 17 touchdowns, just five interceptions and a completion percentage of 63.7.

SPREADING THE WEALTH: Alabama quarterbacks have completed 97 passes for 1,130 yards through four games this season. Those catches and yards have been spread across 17 different pass-catchers, including a group of six players with 10-plus catches and over 100 yards apiece. Of that group of six, five are averaging 10.0-plus yards per catch. The Crimson Tide is led in catches by running back Jahmyr Gibbs with 17 while wide receiver Traeshon Holden paces UA in yards (214), yards per catch (14.3) and receiving touchdowns (4).

DO IT ALL, JAHMYR GIBBS: Although Jahmyr Gibbs is listed as a running back, the junior transfer has proven valuable to the Alabama offense as a pass-catcher as well. He currently leads the Tide in receptions with 17 through his first four games while adding 25 rushes for 172 yards, both totals that rank second on UA. Gibbs has led the Tide in rushing attempts in two of the first four games while pacing the wideouts in catches in two contests.

LEADING THE WIDEOUTS IN AUSTIN: Jahmyr Gibbs recorded nine receptions for 74 yards at Texas on Sept. 10 to lead UA in both categories. His nine catches are the most by an Alabama tailback during the Saban era, topping the previous high of seven by Najee Harris against Ohio State in the 2021 College Football Playoff National Championship. They are also the most receptions by any pass-catcher in a game since John Metchie III had 13 at Auburn on Nov. 27 of last season, a game that went into four overtime periods. A week prior to that, Metchie III totaled 10 receptions against Arkansas in a four-quarter game with the Hogs.

GIBBS STARTED HOT: Running back Jahmyr Gibbs made an instant impact for Alabama in his first career start on Sept. 3 against Utah State. The junior finished with nine rushes for 93 yards for an average of 10.3 yards per carry while adding one reception for five yards. Gibbs' 10.3 yards per carry average is the highest by a Tide back in his debut since Siran Stacy averaged 12.1 ypc in his UA debut on Sept. 16, 1989. Stacy carried 14 times for 169 yards and four touchdowns against Memphis as a junior.

THE TRANSITION TO TIGHT END: Cameron Latu transitioned from defensive end to tight end after his redshirt season at the Capstone and worked his way into the Crimson Tide's starting tight end spot in 2021. In 15 games, including 14 starts last season, Latu had 26 receptions for 410 yards, an average of 15.8 yards per catch, and tied for second on UA with eight receiving touchdowns. His patience in transition paid off in the final game of the season against then-No. 3/3/3 Georgia in the CFP National Championship Game on Jan. 10. The Salt Lake City, Utah, native, set the record for the most receiving touchdowns by a tight end in a single season in school history (8), after he hauled in a three-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Bryce Young in the fourth quarter. He trumped tight end Irv Smith Jr.'s seven touchdown receptions in 2018.

GOING FAST: Alabama's offense has been at its best when playing in high gear so far this season. The Crimson Tide's first-team offense has led 18 touchdown drives through four games this season. In those 18 drives, UA is taking just 1:57 off the clock while averaging only 5.4 plays and covering 64.6 yards per drive.

OL MAKING AN IMPACT: The NCAA rankings for sacks allowed doesn't quite tell the story of the Crimson Tide's 2022 offensive line. Alabama is credited with four sacks allowed this season (1.0 per game) to rank 21st nationally and fourth in the SEC. A closer look at the raw numbers show that the Tide offensive line has allowed just two sacks in four games (one by Latham at Texas, one by Steen vs. ULM) with the other two surrendered by a tight end and running back. If you look at sacks allowed per pass attempt, the numbers look even better, as the Tide's offensive line surrenders one sack every 73 pass attempts.

YARDS PER RUSH: Alabama leads the nation in average yards per rush at 7.29. That number is half of a yard better than the Tide's closest competitor which is Kansas at 6.69 ypr. The Crimson Tide rank 10th nationally and third in the SEC in rushing yards per game with 235.0 per contest while rushing for eight touchdowns. Jase McClellan leads the team with 245 rushing yards and is averaging 8.4 yards per carry, while Jahmyr Gibbs is averaging 6.9 yards per tote, Jamarion Miller checks in at 7.3 ypc, Roydell Williams at 6.1 ypc and quarterback Bryce Young at 9.4 yards per rush. The next best yard per rush average for a team in the SEC is Ole Miss at 5.79 yards per rush.

600+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama has eclipsed the 600-yard marker 14 times in program history, including seven times dating back to the start of the 2020 season. The Tide most recently went for 600-plus on Sept. 24 when UA posted 628 yards against Vanderbilt in the SEC opener. Alabama went over 600 yards twice in 2021, rolling up 671 yards against then-No. 25/21/22 Arkansas on Nov. 20, a performance that followed a 606-yard effort against Southern Miss on Sept. 25. The Tide eclipsed 600 yards on four occasions during the 2020 campaign, including a season-high 723 at Ole Miss on Oct. 10 of that season.

500+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama has recorded 500-plus yards of total offense 51 times in the last 104 games (dating to the start of the 2015 season), including all but the matchup at Texas in 2022. The Crimson Tide went for 559 against Utah State, 509 against ULM and most recently 628 in the Vanderbilt contest last weekend. Alabama's offense recorded 500-plus yards seven times in 2021, eight times in 2020 and nine times in 2019, with the 2018 roster setting the Alabama single-season record with 500-or-more yards in 12 of the 15 total games.

400+ YARDS OF TOTAL OFFENSE: Alabama has gained 400-plus yards of total offense in 54 of its last 60 games, a stretch that began on Sept. 1, 2018 in the season opener against Louisville. The only six instances in which the Crimson Tide did not eclipse the 400-plus yards of total offense mark during that span was against Tennessee on Oct. 19, 2019 (373), at then-No. 11/9 Florida on Sept. 18, 2021 (331), against LSU on Nov. 6, 2021 (308), at Auburn on Nov. 27, 2021 (388), against then-No. 3/3/3 Georgia in the CFP National Championship Game on Jan. 10, 2022 (399) and at Texas on Sept. 10 of this season (374). Alabama is 5-1 in those six games.

30-OR-MORE IN 52 OF THE LAST 60: Alabama's offense has scored 30-or-more points in 52 of the last 60 games (dating back to the start of the 2018 season). Included in that stretch is a streak of 34 consecutive games with 30-plus points that set the FBS record. The Crimson Tide's streak started with a 42-3 win over Duke on Aug. 31, 2019 and ended with a 20-14 win over LSU on Nov. 6, 2021. UCF previously held the record of scoring 30-or-more points in 31 straight games from 2017-19.

40-OR-MORE SINCE 2018: Alabama has scored 40-or-more points in 43 of the last 60 games. Forty-three leads the nation for scoring 40-or-more points since the start of the 2018 season. Ohio State has the second-most instances of scoring 40-or-more points in that time frame (35-of-54), while Oklahoma follows in third (32-of-56).

OPENING DRIVE TOUCHDOWNS: The Crimson Tide has won 49 of its last 50 games when scoring a touchdown on the first offensive possession of the game. The most recent instance came against ULM on Sept. 17 when Bryce Young found Traeshon Holden for a 33-yard touchdown. The Tide's lone loss when scoring a touchdown on the opening drive during that stretch came at Texas A&M on Oct. 9.

SCORING STREAK CONTINUES: Alabama extended its school record for consecutive games with a score to 287 thanks to Ja'Corey Brooks' 21-yard touchdown reception on the first quarter of last Saturday's SEC opener against Vanderbilt. The Tide was last held off the scoreboard in a 9-0 loss to Auburn on Nov. 18, 2000. Alabama owns a 230-57 (.801) record over the course of the current streak.

BALL PROTECTION: In the last 198 games (dating back to the start of the 2008 season), Alabama has turned the ball over only 210 times (113 fumbles, 97 interceptions) for 1.06 turnovers per game. Since 2009, the Tide has turned the ball over only 192 times in 185 games (1.04/game). The 192 turnovers since 2009 includes 78 interceptions in 4,954 attempts (1 INT every 63.5 attempts) by UA starting quarterbacks and 31 lost fumbles in 4,928 carries (one fumble lost every 159.0 carries) by the Tide's top two running backs.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

THE TERMINATOR: Will Anderson Jr. led the nation in 2021 with 17.5 sacks and 34.5 tackles for loss (an NCAA record since 2000). Those impressive numbers placed Anderson Jr. second on Alabama's single-season tackles for loss list behind only Derrick Thomas (1988 - 39.0) while he was third on UA's single-season sacks list, trailing Thomas once again (1988 - 27.0 and 1987 - 18.0). Those numbers, paired with his 10.5 tackles for loss and 7.0 sacks from 2020, moved him into the top five of both career lists for the Crimson Tide. Below is a look at where reigning Nagurski Trophy winner ranks heading to this weekend.

HISTORIC PACE FOR ANDERSON JR.: Will Anderson Jr. has put himself on a historic pace for sacks and tackles for loss compared to past Alabama greats. Derrick Thomas' career sack numbers have always seemed unreachable in today's game of football, but Anderson Jr. is doing his best to keep pace. In 32 career games, Anderson Jr. has 29.0 sacks, which averages out to .91 sacks per game. Thomas finished his Alabama career with 52 sacks in 49 career games, a ratio of 1.06 sacks per game. For comparison, Jonathan Allen and Kindal Moorehead rank second and third in career sacks, respectively. Their sacks-per-game ratio were .50 for Allen and .52 for Moorehead. Anderson Jr. is actually averaging more tackles per loss per game (1.64 or 52.5 in 32 games) than Thomas did (1.39 or 68 in 49 games).

KEEPING THE OPPOSITION IN THE BACKFIELD: Linebacker Will Anderson Jr. has made it his mission to keep opposing offenses in the backfield, whether it be by way of the sack or a tackle for loss. For his career, Anderson Jr. has accumulated 29.0 sacks and 52.5 tackles for loss. He has recorded at least one tackle for loss in 23 of his 32 career games while notching a sack in 18 matchups. Of the 23 games with a TFL, he has posted multiple tackles for loss 19 times and had recorded multiple sacks in nine contests.

DOMINANT DEFENSE: The Alabama defense has allowed only two touchdowns on 52 opponent drives this season (does not include drives where knees are taken) and a total of just 29 combined points on those drives. The Crimson Tide is allowing 0.56 points per drive this season and 3.33 yards per play to lead the nation. Alabama currently ranks second nationally in total defense (201.2 ypg) and third-down conversion defense (18.6 percent), third in scoring defense (7.2 ppg), fourth in rushing defense (62.5 ypg), sixth in passing yards allowed (138.8 ypg) and seventh in pass efficiency defense (94.92).

KEEPING THE GROUND GAME IN-CHECK: The Crimson Tide defense limited Vanderbilt to only 14 yards rushing in last Saturday's SEC opener and has kept all four opponents in 2022 at 79 yards rushing or below. The Alabama defensive unit has limited 14 of its last 19 opponents (dating back to the 2021 season) to less than 100 yards rushing. The impressive stretch comes after the 2020 campaign that saw seven opponents go over 100-plus and the 2019 season where 11 opponents eclipsed the 100-yard marker. Both the 2020 and 2019 schedules were 13 games long.

NO-FLY ZONE: Alabama opponents are averaging 138.8 passing yards per game and have not recorded a passing touchdown entering the Arkansas game. The Tide defense has limited two of its four opponents this season to less than 100 yards passing, including 91 by ULM on Sept. 17 and 57 for Utah State in the season opener on Sept. 3. The 57 yards by the Aggies were the fewest passing yards in a game by a Tide opponent since Nov. 16, 2019, when Mississippi State threw for only 82 yards. The 57 yards allowed to USU were the fewest in a game since Nov. 17, 2018, when the Citadel did not record a single passing yard. The Bulldogs attempted two passes in that matchup.

3-AND-OUT: The Alabama defense has forced a 3-and-out on 23-of-49 drives this season (does not include drives at the end of either half of less than three plays). That includes eight 3-and-outs against ULM and seven in the Utah State matchup. The Tide had just three 3-and-outs at Texas but added two more drives that lasted three-plus plays and finished with less than 10 yards.

THIRD DOWN DEFENSE: The Crimson Tide lead the SEC and rank second nationally in third-down conversion defense at 18.6 percent (11-of-59). Alabama allowed only three third down conversions in the season opener (17 tries), surrendered three conversions on 12 attempts at Texas, allowed ULM to convert four third-down attempts on 17 total tries, and most recently allowed just one third-down conversion to Vanderbilt in 13 opportunities.

TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS, TURNOVERS: Alabama has forced at least one turnover in 93 of the last 104 contests (dating back to the start of the 2015 season). During the current run, Alabama has forced 164 turnovers (107 interceptions, 57 fumbles) and returned 39 of those miscues for touchdowns.

HOLDING OPPONENTS UNDER 200: Alabama's defense limited Vanderbilt to 129 yards of total offense on Sept. 24. That impressive effort marked the 58th time in the last 198 games (since the start of the 2008 season) that the Crimson Tide defense has held the opposition to fewer than 200 yards of total offense. Alabama has limited three of its four opponents to below 200 so far this season, including the season-low of 129 by the Commodores.

SHUTOUTS SINCE 2007: Since head coach Nick Saban arrived in 2007, Alabama has recorded 25 shutouts, including 12 in Southeastern Conference play. With its 55-0 win over Utah State on Sept. 3, the Crimson Tide defense has 11 more shutouts than its nearest competitor over that span. Ranking second in shutouts during that time is Ohio State with 14.

HARD TO FIND THE END ZONE AGAINST THE TIDE: Since the start of the 2009 season, no team has allowed fewer touchdowns than the Crimson Tide. Alabama has surrendered only 311 touchdowns over the last 185 games. That is 60 fewer than the second most in the nation (Wisconsin with 371).

TOUGH SLEDDING ON THE GROUND: Alabama's defense has been a force in the run game since head coach Nick Saban's arrival on campus. More recently, the Crimson Tide gave up just 67 rushing scores in the last 104 games (dating to the start of the 2015 season). The Tide defense led the nation in 2016 with five rushing touchdowns allowed, one year after giving up just seven rushing scores through 15 games in 2015, the second-lowest total in the country. Since Saban arrived in 2007, UA has allowed the fewest rushing touchdowns in the nation at 125, a total that is 43 fewer than second-place Iowa.

RUSHING DEFENSE: UA has surrendered only 29 individual 100-yard rushing performances dating back to the 2005 season, a mark that is the fewest in the nation. Since head coach Nick Saban's arrival in 2007, the Tide has allowed 24 players to rush for more than 100 yards in a game.

10 POINTS OR LESS: Alabama's trademark has been its defense ever since head coach Nick Saban's arrival on campus. Since that first season in Tuscaloosa, Saban-coached defenses have held the Crimson Tide's opponents to 10 points or less on 100 occasions. Dating back to the start of the 2015 season, UA's defense has limited the opposition to 10 or fewer points 44 times across 104 total contests.

HELD UNDER 10 FIRST DOWNS: Alabama's defensive unit has allowed fewer than 10 first downs in two of the four games so far this season. In the Vanderbilt matchup on Sept. 24, the Commodores recorded just nine first downs on the night. Three weeks prior, the Tide allowed Utah State to record only seven first downs in the season opener on Sept. 3. The seven first downs allowed were the fewest by a Crimson Tide defense since Nov. 10, 2018, when Mississippi State had just six.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

REICHARD FOR THE WIN: Will Reichard went right down the middle from 33 yards out for the game-winning field goal at Texas on Sept. 10. That game-winner in the final 30 seconds of a game was the first during the Nick Saban era and first such win since the 2005 season. Jamie Christensen hit a 45-yard field goal as time expired to help Alabama take down Texas Tech, 13-10, in the Cotton Bowl on Jan. 2, 2006.

50-PLUS FOR REICHARD: The first points of the day at Texas on Sept. 10 came by way of a 52-yard field goal by Will Reichard. The 52-yarder tied Reichard's career long, matching his kick against Georgia on Oct. 17, 2020. For his career, Reichard has hit three times from 50-plus, also adding a 51-yarder against Miami in in the 2021 Chick-fil-A Kickoff Classic on Sept. 4 of last season.

PATs FOR REICHARD: Senior Will Reichard owns the Crimson Tide's all-time record for made PATs. The senior recorded nine PATs against ULM on Sept. 17 to move past the former record of 186 (188 attempts) by Adam Griffith from 2013-16. Entering this weekend's contest at Arkansas, Reichard has made 201-of-203 PATs for his career.

REICHARD MOVING UP THE CAREER LISTS: Placekicker Will Reichard has been a consistent presence in the kicking game for Alabama during his time at the Capstone. Reichard has made 46 field goals for his career and has totaled 339 kicking points. Both numbers have placed Reichard on the top-10 lists for Crimson Tide kickers. Below is a look at where Reichard currently ranks.

McKINSTRY THE RETURNER: Kool-Aid McKinstry took on the Crimson Tide's punt returner responsibilities this season and has excelled so far. The sophomore has totaled an NCAA-high 244 yards on 14 punts to average 17.4 yards per return. His 17.4 average is ninth in Division I and second in the SEC. The 17.4 mark is also tops among all returners with 10-or-more punt returns this season.

RACKING UP RETURN YARDS: Alabama's punt return game has been an effective weapon for the Crimson Tide this season. The unit has amassed 346 punt return yards to lead the nation and is averaging 20.4 yards per return to rank atop the SEC and fourth in Division I.

BIG DAY FOR RETURNERS vs. ULM: The Crimson Tide's punt returners accumulated 262 yards against ULM on Sept. 17. The 262 yards broke a 75-year-old school record of 204 which was set on Nov. 22, 1947. It was 64 more punt return yards than the Tide totaled in 15 games during the 2021 season. Last year, JoJo Earle (88 yards) and Slade Bolden (87 yards) led the Tide in punt return yards. Against ULM, Kool-Aid McKinstry recorded 136 punt return yards while Brian Branch added 68 yards and a touchdown.

KOOL-AID AND THE WARHAWKS: Sophomore Kool-Aid McKinstry has taken on the Tide's punt returner role so far in 2022. He excelled in that role against ULM on Sept. 17, recording 136 yards on five punts for an average of 27.2 yards per return. The 136 yards are the third-most in a game in program history, trailing only Javier Arenas who set the school record with 153 against Tulane (Sept. 6, 2008) and owns the No. 2 spot with 147 in a matchup with Mississippi State (Nov. 15, 2008).

BRANCH FOR SIX: Brian Branch made it count when he recorded his first career punt return against ULM on Sept. 17, taking the ball 68 yards for a touchdown. It was the first punt return for a score by a Crimson Tide player since DeVonta Smith at Arkansas on Dec. 12, 2020.

ARKANSAS SERIES IN THE SABAN ERA: The Crimson Tide is undefeated against the Razorbacks since head coach Nick Saban arrived in Tuscaloosa with a 15-0 record during his tenure. In the 15 matchups under Saban, Alabama has outscored Arkansas by a 626-235 margin. On the defensive side of the ball, the Tide has limited the Hogs to less than 10 points in six of the 15 games, including back-to-back shutouts in 2012 and 2013. More recently, Alabama has outscored the Hogs, 294-115, over the last six matchups and totaled 41-or-more points in each of those games.

SABAN vs. ARKANSAS: Alabama head coach Nick Saban is 18-2 (17-2 after vacated win) against Arkansas, with his only two losses coming in his first three years at LSU (2000 and 2002). Saban's losses to Arkansas came in War Memorial Stadium in Little Rock, Ark. Saban is undefeated against the Razorbacks in Baton Rouge, Fayetteville and Tuscaloosa.

GENERAL NOTES

ALABAMA DEGREES: Alabama's success on the field over the past 15 seasons under Nick Saban has coincided with the Tide's success in the classroom. The 2022 squad is no exception as the Crimson Tide entered the season with 14 student-athletes who already had their degrees in hand and are wearing an SEC Graduate patch on their jersey. The list of graduates includes Bret Bolin, Darrian Dalcourt, DJ Dale, Justin Eboigbe, Emil Ekiyor Jr., Tyler Harrell, Amari Kight, Cameron Latu, Seth McLaughlin, Jaylen Moody, Kendall Randolph, Will Reichard, Jackson Roby and Tyler Steen. Since Saban's arrival in 2007, Alabama football has seen a total of 627 degrees earned, including 99 master's.

CHAMPIONS IN THE CLASSROOM: Alabama's achievements in the classroom have been most impressive during national title seasons. Those six squads (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2017 and 2020) included 139 student-athletes who had earned their degrees prior to game time. Last season, a total of 18 graduates suited up for UA in the College Football Playoff Semifinal against Cincinnati while the 2020 squad featured an NCAA-leading 25 graduates on its roster entering bowl season.

DALCOURT NAMED CAMPBELL SEMIFINALIST: Alabama offensive lineman Darrian Dalcourt was named a semifinalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy on Sept. 28. He is one of 156 on the list for college football's premiere scholar-athlete award.

NEW HIRES: Saban's 2022 coaching staff features four new faces including Joe Cox (tight ends), Coleman Hutzler (special teams/outside linebackers), Travaris Robinson (cornerbacks) and Eric Wolford (offensive line).

ALABAMA'S TV RECORD: Alabama's matchup with Arkansas on CBS will be the Tide's 464th televised game. Alabama has compiled a 321-138-4 (.698) all-time record in televised games (not including pay-per-view, tape-delayed or closed-circuit telecasts).

183 NATIONAL TV APPEARANCES IN 197 GAMES: Alabama's contest at Arkansas will be the Tide's 183rd nationally televised game since the start of the 2008 season, including every contest since the start of 2014.

165-9 UNDER SABAN WHEN LEADING AT THE HALF: Under head coach Nick Saban, Alabama is 165-9 (.948) when leading at the half. UA is also 149-4 (.974) when leading by seven or more points at the break during the Saban era. The Crimson Tide has held the lead at the half in 83 of its last 104 games (dating back to the start of the 2015 season).

SABAN MOVING UP SEC WINS LIST: Alabama head coach Nick Saban's 143 conference wins (including SEC championship games) are second on the SEC career conference wins list. Saban ranks first in league history in SEC regular season winning percentage at .831 (143-29). He is also second in SEC history in winning percentage in all games at .849 (231-41). Additionally, Saban is second on the league's career wins list at 231 victories.

MOST WINS BY ACTIVE HEAD COACH: Alabama head coach Nick Saban's 273 career wins are the most career victories by an active FBS head coach. Saban ranks just ahead of North Carolina's Mack Brown, who has 267, with LSU's Brian Kelly close behind in third, collecting 266 career wins across his stops.

SABAN AT No. 1: Alabama head coach Nick Saban has coached the most games as the Associated Press Poll's No. 1 team among active head coaches. Following the Sept. 10 victory in Austin over Texas, Saban has coached 97 games as the nation's top-ranked team, which is 76 more games than second-place Dabo Swinney, who has totaled 21 games at No. 1. The third coach on the list is Texas A&M's Jimbo Fisher who coached 10, all coming during the 2013-14 seasons at Florida State.

MORE THAN A DECADE AT No. 1: With Alabama's Aug. 15 preseason ranking at No. 1, the Crimson Tide has been ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll at least once each season since 2008. The 15-year streak is the longest by any program and coach in the history of the AP rankings. The previous long streak by any one team was seven seasons by Miami (Fla.) from 1986-92. The previous streak by one coach is six straight seasons, which was accomplished by Frank Leahy at Notre Dame in 1943 and continued from 1946-50 following an absence while Leahy served in the Navy.

SABAN LEADS IN WINS vs. TOP-FIVE TEAMS: Alabama's 27-6 win over No. 4 Cincinnati in the 2021 College Football Playoff Semifinal at the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic on Dec. 31 was Nick Saban's 29th career victory against a team ranked in the top five of the Associated Press Top 25 Poll, the most in college football history. Saban's 29-15 career record in top-five contests gives him a .659 winning percentage, which is also college football's best. Following Saban on the all-time victory list are Bobby Bowden (18/.378 winning percentage), Barry Switzer (15/.516), Woody Hayes (15/.516), Steve Spurrier (15/.429) and Lou Holtz (15/.419). Saban's record includes nine wins in the College Football Playoff: No. 3 Michigan State (38-0) and No. 1 Clemson (45-40) in 2015; No. 4 Washington (24-7) in 2016; No. 1 Clemson (24-6) and No. 3 Georgia (26-23) in 2017; No. 4 Oklahoma (45-34) in 2018; No. 4 Notre Dame (31-14) and No. 3 Ohio State (52-24) in 2020; and No. 4 Cincinnati (27-6) in 2021. Alabama also went 3-0 in BCS National Championship Games (vs. Texas, 37-21, 2009; vs. LSU, 21-0, 2011; vs. Notre Dame, 42-14, 2012).

AGAINST THE TOP 10: Alabama owns an 84-78-1 all-time record against teams ranked in the top-10 of the Associated Press poll. Since the start of the 2008 season, the Crimson Tide has posted a 35-12 (.745) overall record against top-10 teams, including a 20-6 (.769) mark versus the top 10 since the inception of the College Football Playoff. In Saban's six national championship seasons at Alabama, his teams have gone 18-2 (.900) against top-10 opponents.

SABAN vs. NON-CONFERENCE FOES: Alabama head coach Nick Saban has only two losses to non-conference opponents during the regular season, both of which came in 2007 (21-14 vs. Florida State [in Jacksonville] and 21-14 vs. ULM). Under his direction, the Crimson Tide currently holds a 54-game winning streak against non-conference foes in the regular season, including a 40-game home winning streak at Bryant-Denny Stadium as part of a 42-1 mark at home. Saban owns a 100-20 (.833) career record against non-conference opponents in the regular season and postseason across his four stops as a collegiate head coach. His record against non-conference opponents in both the regular season and postseason at the Capstone is 69-7 (.908).

TOUGH TO GET SABAN'S TIDE TWICE: During his tenure at Alabama, head coach Nick Saban has suffered 25 total losses. Of those 25 losses, the Crimson Tide and Saban have had the opportunity to face the team that beat them at a later date on 21 occasions. In those 21 rematches, Alabama owns a 19-2 mark when avenging its previous loss. The only two times the Crimson Tide has fallen in back-to-back games against the same opponent is LSU (2010-11) and Ole Miss (2014-15). The Tide will square off with Texas A&M on Oct. 8 in Tuscaloosa, seeking a win after last season's last-second loss in Bryan-College Station. Alabama has not yet had the opportunity to bounce back from a loss against Clemson (2018), Utah (2009) and Georgia (2021).

SIX RINGS IN 12 SEASONS: The Crimson Tide's win in the 2021 College Football Playoff National Championship Game helped Alabama claim its sixth national title in 12 seasons, making UA the first team in the Associated Press Poll era (since 1936) to win six championships over a 12-season span. The only other team in college football history to win six titles in a quarter of a century or less was also Alabama, coming across a 19-season stretch from 1961-79.

THREE DECADES OF SABAN: Alabama head coach Nick Saban has claimed six national titles during his time with the Crimson Tide and seven across his collegiate head coaching career. With Alabama's win in the 2021 College Football Playoff National Championship Game, Saban became the first head coach to win an Associated Press/Coaches Poll National Championship in three different decades - the 2000s, the 2010s and the 2020s. Saban's first national championship came in 2003 at LSU, six seasons before he came to Tuscaloosa and captured the crown in 2009. The 2010s saw Saban win national titles in 2011, 2012, 2015 and 2017, while his most recent one came on Jan. 11, 2021.

SIGN WITH THE TIDE, LEAVE WITH A RING: Since Nick Saban's arrival at Alabama in 2007, members of each one of his recruiting classes have won at least one national championship. The 2009 class tops the list with three to their name while the 2008, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015 and 2017 classes each achieved two national titles during their time in Tuscaloosa. The 2007, 2013, 2016, 2018, 2019 and 2020 classes can each claim one national title with the latter group still having time to add to that number.

BAMA IN THE NFL NOTES

LEADING THE WAY TO THE NFL: Alabama has had more draft picks over the last 14 drafts (113) than any other program in the nation. An impressive 41 of those picks have been first-round selections. The list of 113 features 12 Super Bowl champions, 27 Pro Bowl selections, 14 First Team All-Pro members and one Offensive Rookie of the Year. The 2022 Draft featured seven former Alabama standouts that heard their name called across the three-day event, including first-rounders Evan Neal (New York Giants) and Jameson Williams (Detroit Lions).

2022 NFL DRAFT: The Crimson Tide saw seven former players selected in the 2022 NFL Draft, including two first-round picks in tackle Evan Neal (No. 7, New York Giants) and wide receiver Jameson Williams (No. 12, Detroit Lions). Wideout John Metchie III (Houston Texans) and defensive lineman Phidarian Mathis (Washington Commanders) were each taken in the second round with third-rounders in linebacker Christian Harris (Houston) and running back Brian Robinson Jr. (Washington) closing out day two. Defensive back Jalyn Armour-Davis rounded out the group of seven, going in the fourth round (Baltimore Ravens). Alabama has now produced multiple first-round picks in 11 of the last 14 NFL Drafts with single first-round selections in 2009, 2015 and 2016.

SABAN AND FIRST ROUND NFL DRAFT PICKS: Since the advent of the NFL Draft, Alabama head coach Nick Saban has produced the most first rounders of any NCAA Division I head coach with 46 players chosen in the opening round of the draft, including 41 while at Alabama. The Crimson Tide's two first-round selections in the 2022 NFL Draft extended Saban's all-time mark, producing 13 more first-rounders than second-place Joe Paterno (33). After the 2021 NFL Draft, Alabama became the first school in the modern draft era to have four wide receivers drafted in the first round in a two-year span (2020 – Henry Ruggs III, Jerry Jeudy; 2021 – DeVonta Smith, Jaylen Waddle) and one of just two schools (Oklahoma) to have quarterbacks selected in the first round in back-to-back years (2020 –Tua Tagovailoa; 2021 – Mac Jones). With the first-round selection of Tagovailoa in the 2020 NFL Draft, Saban has produced at least one first-rounder at every starting position on offense and defense during his illustrious collegiate head coaching career.

CRIMSON TIDE IN THE NFL: Alabama entered Week 1 of the 2022-23 NFL season with a league-leading 58 players on active 53-man rosters. In total, the Crimson Tide currently has 71 players on an NFL roster (including reserve/practice squad). The Crimson Tide is represented on 28 of the NFL's 32 teams with only the Arizona Cardinals, Buffalo Bills, Kansas City Chiefs and San Francisco 49ers not currently rostering a former UA player. • Saban has compiled a 278-67-1 (.805) record as a college head coach. He has claimed seven national championships – six at Alabama – 11 conference championships and 22 of his teams will have played in postseason bowl games, including a trip to the BCS National Championship Game following the 2003, 2009, 2011 and 2012 seasons and the College Football Playoff Semifinals in seven of the last eight seasons including six of the last seven CFP National Championship Games.

• Saban is the only coach to win four BCS national championships, the only coach to win back-to-back BCS national championships and the only coach to win three CFP National Championships. He has won seven titles in his last 17 years coaching college football, most recently capturing the CFP National Championship following the 2020 season. Saban is one of three college coaches in the poll era (since 1936) to win three national championships in four years (2009, 2011-12). His title in 2020 moved him past Paul “Bear” Bryant for the most national championships in the poll era with seven.

• In 2009, Saban produced Alabama’s first national championship in 17 years by guiding the Crimson Tide to a 14-0 season with dominant wins over Florida in the SEC championship and Texas in the Citi BCS National Championship Game. He then followed that up with his second BCS championship in three years with a 21-0 shutout of LSU following the 2011 season at the Allstate BCS National Championship Game. Saban made it back-to-back BCS national championships in 2012 with a 42-14 win over Notre Dame in the Discover BCS National Championship Game. He took down Clemson, 45-40, to capture title No. 5 following the 2015 season in the CFP National Championship Game and took home his sixth national championship - and fifth at Alabama - in 2017 with a 26-23 overtime win over Georgia in the 2018 CFP National Championship Game. Saban’s most recent title came in dominating fashion as the Crimson Tide defeated Ohio State, 52-24, in the 2021 CFP National Championship Game in Miami Gardens, Fla.

• In addition to the on-field success, the 2011 team was also recognized with the Disney Spirit Award, which was presented to snapper Carson Tinker, for the team’s response to the community following the tornado that devastated Tuscaloosa on April 27, 2011. The Tide also had extensive success in the classroom that year with 38 SEC Academic Honor Roll selections, a league record, and produced an Academic All-American in Barrett Jones.

• A five-season run at LSU (2000-04) produced a record of 48-16 (.750), one national championship (2003), two Southeastern Conference championships and three SEC West Division championships. The Tigers constructed a 28-12 (.700) record against SEC opponents under Saban’s guidance. He was named the 2003 National Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and earned both the Paul W. “Bear” Bryant National Coach of the Year Award and the Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year Award by the Football Writers Association of America.

• Saban served as head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, his second stint at the East Lansing school as he also spent 1983-87 as the Spartans’ defensive coordinator/secondary coach. Saban led MSU to a 34-24-1 (.585) record as head coach, including four postseason appearances. In 1999, Saban led his final Spartans team to a No. 7 national ranking as MSU finished in a tie for second in the Big Ten. The Spartans defeated Notre Dame, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State in the same year for the first time since 1965 and recorded six wins at home for the first time since the 1912 season.

• Saban’s first head coaching position came at the University of Toledo in 1990, as he guided the Rockets to a record of 9-2 that year, finishing as co-champions of the Mid-American Conference. The Rockets ranked among the NCAA leaders in both total defense (12th at 284.8 yards) and scoring defense (16th at 16.2 points) and missed posting an undefeated record by a mere five points.

• A native of Fairmont, W.Va., Saban is a 1973 graduate of Kent State University where he earned a bachelor’s degree in business. He earned a master’s degree in sports administration from Kent State in 1975. Born October 31, 1951, Saban and his wife, the former Terry Constable, have two children, Nicholas and Kristen. They have one granddaughter, Amélie, and one grandson, James.

• At Michigan State, the Sabans started the Nick’s Kids Foundation, which is dedicated to raising awareness for deserving organizations throughout the state of Alabama and the southeast. Thanks to the generosity of the donors and the efforts of Nick and Terry Saban, the Nick’s Kids Foundation has donated over \$10 million dollars to many deserving organizations and causes since arriving in Tuscaloosa.

• Personally, Nick and Terry have given over \$1 million dollars to their First Generation Scholarship at The University of Alabama and have pledged \$1 million dollars to The Crimson Standard Initiative. They have also made major contributions to their church, St. Francis Catholic Church, to build the Saban Catholic Student Center that was completed in August of 2016. Their most recent project is the Saban Center.
