#FASTEST40 STORYLINES »

- Arkansas is making its third NCAA Tournament appearance in a four-year span for the first time in 10
- With a 5-2 mark this season. Arkansas has won fiveplus neutral site games in back-to-back seasons for the first time in 10 years.
- Arkansas faced 11 teams in this year's NCAA Tournament and posted an 8-8 record against those programs. Five of the 8 wins came against top 8 seeds.
- The Razorbacks have five wins over ranked opponents this year, the most such wins since knocking off eight AP Top 25 teams during the 1994-95 National Runnerup season.
- Arkansas' 122 dunks are the most in the Mike Anderson era, and Daniel Gafford's 74 slams are 27 more dunks than Butler has all season as a team.
- At 40.1 percent from behind the arc, the Razorbacks are on pace to record the second-highest three-point percentage by any SEC team in the last 25 years. Florida shot 40.9 percent in 2007.
- Arkansas has won 40 consecutive games when leading at halftime. During the Mike Anderson era, the Razorbacks are 125-7 (.946) when leading at the break.
- Jaylen Barford and Daryl Macon are the only two players in the SEC to rank in the top 10 in points per game, 3-point FG percentage and FG percentage.
- Barford (.436) and Macon (.429) rank first and second in the SEC in 3-point field goal percentage. No other high-major league in the country has its top 3-point shooters from the same team.

- The Razorbacks hold a 42-31 all-time record in 31 NCAA Tournament appearances.
- Holding a 20-11 overall record in NCAA openers, Arkansas has three straight opening-round victories.
- Arkansas has won its first two NCAA Tournament games nine times (1996 - Last time).

> BOSS HOG IN MARCH »

- Mike Anderson is one of five head coaches in this year's NCAA Tournament field to lead three different programs to three NCAA Tournaments.
- The Boss Hog is one of four current Division I coaches with 15 years of head coaching experience and zero losing seasons.
- Anderson is making his ninth appearance in the NCAA Tournament as a head coach. He is 9-8 all-time in the Big Dance, including one Sweet 16 and one Elite Eight.
- He is 6-2 in his first game of the NCAA Tournament, including two consecutive wins.

CLOSE CALLS »

- Arkansas is 11-1 in its last 12 contests decided by one possession, the best mark since the 1994-95 season.
- In games decided by four points or less, Arkansas has won 13 of the last 14, including a 7-1 mark away from Bud Walton Arena.

EXCEEDING EXPECTATIONS »

• After being picked to finish sixth in the SEC by the media, Arkansas finished higher than it was picked for the fifth straight season, as the Razorbacks tied for fourth with a 10-8 SEC record.

HIGH-PERCENTAGE HOGS »

- Daniel Gafford ranks 4th among all freshmen in the country in field goal percentage at 61.8 percent, ranking 40th overall in the nation.
- Gafford's 61.8 mark is on pace for the second-best mark by a Razorback freshman in school history. The current record is held by Sidney Moncrief, who shot 66.5 percent in his first season as a Razorback.
- Jaylen Barford and Daryl Macon are the only two players in the SEC to rank in the top 10 in three-point field goal percentage, points per game and field goal percentage.
- Barford and Macon are ranked 1st and 2nd, respectively, in the SEC in three-point shooting percentage at 43.6 and 42.9 percent from behind the arc.

THE RUNNIN' RAZORBACKS »

- Arkansas has 77 runs of seven points or more in 34 games this season, compared to just 54 by opponents.
- The Razorbacks have multiple runs of seven points or more in 25 of 34 games.

SENIOR GUARDS WIN GAMES »

- Daryl Macon and Jaylen Barford became the first teammates in school history to eclipse the 1,000 career points mark in the same game.
- The duo became the sixth and seventh players in program history to record 1,000 career points in just two seasons, the 42nd and 43rd players to do it overall.
- In the upset win against No. 19 Tennessee, Daryl Macon's 33 points and Jaylen Barford's 28 points marked the first time Arkansas has had two 28-point scorers in an SEC game.
- Against ranked opponents this season, Barford (21.9), Macon (17.1) and Beard (9.6) have combined to average 48.6 points per game or 57.8 percent of Arkansas' offensive production in seven contests (5-2).
- Against Tennessee, Daryl Macon became one of six players in program history to record multiple 30-point games against SEC opponents.
- Barford (24 pts) and Macon (25 pts) combined for 49 points to lead Arkansas in a comeback win over Georgia on the road.
- Both have scored 20-plus points in the same game six times this year (6-0) and have combined for 40plus points nine times this season (8-1).

BEST RETURNING DUO IN 24 YEARS »

• Jaylen Barford and Daryl Macon are the first Razorback duo since Scotty Thurman and Corliss Williamson to return after both players recorded 450plus points and 70-plus assists the previous season. (via @HogStats)

- During the Mike Anderson era, Arkansas is 89-11 when scoring 80+ points, including wins in 34 of the last 35 games.
- Arkansas has recorded 13 victories over AP Top 25 teams during the Mike Anderson era, including at least one in six of his first seven years.
- The Razorbacks posted two AP top-20 wins in a fivegame span with wins over No. 14 Minnesota and No. 19 Tennessee, three total this season. Arkansas has multiple (3) top-20 wins in the same season for the third time under Coach Anderson.
- From Dec. 5 through Dec. 27, the Razorbacks had five straight games with fewer than 10 turnovers for the first time in the last 20 years.
- During the Mike Anderson era, Arkansas is 125-7 in games it led at the half, including 40 consecutive victories. This year, the Razorbacks have led by an average of 9.7 points at the break in 23 wins.
- The Razorbacks are one of three high-major programs in country with six seniors on its roster, along with TCU and Minnesota.
- Arkansas recorded 28 assists in the season opener, marking the third time in the 21st century and the second time in the Anderson era the Razorbacks had 28-plus assists in a game. The Razorbacks recorded 27 assists against Oral Roberts on Dec. 19.
- During the last seven years, Arkansas is 43-3 when dishing out 20 assists, including a 31-1 mark in nonconference play. The Razorbacks are 4-0 this season when recording 20-plus dimes.
- Daryl Macon is 36-of-37 from the free throw line in the final minute and overtime of games this season. In his career, he is 66-of-71 (.930).
- Arkansas has knocked off four ranked opponents at home for the first time in program history.



HEAD COACH 7TH SEASON AT ARKANSAS **16TH SEASON OVERALL**



Razorback Nation welcomed home one of its own on March 23, 2011, when Mike Anderson was named the 12th head men's basketball coach in Arkansas history. Charged with bringing back the winning tradition that was synonymous with the Razorback program throughout the '80s and '90s, Anderson enters his seventh season at Arkansas and 16th year as a head coach in 2017-18.

Anderson continued to bring Razorback basketball back to national relevance in 2016-17, leading Arkansas to a 26-10 record, a spot in the SEC Tournament Championship game and on the brink of knocking off the eventual National Champion North Carolina Tar Heels with the Sweet 16 on the line.

The Razorbacks posted the seventh-most wins in program history last season, as Anderson led his squad to 12 SEC victories for the fifth time in school history and captured six conference road victories, tying the 1994 championship team and the 2015 NCAA Tournament squad for the most in the SEC era. The Razorbacks ended the season 8-3 in their last 11 SEC road contests, the best stretch since the end of the 1993-94 and beginning of the 1994-95 seasons. Arkansas used its secondbest free throw percentage in school history (.761) to post a 4-0 record in games decided by one possession and a perfect 24-0 mark when leading with two minutes left in the contest.

The outlook on Razorback basketball has never been brighter, as Anderson welcomes a top-25 recruiting class to Fayetteville for the upcoming season that features four of the top five players in the state of Arkansas. Three of the four players are listed as four-star prospects by ESPN as Anderson's staff continues to land the best talent in the state.

During the last four years, 17 current or former players have received their degree from the University of Arkansas, including five individuals during the 2016-17 season. Seniors Dusty Hannahs, Moses Kingsley and Manuale Watkins walked across the stage, while Trey Thompson completed his degree a semester early and is currently wearing the coveted "SEC Graduate" patch on his uniform during the 2017-18 campaign. Former Razorback great and all-time assist leader Kareem Reid walked across the stage 18 years after his final game as a Hog, and former graduate transfer Willy Kouassi graduated in the summer of 2017 with his master's degree.

During his first six seasons at Arkansas, Anderson produced a 128-74 record and was the first head coach in program history to win 18 or more games in each of his first four years. Anderson has also re-established Bud Walton Arena as one of the toughest places to play and brought excitement back to the tradition-rich program. Since his return to Fayetteville, the Razorbacks are tied for the fourth-most home victories in the country with 95 and are one of four teams in the country with 95-plus wins and 15 or fewer losses at home over the last six seasons. The 2012-13 squad posted just the third unbeaten SEC home record (9-0) in program history and the first since 1998. The success on-and-off the court has translated into fan support as Arkansas returned to the top 25 in national attendance the first six years, including No. 12 in 2016-17.

CONSISTENCY

Head coach Mike Anderson is one of just four current Division I coaches with 15-plus years of head coaching experience and zero losing seasons. He is the only coach to accomplish the feat at three different programs.



- Named to coaches All-SEC first team after being picked to the preseason coaches All-SEC second team.
- Averaged a team-high 19.3 points and 4.3 rebounds in Arkansas' three games in the SEC Tournament.
- Recorded his second career double-double against Florida in the SEC Tournament, scoring 27 pts and 10 rebounds.
- Recorded first career double-double against No. 14 Auburn, logging 21 points and 10 rebounds.

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Anderson has habit of exceeding expectations

FAYETTEVILLE - Preseason expectations don't bother Mike Anderson.

The Arkansas coach has made a habit of exceeding them in recent years, with his team finishing ahead of where the media picked it at SEC media days each of the last four seasons.

As the Razorbacks set out to stretch that streak to five years, Anderson said he doesn't put too much stock in the fact that they were picked sixth in the conference or that none of his players made the preseason All-SEC teams.

"It's not even where you start, to me," Anderson said. "It's where you finish and how you finish. I think that's the most important thing.

"I know guys get tired of hearing that, but I wasn't my wife's first choice. I was probably her fifth choice, so it turned out pretty good."

Last season, Arkansas was picked fifth in the preseason but ended up as the 3-seed in the SEC Tournament, where it reached the championship game for the second time in three years.

The Razorbacks were three minutes away from making their first trip to the Sweet 16 since 1996 before a few questionable calls went against them and they fell to the eventual national champion, North Carolina.

It was a heartbreaking end to the season, but Arkansas has several key pieces back this year. That means the expectations of the fan base are much higher than those of the outside world.

"I probably have a mountain on my shoulder now," Anderson said when asked if he had a chip on his shoulder. "It used to be a log, now it's a mountain."

Although Dusty Hannahs, Moses Kingsley and Manuale Watkins graduated, the Razorbacks' roster includes six seniors. That group is highlighted by guards Jaylen Barford and Daryl Macon, who flirted with going pro before deciding to return to school.

The young players on the team also have Anderson excited. He said sophomores C.J. Jones and Adrio Bailey have improved and incoming freshmen Daniel Gafford and Darious Hall have flashed their potential in practice.

Fans will get their first glimpse of the 2017-18 Razorbacks at 7 p.m. Friday, when they tip off their annual Red-White game at Bud Walton Arena.

Admission is free, but the UA is asking for donations of non-perishable food items.

"This team here - and you can hear it in my voice - I am really excited about," Anderson said. "It's not just coach speak. It's because I have had a chance to be around these guys and we purposely recruited these guys and hopefully it will get a chance to be the perfect storm."



Mike Anderson, Arkansas hoops expect more than just an NCAA dance

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — Arkansas basketball coach Mike Anderson made reference to the classic 1990s film "Friday" during Razorbacks Media Day on Tuesday. The movie had to do with being pushed around. Anderson thinks his team no longer is growing up.

Anderson said he didn't want his team to be "Debo'd." Debo is the main villain in the film, a muscular bully of a man who picks on everyone in the neighborhood who weaker than he is. The past few seasons, as Anderson has built Arkansas back into an expected NCAA Tournament team, the Razorbacks were a bit like the character's victims. They may have been tough enough against most, but when it came to the North Carolinas of the world, Arkansas was not quite up to snuff.

"Last time I visited with you guys we talked about taking that next step," Anderson told the assembled press. "Obviously having a chance to play against North Carolina ... you're up five with three minutes to go [in a second-round tournament loss]. Still resonates with me. Now we're talking about taking it to that next level."

The focal points of the Arkansas team unquestionably are Daryl Macon and Jaylen Barford. The two senior guards announced on back-to-back days this summer to pull their names out of the NBA draft and return to Arkansas. They were the second- and third-leading scorers on the team and will be among those considered for preseason All-SEC honors later this fall.

They're supplemented by the most highly touted high-school recruit Arkansas has landed since Bobby Portis. Freshman center Daniel Gafford is 6-foot-10 and was the 37th-ranked player in the Class of 2017. Some have said fans can expect him to immediately pick up where the now-graduated Moses Kingsley left off.

Anderson said that Gafford will be given playing time, but people should expect the usual freshmen ups and downs.

"Daniel is not the savior for our program," Anderson said. "Daniel will come in and go

at his own pace. That's going to be the big key. Trust me: If it's any indiciation what's taken place throughout the summer, what's taking place in practice right now, he will impact our team."

Someone will have to replace Kingsley, though. The two-time All-SEC defender is gone, along with his 12 points and 7.7 rebounds and 2.6 blocks per game. Gafford and Trey Thompson, Kingsley's partner in the post last season, will combine at the Razorbacks' de facto centers. Thompson's biggest strength lies in his post defense and his passing. An informal survey of nine Arkansas players Tuesday resulted in eight of them calling Thompson the best passer on the team, guards included.

Senior point guard Anton Beard could start or come off the bench. Either way, count on him playing 20-plus minutes a night. Anderson said he's down 10-to-15 pounds to about 185. The coach joked that until that happened, Anderson was quicker than Beard. A 10-point, 3-rebound, 3-assist season is about the expectation.

Where Arkansas needs development, and the perhaps the key to season, lies with guard CJ Jones and forward Adrio Bailey.

Jones provided instant offense as a 6-5 guard last season, but he played in only 21 games. His forte is shooting and getting to the rim. Anderson stressed that he wants Jones to become a better defender — that was part of the reason Jones played in just 21 games — and he likes what he's seen so far

"I think this past year he had a chance to sit there and watch quite a bit," Anderson said. "I think that this summer, between this summer and this fall, no question about it — now he's looking the part of the player we recruited here."

Bailey is the linchpin. He's about 6-6 and does not really have a position. And that's OK in a sport that have evolved to being largely positionless. Bailey can play inside or outside, though his shooting from the perimeter is the weakest part of his offensive skill set. Defensively, he's incredibly long and could end up being the best defender on the team. That's Arkansas' hope, anyway.

As for what to count on when the season starts, that's to be determined. The SEC is better than it has been in years. College basketball preview magazines, for what they're worth, all have Arkansas projected between 5th and 10th in the SEC. Fifth-place likely would get the Razorbacks back

in the NCAA Tournament. Tenth would be a massive disappointment after the return of Barford and Macon, no matter how improved the league is.

Anderson is watching and waiting.

"I like this team right now. I may not be saying that in another couple months, but I like them right now."

Adrio Bailey ready to assume bigger role

FAYETTEVILLE — Adrio Bailey sprinted down the Bud Walton Arena court in a 3-on-2 transition drill, leapt high and authoritatively slammed home an alley-oop from transfer point guard Jalen Harris.

Minutes later, in another fullcourt drill, the sophomore forward caught a pass as he slid to the baseline and rose up without hesitation, firing and swishing an 18-foot jumper.

The first scene wasn't a surprise. Bailey has been a high-flyer throwing down massive dunks since his high school days in Campti, La. His athleticism was on display last year in his limited playing time as a freshman.

But the shooting? That's new.

"He's really improved on his shot," assistant coach Melvin Watkins said. "And I think he's now confident and he's shooting it in practice."

That's a substantial development for a player who could have something of a breakout sophomore season in the cards.

"He is playing fantastic right now," coach Mike Anderson said.

Last season, Bailey only took 9 jumpers and made just 3, according to Synergy Sports tracking data. He only knocked down 6 of 19 free throw attempts. As a post player in high school, Bailey rarely operated outside the paint, which meant his shot had a long way to go when he arrived on campus in Fayetteville.

But a year later, his form is more fluid and natural, without a hitch. This isn't to suggest he's turned himself into a stretch big over the course of six months, but the improvement is a reflection of the time he's spent in the gym honing his game this offseason.

"The next step would be shooting in games and we're not there yet, but he's shooting it a lot better," Watkins said.

Arkansas coaches would be thrilled if Bailev is able to occasionally knock down jumpers once the real games roll around, but truth be told, that'd be a bonus.

They aren't counting on Bailey to become a double-double machine or morph into a stretch 4, but they are going to rely on him to impact the game with his athleticism on both ends of the court, using his length and hops to finish around the basket, clean the glass, wreak havoc in pressure situations and protect the rim.

For Arkansas to have the kind of season it needs, Bailey will have to assume a more featured role at a position where help is needed.

"The thing to me is just our forwards have to continue to develop," coach Mike Anderson said. "And those guys have."

The Hogs must have better play from its 4s. For the past 2 years, the position has been the team's weak link.

Last year's starter, Dustin Thomas, saved his best for (almost) last, contributing a season-high 13 points in the opening-round NCAA Tournament win over Seton Hall. The Razorbacks don't advance without his performance.

He didn't replicate the performance in the second round, but Bailey picked up the slack in spot minutes, providing a spark at the 4 with his energy and athleticism off the bench as Arkansas went toe to toe with eventual champ North Carolina.

The performances were impressive and necessary. Their role in the Razorbacks piecing together two of their better games in a high-stakes environment can't be understated or overlooked.

But they were also something of anomalies. Most of the year, Arkansas won at a high level in spite of its play at the 4.

Thomas and Arlando Cook, who is currently suspended after his second run-in with the law in a year, had their moments in their first year in Fayetteville, but neither could consistently put together solid performances. Bailey was largely relegated to spot minutes and didn't always provide a Carolina-esque boost when called upon.

The position was once again a weak point. Arkansas was better than in 2015-16, but the difference was of course the better talent elsewhere on the roster.

Moses Kingsley was one of the better players in the SEC each of the last 2 years, producing at a rate that helped mask some of the deficiencies of his frontcourt partners. Trey Thompson was arguably the most

effective player next to Kingsley despite being a natural 5 in build and play style.

But Kingsley has graduated and there's no guarantee Thompson will be able to play alongside his apparent replacement, highly touted freshman Daniel Gafford. Neither Thompson or Gafford have proven to this point they can stretch the floor like Kingsley. so spacing with that frontcourt could be dicey.

In any case, Arkansas needs better play from its nominal 4s, of which Thomas and Bailey are the only 2 with the team early in camp. The Razorbacks didn't require much scoring from that bunch a year ago, but a different roster makeup this season could necessitate more of a punch from the position.

Whether that's realistic or not remains to be

Thomas was Anderson's most-trusted player at the 4. The distinction should be viewed in relative terms, but he started 27 games and was the only 4 who was a mainstay in the rotation all season.

Thomas' most memorable outing of the year was the performance against Seton Hall in the tourney, a timely effort that showcased what he could bring to the table. The only problem is that was one of the few times he actually brought it. Often, he struggled against size.

While assuming a 21-year-old can't improve his game is ludicrous, it is fair to wonder if a player who hasn't been a reliably solid contributor in 3 Division I seasons can finally turn into one as a fifth-year senior.

"He's got to be able to help our basketball team," Anderson said.

Thomas and Thompson may begin the season as the starting frontcourt given Anderson's tendency to lean toward seniors early. They displayed a good chemistry when on the court together last year as Arkansas blitzed opponents by 11.6 points per 100 possessions when they shared the floor.

Thomas has good court vision and can bring some modicum of playmaking to the table. He has a respectable jumper when he's onbalance, evidenced by the Seton Hall performance.

But he has a tendency to throw up leg-kicky mid-range shots when contested: he made just 10 of 32 jumpers last season, per Synergy, all but 5 of which were of the mid-



range variety. The small sample size of his jump shooting (less than 100 shots in 3 years) is as telling as the 28.4 percent he shoots on them, including 22.8 percent of his 3-pointers, while hitting a mediocre 63.1 percent of his foul shots.

It stands to reason Thomas is the odds-on favorite to open the year as a starter, but he isn't the only option with DI experience anymore.

Bailey has the most potential of any 4 on the roster. He isn't big, standing just 6-foot-6 and listed at just 204 pounds, but his athleticism makes up for what he lacks in height and then some. Besides, how many teams in today's basketball really play 2 bruisers who both post up on a regular basis?

He had specific areas he wanted to work on heading into the offseason.

"Definitely ballhandling and my shot," Bailey said in March. "By me being out on the wing, I have to become a threat with dribbling and shooting. So I've developed that a little bit more than I had before."

The shot looks better. If Bailey can be a player who operates functionally on the perimeter as well as on the baseline in the dunker spot, his value skyrockets. He already possesses the kind of versatility Anderson covets on the defensive end.

His real value is using his athleticism and motor to impact the game in ways the other 4s on the roster simply can't, finishing above the rim and attacking the offensive glass on one end and being a springy, multipositional defender who can protect the rim on the other.

His line against North Carolina wasn't huge — 4 points and 3 steals in a season-high 19 minutes — but he helped change the game with his energy and activity. Eight months later, he's not only more skilled but more chiseled physically and in better shape to play with a high motor more consistently.

"The guy that's just really right now just cleaning the glass is Adrio Bailey," Anderson said.

Freshmen Darious Hall and Gabe Osabuohien might play some at the 4, especially Hall if the Razorbacks want to go the small-ball route that was so effective for them during stretches last year

But Thomas and Bailey are the odds-on favorites to begin the season as the tandem at the 4, particularly if Cook's legal situation

lingers. Arkansas needs Bailey to step up as a sophomore. He trended the right direction over the summer and early in practice.

"Oh, he's really..." Watkins started before trailing off when asked about Bailey's improvement.

He paused while deciding what area of improvement to point out first. There were a number of options.

Motivated Macon, Barford have point to prove

FAYETTEVILLE — Daryl Macon was sitting around at home on a random summer night. up late at 3:30 a.m. with a mind that wouldn't

"I was just up thinking, 'What can I do to get better? What can I do to get what I deserve?" the Arkansas senior guard said.

He wound up grabbing his keys and heading to the Razorbacks' practice gym, situated across Leroy Pond Drive from Bud Walton Arena. Unsurprisingly, he didn't have a whole lot of company.

That wasn't an isolated incident. He also spent a night at the gym, sleeping on a couch in the locker room after getting up extra shots.

His desire to better his game became something of an obsession, one fueled by a yearning to prove he is one of the best players in the nation. He received additional motivation when the preseason SEC media poll and all-conference teams were released.

"I see that they picked us sixth and didn't want to pick me for All-SEC teams, so this is how I'm going to play from here on out," Macon said after scoring an effortless 17 in the Red-White game. "So at the end of the season, they won't have a choice."

He isn't the only one with that motivation Like Macon, guard Jaylen Barford entered his name into the NBA Draft this spring and then decided to return to school for his senior season after receiving feedback

Arkansas will lean heavily on their scoring and playmaking ability with the hopes of making a repeat trip to the NCAA Tournament. The Razorbacks will need both to impact on a nightly basis.

Macon and Barford could make up arguably the best backcourt in the SEC this season, but they aren't satisfied with that billing.

"My mindset is that we have the best backcourt in the country," Macon said. "Not just our league, in the country. I think me and Jaylen worked a lot harder then what people think."

The late-night trips and overnight stays at the gym give that statement credence. And it's not like Barford, who agreed with the

nation's-best-backcourt assessment, was a sloth this summer. Armed with feedback telling him to improve his perimeter shot, he set a lofty daily goal for knocking down 3-

"I tried to make at least 400," he said. Motivated by having a successful senior season and putting himself on the draft radar, he upped the ante in those workouts and reported for fall practice in much better shape than he was a year ago.

"I just tried to stay in the gym as much as possible," Barford said.

Macon and Barford could vie to be the SEC's top-scoring duo this year.

Both established themselves as explosive scorers last year, but they go about filling it up in different ways. Gone from last season's team are Dusty Hannahs and Moses Kingsley, meaning Macon and Barford will likely have to assume more of the scoring responsibility.

There's reason for confidence that both will be ready and able for a bigger workload.

Macon averaged 13.4 points on stellar efficiency a year ago, shooting 45.3 percent from the floor, 38.7 percent from 3-point range and 86.6 from the line, all strong numbers for a guard.

His 62.6 true shooting percentage ranks second to Vanderbilt's Riley LaChance among returning SEC guards. All due respect to LaChance, Macon is capable of doing much more with the ball in his hands.

He has a smooth shot with a quick release that allows him to get it off while being tightly guarded. He uses a herky jerky handle with hesitations and in-and-out dribbles to freeze defenders and give him space to pull up. He's a crafty finisher around the rim and possesses good athleticism.

Last year, he ranked in the 94th percentile nationally as an offensive player, according to Synergy Sports tracking data. He was in the 99th percentile coming off dribble handoffs, the 92nd percentile coming off screens, the 89th percentile as a pick-and-roll ballhandler, the 82nd percentile as a spotup shooter.

Wowza. His efficiency may dip this season as defenses devote more attention to him, but he is one of the most skilled offensive players in the SEC.

Barford averaged 12.8 points per game last season. He hit just 26.6 percent from 3-point range, but spent the summer working on his shot and overall basketball IQ, the two areas his draft feedback indicated he needed to show the most improvement.

There is reason to believe Barford will be a better shooter as a senior. His 75.2 percent free throw percentage is evidence of his ability. Last season, he often got stuck with the ball in his hands with the shot clock dwindling, leading to him forcing up bail-out shots and hitting just 4 of 30 on jumpers in the final four seconds of the clock. Take some of those away or hit a few more and his percentages jump up.

But Barford made and will continue to make his hay with his ability to finish at the rim, especially in the open court. He was a terror on the break last year, shooting 61.8 percent as a transition ballhandler, which put him in the 90th percentile of college players. His ability to hang and finish at odd angles allowed him to get shots off in the paint over rim protectors, while his strong upper body paved the way for a team-best 16 and-1s. He was elite when driving to his left off spotups last year, ranking in the 93rd percentile nationally. He was in the 94th percentile when he pulled up for off-the-dribble jumpers after coming off ball screens. sporting a gaudy 62.5 effective field goal percentage on a move that puts an immense amount of pressure on opposing pick-androll coverages.

Barford averaged 16.4 points over the course of the final 11 games. Macon averaged 14.1 over that same period of time. Forecasting the duo to combine for more than 32 points a game this year isn't far-fetched.

They've proven they score. For them to better their odds of getting a shot at the NBA and to have a larger impact on what Arkansas hopes will be a repeat trip to the NCAA Tournament, they'll have to go about improving and showcasing other aspects of their game.

They, along with the rest of the roster, must be locked-in defensively on a more consistent basis after Arkansas ranked 11th in defensive rating during SEC play last year. Star players can be prone to defensive lapses at times as a result of their offensive workload, but both guys will be guarding the ball much of the time. The Razorbacks need them to be focused and they'll need to prove to pro scouts they can defend at a high level.

Both will need to show more in the playmaking department, balancing their need to score while leveraging their gravity on offense to create looks for others when defenses inevitably hone in on them.

Macon averaged a team-high 2.2 assists per game last year, but has the skill to push 4 this season. Barford finished with just one more assist (72) than he had turnovers last vear, but he showed flashes of being a playmaker. The Razorbacks expect to see



those more often this year, especially given how easily he can get into the paint and draw help.

"I think it was just the trusting part, for me and Daryl, coming from junior college and having the ball in our hand most of the time," Barford said. "Learning how to trust each other and trust our teammates helped out a lot"

Early results from the Hogs' first exhibition game were encouraging, with the duo combining for 11 assists.

At the team ceremony in April, Barford and Macon, along with Moses Kingsley, won the Apple Turnover Award for being the team leaders in the department. Not unexpected for three guys who had the ball in their hands a lot, but both Barford and Macon had similar speeches while accepting the award.

"I wouldn't have so many turnovers if these guys would catch the ball," Macon said.

"Some of these guys on this team can not catch the ball," Barford said. "They'll fake you out. I don't know what they're thinking. Especially Moses Kingsley."

They made the jokes in a good-natured manner, but there is some truth to the statements. Arkansas' bigs were often unready for dump-off passes, particularly Macon's when he drove and tried to lay it off for what should've been layups. Perhaps with Daniel Gafford, the super-athletic freshman center, some of those wraparounds can be alley-oops instead.

Barford and Macon will be leaders on this team, the product of their abilities and elder statesman status. Both impact the team psyche in different ways.

Barford, for example, has taken it upon himself to ensure freshman guard Khalil Garland stays in good spirits despite being sidelined with a medical issue. Sometimes that means joking with him. Sometimes it means checking with him to see how he's doing.

"Just try to be that big brother to all the young guys," Barford said.
Garland isn't an isolated case, either.

"He has such a bubbly personality," coach Mike Anderson said. "You never know if he's kidding or if he's serious. But one thing that he does, he reaches out. He has that aura about him and these kids, they gravitate to him."

Macon's swagger and prove-them-wrong attitude will give Arkansas an edge if it takes on the Little Rock native's personality. He doesn't lack for confidence in the slightest.

In one mid-October practice, assistant T.J. Cleveland was putting the team's guards through a shooting drill, with players taking turns firing above-the-break wing 3-pointers. While Macon was line, he turned to long-time trainer Dave England, sitting on the TV table at halfcourt, to tell him he was going to make his next shot. Nothing but net.

Minutes later, in another drill, he hit two more 3-pointers. He swished both from 25 feet and turned again to England, banging three fingers to the side of his head in a Carmelo Anthony-esque celebration as he made a proclamation.

"I'm not playing with you, Dave!"

That same sentiment applies to Arkansas' opponents this year.

"I have a chip on my shoulder right now," Macon said. "I have a point to prove."

Arkansas seniors' confidence not guarded

NASHVILLE, Tenn. -- Daryl Macon isn't shy about saving what he believes he and fellow Arkansas Razorbacks senior guard Jaylen Barford can do this season.

"We're going to be one of the best backcourts in the country," Macon said Wednesday at SEC basketball media day. "We don't get the respect we should, but we've just got to make sure we keep working and lead this team to another successful season."

Why is Macon so confident in himself and Barford?

"I think it's on paper," Macon said. "We came in from junior college and helped bring a team from 16-16 to 26-10."

Macon and Barford were keys in the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville returning to the NCAA Tournament after finishing .500 the previous season.

"Normally it takes a junior college player maybe a year to find that groove," Razorbacks Coach Mike Anderson said. "I thought Daryl and Jaylen were the exception, and that was big for our program."

Macon, who played at Little Rock Parkview and Holmes (Miss.) Community College, averaged 13.4 points, 2.6 rebounds and 2.2 assists in 25.2 minutes last season. He shot 45.3 percent from the field (141 of 311), including 38.7 percent on three-pointers. and 86.6 percent from the free-throw line.

Macon scored a season-high 30 points in Arkansas' 98-80 victory over Ole Miss. hit three free throws in the final 1.6 seconds left when the Razorbacks won 71-70 at Vanderbilt and scored a team-high 19 points in a 72-65 loss to North Carolina in the NCAA Tournament.

Barford, from Motlow (Tenn.) Community College, averaged 12.8 points and 3.8 rebounds in 25.4 minutes last season and shot 43.8 percent from the field (174 of 397) and 75.2 percent from the free-throw line (82 of 109).

Barford scored a career-high 23 points twice -- at Missouri and South Carolina -- and had 20 points in the Razorbacks' 77-71 victory over Seton Hall in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

"I don't think anyone can stop us," Barford said of the chemistry he has with Macon. "We play off each other, feed off each other and motivate each other.

"We push each other every day in practice. When we get on the court we tell each other, 'It's go time.' "

Anderson was asked whether he agrees Macon and Barford are one of the nation's top quard duos.

"Daryl and Jaylen feel good about themselves," Anderson said. "I think they're very confident in what they do. It remains to be seen what happens. I think on paper it all looks good and sounds good, but it's just opinion at this point.

"If you're asking me are they better than they were last year? Absolutely. I think they're light years ahead of where they were last year at this particular time. I think they're a lot more comfortable in what we're doing and understanding what it takes to be a tremendous player at this level."

Macon and Barford both entered their name into the NBA Draft earlier this year, but they didn't hire an agent and retained their college eligibility and after receiving input from pro coaches and scouts. They decided to return to Arkansas.

"It was a great process," Macon said. "I actually did it to get feedback so that I could come back and improve my game, and hopefully get drafted after this season.

"The feedback I got was to become a better leader with the team and improve my body."

Macon, 6-3, said he's up to 185 pounds after playing at 175 last season.

"Gaining the right weight is important in this game, especially in this conference, because it's very physical," Macon said. "You've got to be able to stand your ground.

"I feel a lot stronger now, and that helped me spend a lot of time in the gym over the summer trying to get more consistent on my shot and other parts of my game."

Barford, 6-3 and 209 pounds, said he's worked hard to improve his perimeter game after he shot 26.6 percent (29 of 109) on three-pointers last season. He also wants to be better with the ball after having 72 assists and 71 turnovers.

"This year things are slowing down," Barford said. "I've got a feel for everything in the SEC now, so I think I'm going to be all right."

Barford has no concerns about his ability to drive aggressively to the basket.

"I think I'm the best guard in the country in the open floor," he said.

Pat Bradley, a former Arkansas guard who is an SEC Network analyst, said he loves how Macon and Barford play.

"I think they're extremely interchangeable, which is a big advantage," Bradley said. "Both of them can play the point or play the off guard.

"We know how well Daryl can shoot, and Jaylen is improving his jump shot."

Bradley said Macon and Barford's defense is a plus, too.

"To me, it's all about getting after it, and both Jaylen and Daryl proved last year they're willing to defend baseline-to-baseline and rotate," Bradley said. "They understand those things."

Macon said he and Barford are both comfortable handling the ball.

"If Jaylen gets the ball and brings it up the floor, I'm going to take off," he said. "Or if I get the ball and bring it up, Jaylen's going. It's really interchangeable at any point in the game."

An SEC media poll listed 12 players on two all-conference teams, but no Razorbacks.

"I mean, it is what it is," Macon said of the Razorbacks being snubbed. "But that's just someone's opinion. They're not out there on the floor playing us. So I try not read too much into it.

"I can't say I'm shocked, but it's basketball at the end of the day. You've still got to go out there and play. That list doesn't mean anything."

Macon was asked whether he expects himself or Barford to be on an All-SEC list after the season.

"How about we just wait and see," he said with a smile. "Give us a chance to show people what we can do."



Return of Macon, Barford has Hogs thinking NCAA repeat

FAYETTEVILLE — For much of last season, Arkansas appeared on the verge of missing the NCAA Tournament for a fifth time in six seasons under coach Mike Anderson.

A late-season surge landed the Razorbacks in the postseason for a second time in three years — relaxing the pressure on Anderson and leading to a second-round NCAA exit at the hands of eventual national champion North Carolina.

Arkansas has its sights set on topping last year's 26-10 record this season, thanks in large part to the return of senior guards Jaylen Barford and Daryl Macon. The Razorbacks began practice this week ahead of their season opener against Samford on Nov. 10, and they did so with one of the top backcourts in the Southeastern Conference. Just ask them.

"I think we have the best backcourt in the country," Macon said. "I don't think there's (any) other pair of guards you can choose before me and Jaylen."

Both Barford and Macon were in their first seasons with Arkansas a year ago after transferring from junior college. While they both experienced struggles along the way, their transitions to the Division I level were relatively smooth and the duo combined to average 26.2 points per game.

Each of the guards entered the NBA draft following last season in order to have their professional prospects evaluated. But they did not sign with an agent and eventually announced their decision to return to Arkansas together.

That was just fine with Anderson, who couldn't hide his excitement about his guards — or the possibility of making it to the NCAA Tournament for a third time in four seasons — on Tuesday.

"I like this team right now," Anderson said. "The veteran guys from last year, they're dialed in ... Now, we're talking about taking it to that next level."

Macon was second on the Razorbacks with an average of 13.4 points per game last season, including a career-high 30-point outburst in a late-season win at home over Mississippi. The 6-foot-3 guard was at his best as a shooter, knocking down 86.7

percent of his free throws and connecting on 38.7 percent of his 3-pointers.

The 6-foot-3 Barford, meanwhile, brought a physical element and ability to get to the rim. The guard averaged 12.8 points per game while also finishing second on the Razorbacks in both steals and assists.

In addition to Barford and Macon, the Razorbacks also have another returning senior guard with plenty of experience in Anton Beard — along with a talented group of freshmen including 6-foot-11 forward Daniel Gafford.

All in all, it's a mix that has hopes high in Fayetteville for more postseason fun this season.

"I think we're a little slept on right now, but that's all right," Barford said. "We've got a lot of experience, so we're going to be great."



Lighter, quicker Beard ready for senior season at Arkansas

Arkansas Coach Mike Anderson clued everyone in on how Beard had lost weight, but still seeing him was a bit of a surprise. Beard appears set to have a big senior season.

"Anton Beard, he's had some adversity," Anderson said. "I think he's going to be a great story when he finishes, I really, really believe. You look at his high school career. He was a winner. The guy was a winner. He had some adversity here. I think when it's all said and done, when he looks back on his life, there's going to be some pivotal moments that took place in his life that, you know what, I've got to become a man. I've got to step up and take ownership.

"I think this year, when you guys get a chance to see him out there, you'll see what I'm talking about. He's probably lost about 15 pounds. I mean he's probably down to 180-185, something like that. His body is shaped up. Hell, he looks like he's a little guicker now. When he was a stocky little dude, hell I was quicker than him. But now he's shedded and I tell you what, he's playing at a pretty high level right now."

He talked about the lost weight on Tuesday during Media Day.

"I worked on my body all summer," Beard said. "I feel a lot quicker and a little bit stronger. It has been something we tried to work on all summer."

Anderson talked some more about Beard's loss of weight and quickness as well as one motivation for it.

"There's some competition going on," Anderson said. "Even when you see it last year... Anton, his freshman year, started for us. Then of course the adversity took place his sophomore year. He came back and now was in a different role. Now you have some guys coming in here impacting and he started some games for us, which I think is a plus for us because we have. When you lose guys like Moses (Kingsley), Dusty Hannahs and Manuale (Watkins), who all started for us, but we may have four or five starters over here because those guys started at some point during the year. Anton is one of those guys.

"He made the statement that he wanted his senior year to be his best year. I think he wanted to develop and improve. How do you improve? You get your body right and I think his mind right. I always thought he had that Corey Beck, pit bull mentality. Can you imagine that kind of mentality a little quicker now? Obviously it's your senior year. Hopefully the leadership and the sense of urgency and taking ownership can take place with him. He's been here a while. He and Trey (Thompson) are, when you talk about guys that have been on winning teams, even the 16-16 team. I thought that was a winning team. I think those guys want to go out the right way. But you look at their history, those guys won in high school, too. They won state championships. This is the next step."

Beard has been parts of teams at Arkansas that have won 26 and 27 games and won three state championships in high school, two with Little Rock (Ark.) Parkview and one with North Little Rock (Ark.). What has been your drive to win and be that successful?

"My whole life it just started off when I was real young my daddy always pushed me to be a winner," Beard said. "It just stuck with me. Every team I have been on I have been blessed to do big things.

"Even the teams here we have had some good teams and a bad season (2015-16, 16-16). I wouldn't call that a bad season. I would call it a learning season. Sometimes those learning seasons you've just got to push through them. You are not gonna win them all, but you can win most of them."

This year's Arkansas has five or six seniors, depending on status of Arlando Cook, two scholarship sophomores playing and another redshirting then four freshmen. Beard talked about the balance the roster mixing experience with youth.

"Yes, we've got six seniors and some underclassmen that came in and really want to learn," Beard said. "It is something we can work on."

Beard was named to the All-SEC Freshman team after starting 16 games in 2014-15. However, prior to his sophomore season he ran into some legal issues. He was suspended from the team the first semester of the 2015-16 season. He played the final 23 games of the season. Beard talked about how he stayed in school and earned his way back onto the team.

"I'm not a quitter," Beard said. "Adversity makes you stronger. We all go through things that sometimes people just don't understand. It makes you who you are."

As a junior last season, Beard averaged 7.2 points, 2.1 rebounds and dished out 70 assists in 36 games including 11 starts.



Anderson: Freshman is learning

FAYETTEVILLE -- Arkansas Razorbacks' forward Daniel Gafford, matched up against veterans Yante Maten and Derek Ogbeide, suffered his first shutout in Tuesday's 80-77 double-overtime victory at Georgia

The 6-11 freshman from El Dorado, the reigning SEC Freshman of the Week, missed all three of his shots and had three rebounds, a steal an assist in his 27 minutes.

"I think Daniel continues to learn lessons," said University of Arkansas, Fayetteville Coach Mike Anderson. "He went against a very veteran, crafty player. The big kid, Ogbeide, was pushing him around, and then ... when Maten got him, they pushed him away from the basket.

"I thought they did a good job of really just making him a little smaller. He didn't play as long as he's been playing early on. ... They got real physical in pushing him off the spot."

Gafford averaged 14.6 points in his last three games and had scored in double figures in five of his first seven SEC games. Gafford, who was averaging two blocked shots per game, also went without a block for the first time since a loss at Houston on Dec. 2.

"He's young, but he understands what comes with the game," said senior guard Jaylen Barford, Gafford's roommate. "He's just got to keep his mindset. ... I think he's all right."

Senior forward Trey Thompson said Gafford, who is projected as a potential first-round NBA Draft pick by some analysts, is typically hard on himself.

"He'll bounce back," Thompson said.

"We've got to continue to do a better job of getting him in position where he can score and utilize what God's gifted him with," Anderson said. "He's a guy that can really rebound and be on the other end of the floor before anybody gets down there."

Beard update

Senior guard Anton Beard was clearly in pain and grimacing at various points of Tuesday's victory due to the sprained ankle he suffered during a Jan. 17 loss at Florida. "I'm sure he's probably sore at times," Mike Anderson said. "He's getting treatment while

he has time off. Can you play with pain? That's the biggest question mark."

Beard's teammates Jaylen Barford and Trey Thompson said Beard's grittiness has been impressive.

"He does what he does night in and night out," Barford said.

"I'm not worried about Anton," Thompson said. "His injury is not that bad. ... He'll play. He'll be ready to go on Saturday."

Anderson pointed out Beard taking a charge and hitting a key jump shot to put the Razorbacks ahead 63-61 with 28 seconds left in regulation at Georgia.

"He's playing with his heart," Anderson said.

No frustration

Guard Daryl Macon is still adjusting to his role as a reserve, but the results have been solid. The senior guard is averaging 22.5 points in the last two games while coming off the bench, including 25 on Tuesday at Georgia, all in the second half and the overtime periods.

He scored 8 points in a 65-63 victory over Missouri in his first game out of the starting lineup. The Razorbacks are 3-0 in games Macon has come off the bench.

"I tell you what, it's given us some balance, I think, more than anything else," Mike Anderson said. "I think it's given Daryl an opportunity to come out and just play basketball.

"He turned a switch on in the second half and our guys did a good job of screening for him and he was moving without the basketball. I thought he didn't play frustrated. There have been times we've seen him where he played frustrated."

Guard Jaylen Barford, who scored 24 points, most of them before Macon's scoring outburst, said he enjoyed watching Macon take over in overtime.

"I think it was impressive because he was scoreless in the first half," Barford said. "He just woke up and snapped. He got hot."



Freshman Gafford has big decision to make

The Clash asked simply: Should I stay or should I go?

There is no wrong answer to the question as Gafford is projected by many to be a mid-tolate first-round pick. ESPN's Jonathan Givony has Gafford currently as the 15th pick to the Phoenix Suns. Thus, he will instantly become a rich young man if he decides to come out.

"Gafford's tremendous physical tools and significant upside will likely mean his name is called somewhere in the top 20 on draft night, if he has a strong pre-draft process," Givony writes.

Givony makes note of the 2018 draft likely to have eight big men selected in the first round.

"Unfortunately the glut of big men in this class (plus the lack of wings around the league) makes it difficult for him to crack the lottery in this team-needs-based mock draft," Givony concludes. "The Suns are one team that could potentially look for depth at the center spot, adding much needed rim protection and finishing ability as Alex Len enters free agency."

Sports Illustrated's Jeremy Wood projects Gafford going 19th to the Portland Trailblazers while CBS' Garry Parrish and Reid Forgave along with NBAdraft.net don't believe Gafford will come out this season, an opinion that I currently hold as well.

"Though Portland remains invested in Zach Collins at this stage of the draft, Gafford's physical potential might be too much to pass up as a long-term project," Wood writes. "The Blazers' crowded cap sheet skews heavily toward perimeter players, and given the overall dearth of NBA-ready bigs in this class, Gafford is a good first-round dice roll. When he's active, he's a constant threat to catch lobs and block shots, and he has freakish bounce for a guy his size. He's the type of player who will excel in workouts and sniff late lottery range just on upside."

The 15th pick in the first round is guaranteed a starting salary of \$2,725,698 while the last pick in the first round is guaranteed just over \$1.6 million. The No. 1 pick in the NBA draft starts at \$8 million a year while fifth picks gets over \$5.3 and \$3 million for the player selected 10th.

Why is that important? Because there is a dearth of big men in the 2019 draft. Hence, Gafford is projected as the No. 7 pick in the 2019 draft by NBAdraft.com with only Oregon signee Bol Bol and Maryland signee Bruno Fernando as big men projected above him.

Wood believes that would be the best course of action for Gafford, who could make millions more over his first three-year contract if he jumps into the Top 10.

"Late-blooming, high-upside bigs have a way of sneaking their way into premium draft territory (like Justin Patton and D.J. Wilson) and Gafford appears a candidate to fit that bill," Wood said.

"While he's still foul-prone and has to be fit into a concept, Gafford's ability to cover ground and nimbly switch screens at his size makes him a no-brainer developmental big man. He'd benefit from two years of school and likely won't slide into an NBA rotation for a couple years, but Gafford has firmly established himself as someone to watch."

Staying two years would be the same path followed by his mentor, former Razorback and current Chicago Bull Bobby Portis. Gafford acknowledges that's a factor.

So do you jump if you are a likely first-round pick, do you take a chance and get the money now or do you bet on yourself to make money next season?

"Raw with limited feel, Gafford won't look ready by March," writes Bleacher Report's Jonathan Wasserman. "But that may not matter to teams willing to chase the longterm upside that's tied to his tools, athleticism, instincts and motor."

Gafford is averaging 11.6 points, 6.1 rebounds and with 57 blocks. The block total is third best for a freshman in school history with Hunter Mickelson's top mark 70 within his reach this season. He will have to make his decision by the April 22 NBA early entrant eligibility deadline.

There would seem to be very little reason not to go ahead and put his name into the draft just as his teammates Jaylen Barford and Daryl Macon last season.

That would allow him to work out for different NBA teams, go through the NBA Draft Combine May 16-20 in Chicago and get feedback on where he needs to improve.

Early entrants have until June 11 to take their name out for the June 21st draft.

There were 162 underclassman who put their name in the draft in 2016 with 91 taking their names out. That increased to 182 early

entrants in 2017 with over 100 taking their names out.

I fully expect Gafford to be one of those who puts his name in this season. Only question is will he take it back out.

Arkansas' freshman big man has been a revelation for the Razorbacks this season. The team would be sunk without him. He's the only true center on the roster and, coming off his second SEC Freshman of the Week honor, opposing teams aren't having a ton of luck stopping him.

Gafford is, by some account, exceeding expectations in his first year of college basketball. Some in Arkansas media proclaimed he would be better as a freshman than Moses Kingsley was as a senior. He isn't. Some others said he wouldn't get double-digit points and hover around 5 rebounds. He isn't. Ultimately, he's landed in the middle of those two projections. Maybe closer to Kingsley, but with upside that the former Arkansas frontcourt star did not and does not have.

How much NBA teams are willing to bet on that upside is going to determine Gafford's fate. He would be foolish not to, at least, ask around at the end of the season and gauge his prospects for the NBA. Gafford went from completely off the board, outside the top 100 prospects when the season began, to a potential first-round pick on some boards.

The first round isn't the lottery, though. It's unlikely — although not out of the realm of possibility — Gafford cracks that range of the draft were he to leave Arkansas after one season. His game does need a touch of development. Namely, he needs thickness. Adding some strength and weight will only help his rebounding, which has been modest given his size, and his ability to play a more traditional post game. Of course, the traditional post game, as written last week, is going by the wayside more and more with each passing season.

The \$3.3 million figure is a guess based on the 2017 NBA Draft. It's about the average salary for for a player picked between 20 and 30 that year, per Forbes' projections.

By no means am I suggesting Gafford will go for the money. Personal choice always factors in and it's too early to know Gafford's preference for his age-20 season. Arkansas is losing three of its top four scorers — or all four if Gafford exits, too — and the entire frontcourt except Darious Hall. Mike

Anderson has a highly-ranked recruiting class in for 2018-19, but the Razorbacks are going to be awfully inexperienced and unlikely to be as good next season as this based off that.

Right now, though, give it 60/40 odds he's back in Fayetteville for the 2018-19 season.

Daniel Gafford maturing fast for Razorbacks

Arkansas coach Mike Anderson just took a brief glance at the stat sheet from the Razorbacks' 95-79 win over Minnesota when he saw a dreaded 0-for beside freshman Daniel Gafford's name. It was just three shots from the free-throw line, but it was unacceptable.

Anderson says the 6-foot-11 forward has the potential to be another Bobby Portis for the Razorbacks. Although Anderson needed a double take to realize Gafford had just put up Portis-like numbers.

"I'm all over him," Anderson said to reporters after the game. "Man, you're 0-for-3 from the free-throw line? Little did I know, he was perfect from the field (in eight attempts.) He had seven rebounds, six blocked shots that tells you what kind of coach I am. He did all this in 21 minutes. That's efficient basketball."

That's also a player who is maturing just nine games into his college career. Gafford's 8-for-8 performance against the Gophers made him just the seventh Arkansas player in the past 30 years to stay perfect from the field with at least that many attempts.

Gafford is that growing rare breed of post players that has no desire to float out on the perimeter. He's not going to shoot a 3pointer. He's working the paint, where he's making 69.5 percent of his field-goal attempts. It helps his percentage that of his 41 made baskets this season, 21 have been dunks, which is more than the team total for six SEC schools.

While Gafford hasn't yet proven to be a great passer, he hasn't been dumbfounded under pressure with the ball. He has just nine turnovers against his seven assists. The Razorbacks offense opens up in a way that it cannot without him in the lineup.

"What he does is he gives you a presence inside, and what it does is space the floor out where those guys, they got lanes to either attack or shoot the basketball," Anderson said. "Not only that, he's a rim protector back there; he rebounds above the rim. So he's getting better."

Gafford currently is the Razorbacks' third leading scorer (12.4 points); he leads the team in rebounding (5.9 per game) and in blocked shots with 17. And he's done all this despite playing just 19.1 minutes per game.

Part of Gafford's adjustment to the college game has been trying to avoid foul trouble. He's fouled out in three games, and he averages just under four fouls per game. Despite his penchant for fouling, Anderson inserted Gafford in the starting lineup for the first time this season against the Gophers.

"It's just one of those gut, instinctive things that it's time to get him out there," Anderson said. "He learned the ropes of playing whether he fouls or not, I thought he played more athletic (against Minnesota); he played more instinctive instead of worrying about fouling."



Daniel Gafford worth the price of admission

LITTLE ROCK — Reacting to a headline and a supporting email, a plan to eyeball 6-foot-11 freshman Daniel Gafford for the first time was in place until Murphy's Law kicked in.

After Gafford made 9-of-11 shots against Fresno State on Nov. 17, a five-column headline in the state's daily newspaper said: "Gafford spurs 'NBA' talk after big night."

Such a hook attracts readers, but cynicism prevailed until I received an unsolicited opinion from a knowledgeable friend who has monitored Arkansas basketball success from Eddie Sutton to Nolan Richardson to Mike Anderson.

"Daniel Gafford does appear the real deal," he said in the correspondence. "They'll be lucky to get two years from him before the NBA beckons."

On Thanksgiving, the 4 p.m. tip for Arkansas vs. Oklahoma in Portland fit perfectly between a nap — sleep-inducing tryptophan in turkey is no myth no matter what scientists say — and dinner.

At 3:40 p.m., a recorded message from an 800 number informed that 2,497 customers were out of power in Little Rock. Lucky us.

A short time later, customers were told electricity would be restored at 6:30. Then, a good news update — power should be on at 5 p.m., enabling a viewing of the second half. Not so fast. Moments later, the monotone voice advised the 6:30 start-up remained in effect for about 1,400 customers.

At 5:20, I departed a still-dark house for one of the few restaurants open 24 hours.

In the car, Gafford is hurt were the first words heard from the Razorback broadcast team, followed by he's OK, and a rave review of a Gafford move to the basket that was described as being a centimeter from perfect.

I could only imagine the nifty maneuver.

Leaving the restaurant, I heard Gafford pick up his fourth foul with less than three minutes to play. When Anderson left Gafford on the floor, I agreed with the broadcaster who interpreted the move to mean the head coach believes the young man from El Dorado is one of his best players.

Home with pancakes (extra syrup) and bacon, the TV was on and the final 2:39 was available. Gafford made a 17-footer with four seconds on the shot clock for an 85-81 lead at 1:03 and added two free throws for a six-point advantage with 38.1 to play — confirmation that he is unfazed by the moment and that his release is that of a shooter.

His totals for the final two tournament games were 29 minutes, 9 fouls, 11 rebounds and 14 points. It doesn't take what Danny Ford once called a "scientific rocket" to realize that Gafford can contribute in a big way if he stays out of foul trouble.

He had only two fouls against Colorado State last Tuesday and finished with 14 points, 6 rebounds and 2 blocks. He had four fouls - he played most of the second half with three - against Minnesota on Saturday and finished with 16 points, 7 rebounds and 6 blocks.

He is the reigning SEC freshman of the week with season averages of 12.4 points, 5.9 rebounds and 69.5 percent on field goal attempts.

The glimpse of Gafford's skills, a 7-2 record against good competition, the stabilizing presence of senior guards Daryl Macon and Jaylen Barford, and the UA's haul on signing day are reasons to believe Arkansas is on track to be a winner this year and beyond.

When ESPN ranks recruiting classes in football, I check where Arkansas' group fits in the SEC and pay little attention to names because incoming freshmen rarely crack the starting lineup. Basketball is different. Proficient shooters in high school are unfazed by the slightly deeper 3-point line in college and superb on-court skills are effective whether the defender is 17 years old or 21.

Anyway, last month, Arkansas cranked out a series of releases topped with headlines certain to encourage.

The first introduced Keyshawn Embery with "Razorbacks Land Top Player in Oklahoma." After that, Isaiah Jones was identified as a "Top-20 Shooting Guard," Reggie Chaney as the "Top Player in Texas," and Ethan Henderson as "Arkansas' No. 1 Player."

Maybe my opinion is under the influence of this plethora of positives, but it appears Arkansas got a break with the SEC schedule. The SEC's four teams in The Associated Press poll are No. 8 Kentucky, No. 9 Texas A&M, No. 20 Tennessee and No. 22 Florida, and the Razorbacks' play three of those teams only once. Arkansas' only home and home is with A&M.

The schedule is one more factor that supports the conclusion that anything less than a second straight NCAA Tournament appearance will be disappointing.



A prime number: Razorbacks' Gafford strives to live up to No. 10

FAYETTEVILLE -- There have been a lot of memorable No. 10s for the Arkansas Razorbacks' basketball team.

Daniel Gafford, a 6-11 freshman from El Dorado who makes his college debut against Samford at 7 tonight in Walton Arena, plans to be the latest o shine for the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville.

Four Razorbacks who wore that number --Ron Brewer, Todd Day, Ronnie Brewer and Bobby Portis -- were first-round NBA Draft

Day is Arkansas' all-time leading scorer with 2,395 points.

Ron Brewer and son Ronnie rank 15th (1,440) and 16th (1,416), respectively, on the Razorbacks' all-time list despite playing three seasons.

Portis was the 2015 SEC Player of the Year as a sophomore and scored 1,047 points in his two seasons to rank 36th on the career

Ron Brewer and Day played on Final Four teams in 1978 and 1990. Ronnie Brewer and Portis helped Arkansas return to the NCAA Tournament after absences of four and six years.

Gafford said he feels "a little bit" of pressure to live up to lofty standards set by previous Razorbacks who wore No. 10.

"But I'm here to not disappoint," Gafford said. "I'm here to make a name for myself." Gafford already is well known by basketball fans, especially in Arkansas.

As a senior at El Dorado he averaged 17.4 points, 16.0 rebounds, 7.7 blocks and 2.5 assists and was rated a consensus top 50 player nationally by recruiting services.

Arkansas needs him to contribute immediately to fill the void left by the loss of 6-10 Moses Kingsley, a two-time All-SEC second-team choice.

But Razorbacks Coach Mike Anderson has been careful to temper expectations for Gafford, as he did when Portis arrived in the fall of 2013 as a McDonald's All-American from Little Rock Hall.

"Daniel is not the savior of our basketball program," Anderson said. "Daniel will come in and go at his own pace. That's going to be the big key."

Gafford averaged 11.5 points, 7.5 rebounds and 20.5 minutes in the Razorbacks' exhibition victories against Central Oklahoma and Missouri Western.

"I think he's coming along well," Arkansas senior guard Darvl Macon said. "I think he knows he has a lot more to learn, but he's just getting started.

"The competition is going to go up every time we step on that floor, and the thing with him is he just has to go up with the competition. You can't shy away from it."

Arkansas senior forward Trey Thompson said Gafford's athleticism is impressive.

"I've never seen anybody 6-11 jump and run like he does," Thompson said. "He jumps like a kangaroo and runs like a gazelle.

"He gets up and down the court easy, and even his second or third jumps for a rebound or to block a shot are so effortless. He's got stuff you can't teach."

Said senior guard Jaylen Barford: "Daniel is a freak of nature, and he loves to work hard. I think he's going to be a great player for us." Gafford said he takes pride in his ability to run the floor.

"It's rare to see a big man get up and down the court like I do, so I try and use that to my advantage," he said. "Even if I get pushed on the floor, I get right back up and I'm down the court before everybody else."

Gafford said his speed hasn't been affected even though he's increased his weight from 217 pounds to 235 since arriving at Arkansas in June.

"Where the weight has helped me is playing inside," he said. "I'm better able to stand my ground in the post."

Macon said as well as Gafford has played at times in the exhibition games, it's only a glimpse of what he can do.

"I'm still waiting on Daniel to show y'all Daniel," Macon said. "You all haven't seen Daniel yet for real."

Anderson said Gafford plays with an energy that is contagious.

"You get a big guy that's so active, man, it just goes throughout your team," Anderson said. "He's got a motor.

"He doesn't just block shots, he alters a lot of them, too, and he rebounds above the

rim. He's relentless on the boards, and he's got a good pair of hands."

Gafford had 15 points, 8 rebounds and 5 blocked shots in 26 minutes in Arkansas' 88-74 victory over Missouri Western. He hit 5 of 6 shots and 5 of 7 free throws.

"That young man is going to be a really, really good player," Missouri Western Coach Brett Weiberg said. "I think he has a little bit of a toughness, kind of the right kind of a chip on his shoulder.

"I really liked how he played. He hurt us." Gafford appreciated hearing that.

"That means I've got respect from the coaches because of the way I play," he said. "That gives me a good feeling about myself." Gafford said he began wearing No. 10 at El Dorado because that was Portis' number.

"I actually got to meet Bobby Portis, and I wanted to use my game like his a little bit," Gafford said. "It felt like the number just fit me perfectly."

Gafford said he stays in touch with Portis, who plays for the Chicago Bulls.

"Bobby will text me sayings and advice that pretty much keep me going every day," Gafford said. "I'll use that to help me work and stay hungry."

Anderson said he wants to see continued improvement in practice from Gafford.

"I always talk about taking your practice to the games," Anderson said. "That hasn't changed. I want him to come out with the understanding of bringing your practice to the game.

"If you do that, we're going to be OK."



Can Daniel Gafford fill Moses Kingsley's shoes as a freshman?

FAYETTEVILLE — SEC basketball writers didn't do Moses Kingsley any favors by voting him the conference's preseason player of the year last fall.

Kingsley was undoubtedly one of the best returning players in the league entering his senior year, but his game didn't necessarily fit the POTY mold. His game and the makeup of the roster around him made him a long shot to win the postseason version of the award even before he fell short of matching the offensive production from his iunior season.

His scoring fell from 15.9 points per game as a junior to 12 as a senior, in part because the Razorbacks were a deeper team with more scoring punch. But he also made just 46.9 percent of his 2-point shots as a senior after converting 54.8 the previous year. His post-up shooting dropped from 50 percent to an ugly 39.8.

As a result, Kingsley's stock, both in the eyes of fans and draft pundits, dropped to the point where he likely became undervalued.

His defensive presence and work on the glass were still vital to a 26-win Arkansas team. His offensive impact was lessened and less effective, but he was probably the most important player on the roster. He still averaged 12, 7.7 and an SEC-best 2.6 blocks in his final season.

How well Arkansas can replace his production will likely go a long way toward determining whether it can make its first back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances since dancing three straight years from 2006-08.

Much of that task will fall on El Dorado native Daniel Gafford, a highly touted 6-foot-11 incoming freshman with a 7-2 wingspan. There is a lot of optimism around the program about Gafford, for good reason.

He is taller and more athletic than Kingsley and his skill set is highly intriguing: a player who should have an ability to both switch and protect the rim at a high level on defense while operating as a low-usage, bouncy rim-runner on offense. He attacks the glass on both ends and plays with a high motor.

There are striking similarities between Gafford and the version of Kingsley that arrived in Fayetteville as a freshman.

Both began playing basketball later than most. Kingsley played soccer until he was 12 or 13. Gafford was in the band before taking up basketball in eighth grade. Like Kingsley, Gafford's relative lack of experience means he is going to be a bit raw on offense in the early going, still learning how to face up and play outside of the block. But it also means he theoretically has more room to grow his game.

Both players possess good length, which helps them excel as rim protectors. Kingsley finished third in Arkansas history in career blocks. While Gafford will have to prove it at the next level, all the tools are there to suggest his shot blocking will translate to the college game. Each has the mobility to make them fits in Mike Anderson's switchy system.

"He can run like a gazelle," Anderson said of Gafford.

Both were similarly rated as recruits. ESPN ranked Kingsley the No. 43 player in the class of 2013. Gafford was the No. 47 player in the 2017 class by the same service.

But Kingsley had a distinct advantage over Gafford because he wasn't counted on to play a big role right off the bat. He, of course, arrived in Fayetteville at the same time as Bobby Portis, which allowed him to develop at his own pace. He averaged just 11.1 minutes his freshman and sophomore seasons before two All-SEC years as a junior and senior.

Trey Thompson will be a senior and is a skilled passer, solid finisher and underrated defender. He will almost certainly play a bigger role in his final season and his presence will take some pressure off Gafford. Thompson may start, something Gafford has expressed he's OK with, especially early in the season knowing Mike Anderson's penchant for seniors who've put in the time within his program.

"We expect a whole lot more out of Trey," Anderson said. "We saw glimpses of it his sophomore year and even more of it his junior year."

Still, Thompson doesn't possess the ability to impact the game with his athleticism the way Kingsley did and Gafford should. Arkansas needs Gafford to make an immediate impact. But how realistic is it to expect him to match Kingsley's senior production in his freshman campaign? It may be tough.

Gafford is heavier than Kingsley was as a freshman. He quickly gained close to 15 pounds after arriving on campus at 217 and it isn't hard to imagine his frame comfortably filling out to between 240 and 250 down the

road. But early on, he may have to rely on his athleticism as his strength catches up.

"I think (strength) coach Adam Pettway is doing a tremendous job in getting him to play a lot longer," Anderson said. "In high school you can get away with some things. He's taller than everybody. He's always being triple-teamed, double-teamed."

His best skill at this point is probably his ability to protect the rim. He averaged nearly 8 blocks a game as a senior at El Dorado. But how will he adjust to playing against far superior talent than he faced in Class 6A, learning defensive rotations and all the other factors that come with a step up in competition?

Kingsley led the SEC in blocks last year. Even in this one-and-done era of college basketball, freshmen have led the league in blocks just twice in the last decade — Anthony Davis and Jordan Mickey.

For all the similarities, there are a few marked differences in Kingsley and Gafford's games on the offensive end of the court, ones that will affect Arkansas in different ways.

Kingsley was a capable shooter later in his career. As a senior, he shot 75.7 percent from the foul line and was a threat with his jumper. He shot 43.8 percent on a low volume of 3-pointers and was one of just 13 bigs in the SEC to attempt more than 50 jump shots, per Synergy Sports tracking data.

Of the 13, he ranked just 10th in efficiency, averaging just 0.791 points per possession, but the gravity of his ability to shoot helped open up the lane deeper in the season as defenses became more cognizant of his shooting.

Gafford, on the other hand, didn't have a reliable jumper in his arsenal in high school and shot just 53 percent from the foul line as a senior. If he's hanging out around the perimeter (which he probably won't be), defenses are free to sag way off of him and clog the paint.

Gafford also doesn't have the low-post scoring ability Kingsley did as a senior, at least not yet. Even with up-and-down results, Kingsley's reputation often led to double teams from opposing defenses, which at times resulted in open shots for teammates. His percentages dipped, but there were still flashes of his skill on the block, ability Gafford is still working to improve.

That's not necessarily bad that Arkansas might not be tempted to dump it to Gafford on the block on a regular basis. Post-ups are often an inefficient end result and Kingsley



was the recipient of too many last year. Only six players in the SEC finished at least 150 post-up possessions last year. Kingsley's 173 ranked fourth. His 0.763 points per possession were easily the worst of that group.

At least early, Gafford's scoring figures to come in the form of dump-offs as a roll man, playing in the dunker position on the baseline, off offensive rebounds or in transition.

And that's fine. Arkansas has offensive firepower. Gafford will be counted on to provide energy and to change the game with his athleticism. It's a role he is willing to fill.

Within the program, the expectation is a return to the NCAA Tournament with the goal of making some noise. In order to do so, Arkansas needs Gafford to come in and produce right away in starter's minutes or close to them.

"His skill set will continue to get better, but he's battling," Anderson said. "He's fighting out there. He's got a chance to be a very, very special player."

Can Gafford replace some of what Kingsley brought to the table, even as a freshman? Absolutely. His physical profile suggests he will. Should he be expected to equal or even surpass Kingsley's senior production this season? Probably not.

Put it like this: If Gafford leads the SEC in blocks, ranks fourth in rebounding and averages 12 a game as a freshman with his athleticism and length, there's a good chance he'd be able to declare early and be a potential first-round pick in the NBA Draft after a single season in Fayetteville.



Freshman Hall making strides for Razorbacks

FAYETTEVILLE -- Arkansas Razorbacks forward Darious Hall had a rough introduction to SEC play.

The 6-6 freshman forward from Little Rock had three turnovers in three minutes in the first half of the conference opener against Tennessee on Dec. 30 and didn't play again in the Razorbacks' 95-93 overtime victory over the Vols in Walton Arena.

University of Arkansas, Fayetteville Coach Mike Anderson said a few days after the game that Hall made the mistake of trying to force things offensively.

"Let the game come to you," Anderson said of what he told Hall. "Don't try to go get it, especially offensively. Right now, you're not just an offensive guy. You get your minutes from a defensive standpoint, being a glue guy.

"If you look at his mistakes, they were ball mistakes. Very uncharacteristic. But I understand the nerves going, so he'll learn from it."

The Mills graduate listened to Anderson and has learned.

In Texas A&M's 80-66 victory over Arkansas on Tuesday night in Reed Arena, Hall provided some positive vibes in a tough game for the Razorbacks.

"He played like a warrior," Anderson said.

Hall had 13 points and season-highs of 7 rebounds, 2 steals and 35 minutes while shooting 6 of 6 from the field.

"Darious played big," Arkansas senior guard Daryl Macon said. "He didn't play like a freshman, didn't play scared.

"He was aggressive on both ends. He was everywhere out there. He played an awesome game."

Against the Aggies, Hall had four turnovers -- the combined total of his previous five games. While he was in the game, the Razorbacks played the Aggies to a 60-60 tie.

"I want to be a plus for the team -- no negatives," Hall said. "I did play good, but I can play better."

Hall is averaging 5.5 points, 3.1 rebounds and 14.1 minutes in the Razorbacks' 22 games, but he's been better in SEC play.

In nine conference games Hall is averaging 6.6 points, 3.8 abounds and 17.9 minutes. He's shooting 60 percent (21 of 35) from the field, including 3 of 7 on three-pointers, and has hit 14 of 22 free throws against SEC teams.

"He does a lot of different things for us," Razorbacks senior guard Jaylen Barford said. "He's great for our team."

Hall has started four of the last five games with Macon coming off the bench.

"We're not surprised at what he can do," Arkansas senior forward Trey Thompson said. "It's just about him getting better each and every game.

"I think inserting him in that starting lineup just gives us that balance that we have with that starting five and then with the second unit coming on."

Hall made his first start against Missouri on Jan. 13 and had 10 points, 5 rebounds and 2 steals while shooting 4 of 4 from the field to help the Razorbacks win 65-63.

"He did a good job," Missouri Coach Cuonzo Martin said. "Good athlete, good frame on him. He slashed to the basket, got layups and we didn't do a very good job on him, really."

Anderson wore a microphone for the ESPN2 telecast of the Arkansas-Missouri game and one sound bite featured him asking Hall about where was his heart?

Anderson said he was trying to calm down Hall, who responded by scoring eight consecutive points.

"He looked at me like, 'Coach, are you tripping? Are you crazy?' " Anderson said. "It was just one of those moments.

"I think it speaks volumes about him because he took it the right way."

Hall had 11 points and 3 rebounds in 13 minutes the Razorbacks' 97-93 victory over Ole Miss and 7 points and 3 rebounds in 23 minutes in their 80-77 overtime victory at Georgia.

When Arkansas beat Oklahoma State 66-65, Hall scored just two points, but his basket came when he stole the ball and hit a layup to give the Razorbacks a 52-51 lead with 9:27 left.

"I think he's progressed pretty nicely," Anderson said. "One thing about freshmen, you let them go at their own pace. I think we saw him take a couple steps forward, then take a couple steps backward.

"But his confidence is really, really high right now. He's learning how to go out and leave it on the floor, and I think that's a big plus us.

"He continues to get better, and that's what we expect. Our kids develop."

Anderson said Hall has done a good job of continuing to earn playing time.

"When you have that opportunity to go out and play, you perform," Anderson said. "He's doing it."

After Hall had four fouls against both Florida and Ole Miss, he's limited his fouls to three combined in the previous three games.

"I think he's now learning how to use his feet as opposed to his hands," Anderson said. 'Early on he was using his hands, and he had a lot of foul problems.

"But now he's reading and deflecting a lot of passes. Touching balls and coming up with them"

Hall said he appreciates the chance to start.

"I've gotten used to the speed of the game and all that, so I'm very comfortable," he said. "It feels normal now.

"I've had some good games, and I've had some bad games. But overall it's going well."

A lot better since Hall's game against Tennessee.

"He just had to slow down," Macon said.
"Translate his game from high school to college."



What is upside for hot-shooting C.J. Jones and Arkansas basketball team?

A short break from Arkansas football this week. The Razorbacks aren't in a bowl game so there is no onfield stuff to cover. With the bulk of the new coaching staff out recruiting, there's no opportunity for get-toknow-you pieces on them, either. It's recruiting, recruiting, recruiting ... and basketball.

Can you believe there are still people who aren't onboard the Arkansas basketball

The Razorbacks are 7-2 and recently picked up a win over 14th-ranked Minnesota. They also have victories over Oklahoma, a likely NCAA Tournament team, and Fresno State, a team on the bubble. Bucknell, too, may make the Dance as champion of the Patriot League.

C.J. Jones, the sophomore guard mentioned by Carter, has been absolutely instrumental in Arkansas' early-season fortunes. To some he is a surprise. If you're a close reader of SEC Country Arkansas, however, he should not be. Jones was called the most likely to be a breakout player this season for the Razorbacks.

He is a shooter, first and foremost. His .455 3-point percentage is a testament to that. Although it's not likely to stay that high, the fact that it's almost 50 percent and Jones is tied for the team lead with 20 made 3s is impressive. He isn't a player who simply is getting lucky. Jones is best when he's a volume shooter.

That's far from the only effective part of his game, though. In fact, I want to see more. As Jones gets more physically comfortable both this season and in the coming seasons, he should take more advantage of his athleticism. He doesn't have to be Jaylen Barford the way he gets to the rim and uses his body, but at 6-foot-5 and 180 pounds he can be silky in doing so. When he bulks up, if the shooting stays, Jones can be one of the best players Arkansas has seen in awhile.

That's his upside and he's only beginning to tap into it. With Barford and Daryl Macon established as all-conference players, with Anton Beard turning into a full-time threat, and with Daniel Gafford an early favorite for SEC Freshman of the Year, Jones'

development is a blessing. He turns Arkansas into a full-on power when he's playing well.



Unknown Jones ready to step into spotlight

FAYETTEVILLE — There's nowhere to hide in Central Park Christian's basketball gym. The Birmingham, Ala., private school houses one of the nation's best Christian high school basketball programs, but it's home arena is anything but gaudy.

The no-frills gym seats about 500 people. Small aluminum bleachers with three rows apiece are tucked into alcoves around the edges of the court. It's easy to see who has showed up for what is almost always an Eagles win.

Thanks to the intimate setting, it didn't take C.J. Jones long to spot TJ Cleveland sitting in the front row of one of the bleachers before a late January home game. He still remembers the exact spot the Arkansas assistant was positioned on the sideline.

This was a big moment for Jones, then a senior in high school. He'd been committed to Tennessee-Chatanooga, but decided to re-open his recruiting after a strong start to his senior year in the hopes of attracting attention from bigger programs.

The game was a chance for a prospect miles off the national radar, ranked the No. 340 recruit in the country by one service, to impress an assistant from an SEC program. "I was like this is really my chance to either get it or don't get it." Jones said.

He got it, exploding for 41 points, knocking down shots all over the floor and showing off his athleticism.

"I was just on," Jones recalls.

"I said the only way he's going to catch the eye of a major Division I coach is if he catches fire one night and they see that he's a shooter," said Chad Jones, C.J.'s father. "And it happened."

C.J. had already been on Arkansas' radar, but the performance no doubt helped his case. The Razorbacks were in the market for a scorer and the athletic 6-foot-5 wing fit the bill.

"It all just happened and it made sense," Anderson said.

C.J. committed during a late February visit to Fayetteville. At the time, the news wasn't groundbreaking. To the outside world, he was an unheralded recruit, almost a spring gamble.

Fast forward almost two years, he is one of the most important pieces on an Arkansas team trying to make the NCAA Tournament in consecutive seasons for the first time since 2008. His combination of shooting, size and athleticism will be needed if the Hogs plan on having a memorable March.

One former NBA scout posited C.J. was the best pro prospect on last year's roster before he'd even played a game, a byproduct of the aforementioned attributes, surprising praise for a freshman who slipped through the cracks for almost every program in the nation.

He didn't for Arkansas, thanks to Birmingham ties.

The connection

The Jones family had some time to kill, so they decided to go eat at the P.F. Chang's in Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport during a three-hour layover before their connecting flight to Fayetteville for C.J.'s official visit.

After the meal, they took the SkyTrain back to their terminal and were met with an alarming discovery: their plane was already pulling away from the terminal. Not the greatest omen.

"Geeze, this is how our trip's supposed to start," Chad thought, panicking a bit. "But then I was like, maybe coach A will feel sorry for us. They were cool about it. It's funny now, but it wasn't funny then."

They wound up having to stay at an airport hotel and catch a red-eye flight to Fayetteville the next morning. C.J., ever calm and laid-back wasn't phased.

"As long as we told TJ and them what was going on, we good," C.J. said.

It had to help that Anderson and Cleveland were the coaching staff he was headed to see, instead of, say, Tennessee, another high-major school that had started sniffing around. He was comfortable with them.

C.J. grew up around Anderson and Cleveland when they coached at UAB from 2002 to 2006. Chad played for the Blazers from 1994 to 1997 and started bringing C.J. to UAB games and kids basketball camps at an early age. The minimum age for camps was at least 5 years old, but C.J. remembers taking the Bartow Arena court at 4. He wasn't officially part of the camp at that point, so sometimes he would hang out in the coaches' offices or chill with the college players. Occasionally, he'd play with the 5-and 6-year olds on a hoop lowered to five feet.

"I would be better than most of them, so they used to let me keep playing," C.J. said. He was a hit with the staff.

"Coach (Anderson) just loved him because he saw the excitement in his eyes," Chad said.

Those early camp memories were the first of many, but the Jones lost touch with the coaching staff when Anderson took the Missouri gig in the spring of 2006. The relationship was rekindled in the summer of 2015 when C.J. made the trek to Fayetteville to participate in Arkansas' elite camp prior to starting his senior year at Central Park Christian.

He'd played AAU basketball for the Birmingham Storm, but wasn't on the radar of any big schools. Still, the face time with Anderson served to jog their memory.

"He was just telling me he really liked my game and I'd really gotten better," C.J. recalls. "He was going to start coming up to the school and watching me."

That's what wound up happening.

First, Cleveland came and watched C.J. drop 41 shortly after decommitting from UT-Chatanooga. Then, Cleveland's father stopped by for another home game. This time, C.J. poured in 38.

"I knew his dad was going to tell him, 'Oh, yeah, you need to get him," C.J. said.

Shortly after, Central Park Christian traveled to Mississippi for a big game. Arkansas happened to be playing at Ole Miss the next day, so Anderson and Cleveland were able to make it and witness another strong performance first-hand.

After the game, Anderson approached Jones. He'd seen enough.

"I really want you to visit and want you to play for me," Jones recalls Anderson's pitch. The family was elated, setting up an official visit for the next weekend, which, flight fiasco aside, went glowingly. They got to take in an 84-72 Arkansas win and later head to Anderson's house for some quality time.

That's when it happened. Anderson brought Chad and Delena into his office and informed them the staff had decided to offer C.J., who was sitting in the living room. Tears flowed.

I thought, it's just a visit," Chad said. "Really, seriously, in my mind, I'm not there. He was like, we're going to offer C.J. a scholarship and I looked at him and I was like.

'Seriously?!' And I was crying like a little baby."

There were no waterworks from the evenkeeled C.J., but he knew exactly what he wanted to do, verbally committing before leaving the house. It wouldn't be at Bartow Arena, but he'd get coached by Anderson again. For real, this time.

"That's where the relationships had come in," Anderson said.

The Shot

C.J. couldn't complain about the No. 340 ranking too much. After all, it came from the only major recruiting services that even bothered to rank him.

The anonymity only served as more fuel. It wasn't the first time he'd been forced to scrap in an underdog role. He'd been in that position for three straight years, in fact.

From fourth to sixth grade, he rarely started a game while playing at the YMCA. His role off the bench wasn't big, either. He was no Jamal Crawford in those days.

"I was getting like three points a game," C.J. said.

After one particularly frustrating game in the sixth grade, an exasperated Delena vowed to confront the coach about her son's playing time and role. Chad intervened.

"I'm like, 'No, it's not the coach's fault. It's his fault. Cause when he gets in there, he doesn't do anything," Chad said.

His message to his son was simple: if you want to see results, spend more time in the gym.

"We just had one of those man-to-man talks that day after the game," Chad said.

From that point on, it was almost impossible to keep C.J. out of the YMCA on the east side of Birmingham. He didn't have a membership, but the staff knew him and let him in anyway, so he and a friend spent almost every summer day in the gym, sweating and playing for hours on end.

Delena would drop him off at 8 a.m. on the way to work and pick him up at 5 p.m. Sometimes, he'd call his aunt who lived down the road to come pick him up early, around 3. The nine-hour days in the gym outnumbered the seven. He spent plenty of time at the gym with his dad, too.

"I was a legit gym rat," C.J. said.

Chad never really had to tweak his son's shooting form, but all the hours in the gym,

all the repetitions, honed the smooth form and quick release over time. C.J. rarely stops thinking about basketball now. He changed his major to communications because he wants to be a television analyst in the future. That deep love of the game dates back to that sixth-grade year.

"Every night I used to be up in the bed shooting the ball up in the air," C.J. said.

He began playing AAU ball in seventh grade and started for every team he was on from that point through his high school years.

Instead of averaging three points, he scored in bunches, often three points at a time.

The Breakout

If you arrive to Bud Walton Arena early enough, you'll catch C.J. going through the same pre-game shooting routine he's used since he was a junior in high school.

He begins the warm-up by shooting 3pointers, moving around the arc from corner to wing to top of the key to the other wing and finally the corner opposite where he began. The math never changes. Fifteen makes from each spot around the perimeter followed by 10 mid-range shots and some long 2-point jumpers. He's something a perfectionist.

"If I start missing, I'll start over," C.J. said. "I hate missing."

A true shooter's mentality. That's what Arkansas is counting on him being this season.

The Razorbacks attempted the fewest 3pointers in the SEC a year ago and have to replace the graduated Dusty Hannahs, a player who managed to crack the school's career top-10 list for 3-pointers made despite playing only two years.

Arkansas has Daryl Macon, one of the most talented scorers in the nation and a topnotch perimeter shooter. Fellow senior guards Jaylen Barford and Anton Beard have proven they can be capable 3-point shooters, but neither have the natural shot or upside C.J. does.

Last year, in limited playing time, he hit 12 of 24 3-pointers. He's shown signs of packing a scoring punch, of being the kind of player who can get hot and change the momentum of a game when he's feeling it. He's the player Hannahs thinks Arkansas fans should watch out for.

"I just think he has zero conscience and (a lot of) confidence while also being an elite athlete that can rebound the ball." Hannahs

Hannahs took C.J. under his wing during their one year of shared time, showing him tricks of the trade. While the sophomore doesn't possess Hannahs' ballhandling ability and knack for creating his own shot, his frame and athleticism give him a physical floor the new member of the Memphis Hustle doesn't possess.

Using those two attributes will be vital. There is, after all, more to basketball than scoring. He'll have to continue to work on his handle and try to develop some playmaking over time. He should be able to make an impact on the glass. Last season, rarely got off the bench once the calendar rolled around to 2017, in part because of the team's crowded, veteran backcourt but also because of defensive deficiencies rooted in playing zone all through high school.

"Presently, he's doing a terrific job on defense," Cleveland said in early October. "And he's only going to get better. His upside is huge.'

Even with C.J.'s playing time limited, Delena made the eight-hour drive up to Fayetteville close to 10 times last season. The basketball games were an excuse. Mostly, she wanted to spend time with her son.

They'd hang out at her hotel or in his dorm room after games. The next day, they'd make a trip to the mall, where she would make sure he had everything he needed on a little shopping spree. Then they'd head to a restaurant, Olive Garden was a popular choice, for some more catching up.

She made it to both exhibition games this year. The games are much more interesting this time around with C.J. locked in as a big part of the rotation.

He's still undoubtedly under-the-radar across the SEC and national landscape, but he's used to it by now. It's driven him, from the unending trips and countless hours at the YMCA to prove he was worthy of a starting spot in sixth grade, to the timely scoring outbursts in the humble Central Park Christian gym.

Now, the venue is Bud Walton Arena. Now, he's one of the most important pieces on a team hungry to make noise in March, his ceiling directly tied to how much of a racket is possible.

"I don't feel like I've proven anybody wrong," C.J. said. "Not yet. Not until I show it out here in the SEC.'

He'll have that chance this season.



Motivated Macon, Barford have point to prove

FAYETTEVILLE — Daryl Macon was sitting around at home on a random summer night, up late at 3:30 a.m. with a mind that wouldn't shut down

"I was just up thinking, "What can I do to get better? What can I do to get what I deserve?" the Arkansas senior guard said.

He wound up grabbing his keys and heading to the Razorbacks' practice gym, situated across Leroy Pond Drive from Bud Walton Arena. Unsurprisingly, he didn't have a whole lot of company.

That wasn't an isolated incident. He also spent a night at the gym, sleeping on a couch in the locker room after getting up extra shots.

His desire to better his game became something of an obsession, one fueled by a yearning to prove he is one of the best players in the nation. He received additional motivation when the preseason SEC media poll and all-conference teams were released.

"I see that they picked us sixth and didn't want to pick me for All-SEC teams, so this is how I'm going to play from here on out," Macon said after scoring an effortless 17 in the Red-White game. "So at the end of the season, they won't have a choice."

He isn't the only one with that motivation. Like Macon, guard Jaylen Barford entered his name into the NBA Draft this spring and then decided to return to school for his senior season after receiving feedback

Arkansas will lean heavily on their scoring and playmaking ability with the hopes of making a repeat trip to the NCAA Tournament. The Razorbacks will need both to impact on a nightly basis.

Macon and Barford could make up arguably the best backcourt in the SEC this season, but they aren't satisfied with that billing.

"My mindset is that we have the best backcourt in the country," Macon said. "Not just our league, in the country. I think me and Jaylen worked a lot harder then what people think."

The late-night trips and overnight stays at the gym give that statement credence. And it's not like Barford, who agreed with the nation's-best-backcourt assessment, was a sloth this summer. Armed with feedback telling him to improve his perimeter shot, he set a lofty daily goal for knocking down 3-pointers

"I tried to make at least 400," he said. Motivated by having a successful senior season and putting himself on the draft radar, he upped the ante in those workouts and reported for fall practice in much better shape than he was a year ago.

"I just tried to stay in the gym as much as possible," Barford said.

Macon and Barford could vie to be the SEC's top-scoring duo this year.

Both established themselves as explosive scorers last year, but they go about filling it up in different ways. Gone from last season's team are Dusty Hannahs and Moses Kingsley, meaning Macon and Barford will likely have to assume more of the scoring responsibility.

There's reason for confidence that both will be ready and able for a bigger workload.

Macon averaged 13.4 points on stellar efficiency a year ago, shooting 45.3 percent from the floor, 38.7 percent from 3-point range and 86.6 from the line, all strong numbers for a guard.

His 62.6 true shooting percentage ranks second to Vanderbilt's Riley LaChance among returning SEC guards. All due respect to LaChance, Macon is capable of doing much more with the ball in his hands.

He has a smooth shot with a quick release that allows him to get it off while being tightly guarded. He uses a herky jerky handle with hesitations and in-and-out dribbles to freeze defenders and give him space to pull up. He's a crafty finisher around the rim and possesses good athleticism.

Last year, he ranked in the 94th percentile nationally as an offensive player, according to Synergy Sports tracking data. He was in the 99th percentile coming off dribble handoffs, the 92nd percentile coming off screens, the 89th percentile as a pick-and-roll ballhandler, the 82nd percentile as a spotup shooter.

Wowza. His efficiency may dip this season as defenses devote more attention to him, but he is one of the most skilled offensive players in the SEC.

Barford averaged 12.8 points per game last season. He hit just 26.6 percent from 3-point range, but spent the summer working on his shot and overall basketball IQ, the two areas his draft feedback indicated he needed to show the most improvement.

There is reason to believe Barford will be a better shooter as a senior. His 75.2 percent free throw percentage is evidence of his ability. Last season, he often got stuck with the ball in his hands with the shot clock dwindling, leading to him forcing up bail-out shots and hitting just 4 of 30 on jumpers in the final four seconds of the clock. Take some of those away or hit a few more and his percentages jump up.

But Barford made and will continue to make his hay with his ability to finish at the rim, especially in the open court. He was a terror on the break last year, shooting 61.8 percent as a transition ballhandler, which put him in the 90th percentile of college players. His ability to hang and finish at odd angles allowed him to get shots off in the paint over rim protectors, while his strong upper body paved the way for a team-best 16 and-1s. He was elite when driving to his left off spotups last year, ranking in the 93rd percentile nationally. He was in the 94th percentile when he pulled up for off-the-dribble jumpers after coming off ball screens. sporting a gaudy 62.5 effective field goal percentage on a move that puts an immense amount of pressure on opposing pick-androll coverages.

Barford averaged 16.4 points over the course of the final 11 games. Macon averaged 14.1 over that same period of time. Forecasting the duo to combine for more than 32 points a game this year isn't far-fetched.

They've proven they score. For them to better their odds of getting a shot at the NBA and to have a larger impact on what Arkansas hopes will be a repeat trip to the NCAA Tournament, they'll have to go about improving and showcasing other aspects of their game.

They, along with the rest of the roster, must be locked-in defensively on a more consistent basis after Arkansas ranked 11th in defensive rating during SEC play last year. Star players can be prone to defensive lapses at times as a result of their offensive workload, but both guys will be guarding the ball much of the time. The Razorbacks need them to be focused and they'll need to prove to pro scouts they can defend at a high level.

Both will need to show more in the playmaking department, balancing their need to score while leveraging their gravity on offense to create looks for others when defenses inevitably hone in on them.

Macon averaged a team-high 2.2 assists per game last year, but has the skill to push 4 this season. Barford finished with just one more assist (72) than he had turnovers last year, but he showed flashes of being a playmaker. The Razorbacks expect to see



those more often this year, especially given how easily he can get into the paint and draw help.

"I think it was just the trusting part, for me and Daryl, coming from junior college and having the ball in our hand most of the time," Barford said. "Learning how to trust each other and trust our teammates helped out a lot "

Early results from the Hogs' first exhibition game were encouraging, with the duo combining for 11 assists.

At the team ceremony in April, Barford and Macon, along with Moses Kingsley, won the Apple Turnover Award for being the team leaders in the department. Not unexpected for three guys who had the ball in their hands a lot, but both Barford and Macon had similar speeches while accepting the award.

"I wouldn't have so many turnovers if these guys would catch the ball," Macon said.

"Some of these guys on this team can not catch the ball," Barford said. "They'll fake you out. I don't know what they're thinking. Especially Moses Kingsley."

They made the jokes in a good-natured manner, but there is some truth to the statements. Arkansas' bigs were often unready for dump-off passes, particularly Macon's when he drove and tried to lay it off for what should've been layups. Perhaps with Daniel Gafford, the super-athletic freshman center, some of wraparounds can be alley-oops instead.

Barford and Macon will be leaders on this team, the product of their abilities and elder statesman status. Both impact the team psyche in different ways.

Barford, for example, has taken it upon himself to ensure freshman guard Khalil Garland stays in good spirits despite being sidelined with a medical issue. Sometimes that means joking with him. Sometimes it means checking with him to see how he's doing.

"Just try to be that big brother to all the young guys," Barford said. Garland isn't an isolated case, either.

"He has such a bubbly personality," coach Mike Anderson said. "You never know if he's kidding or if he's serious. But one thing that he does, he reaches out. He has that aura about him and these kids, they gravitate to him."

Macon's swagger and prove-them-wrong attitude will give Arkansas an edge if it takes on the Little Rock native's personality. He doesn't lack for confidence in the slightest.

In one mid-October practice, assistant T.J. Cleveland was putting the team's guards through a shooting drill, with players taking turns firing above-the-break wing 3-pointers. While Macon was line, he turned to longtime trainer Dave England, sitting on the TV table at halfcourt, to tell him he was going to make his next shot. Nothing but net.

Minutes later, in another drill, he hit two more 3-pointers. He swished both from 25 feet and turned again to England, banging three fingers to the side of his head in a Carmelo Anthony-esque celebration as he made a proclamation.

"I'm not playing with you, Dave!"

That same sentiment applies to Arkansas' opponents this year.

"I have a chip on my shoulder right now," Macon said. "I have a point to prove."



Arkansas seniors' confidence not quarded

NASHVILLE, Tenn. -- Daryl Macon isn't shy about saying what he believes he and fellow Arkansas Razorbacks senior guard Jaylen Barford can do this season.

"We're going to be one of the best backcourts in the country," Macon said Wednesday at SEC basketball media day. "We don't get the respect we should, but we've just got to make sure we keep working and lead this team to another successful season."

Why is Macon so confident in himself and Barford?

"I think it's on paper," Macon said. "We came in from junior college and helped bring a team from 16-16 to 26-10."

Macon and Barford were keys in the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville returning to the NCAA Tournament after finishing .500 the previous season.

"Normally it takes a junior college player maybe a year to find that groove," Razorbacks Coach Mike Anderson said. "I thought Daryl and Jaylen were the exception, and that was big for our program."

Macon, who played at Little Rock Parkview and Holmes (Miss.) Community College, averaged 13.4 points, 2.6 rebounds and 2.2 assists in 25.2 minutes last season. He shot 45.3 percent from the field (141 of 311), including 38.7 percent on three-pointers, and 86.6 percent from the free-throw line.

Macon scored a season-high 30 points in Arkansas' 98-80 victory over Ole Miss, hit three free throws in the final 1.6 seconds left when the Razorbacks won 71-70 at Vanderbilt and scored a team-high 19 points in a 72-65 loss to North Carolina in the NCAA Tournament.

Barford, from Motlow (Tenn.) Community College, averaged 12.8 points and 3.8 rebounds in 25.4 minutes last season and shot 43.8 percent from the field (174 of 397) and 75.2 percent from the free-throw line (82 of 109).

Barford scored a career-high 23 points twice -- at Missouri and South Carolina -- and had 20 points in the Razorbacks' 77-71 victory over Seton Hall in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.

"I don't think anyone can stop us," Barford said of the chemistry he has with Macon. "We play off each other, feed off each other and motivate each other.

"We push each other every day in practice. When we get on the court we tell each other, 'It's go time.' "

Anderson was asked whether he agrees Macon and Barford are one of the nation's top guard duos.

"Daryl and Jaylen feel good about themselves," Anderson said. "I think they're very confident in what they do. It remains to be seen what happens. I think on paper it all looks good and sounds good, but it's just opinion at this point.

"If you're asking me are they better than they were last year? Absolutely. I think they're light years ahead of where they were last year at this particular time. I think they're a lot more comfortable in what we're doing and understanding what it takes to be a tremendous player at this level."

Macon and Barford both entered their name into the NBA Draft earlier this year, but they didn't hire an agent and retained their college eligibility and after receiving input from pro coaches and scouts. They decided to return to Arkansas.

"It was a great process," Macon said. "I actually did it to get feedback so that I could come back and improve my game, and hopefully get drafted after this season.

"The feedback I got was to become a better leader with the team and improve my body."

Macon, 6-3, said he's up to 185 pounds after playing at 175 last season.

"Gaining the right weight is important in this game, especially in this conference, because it's very physical," Macon said. "You've got to be able to stand your ground.

"I feel a lot stronger now, and that helped me spend a lot of time in the gym over the summer trying to get more consistent on my shot and other parts of my game."

Barford, 6-3 and 209 pounds, said he's worked hard to improve his perimeter game after he shot 26.6 percent (29 of 109) on three-pointers last season. He also wants to be better with the ball after having 72 assists and 71 turnovers.

"This year things are slowing down," Barford said. "I've got a feel for everything in the SEC now, so I think I'm going to be all right."

Barford has no concerns about his ability to drive aggressively to the basket.

"I think I'm the best guard in the country in the open floor," he said.

Pat Bradley, a former Arkansas guard who is an SEC Network analyst, said he loves how Macon and Barford play.

"I think they're extremely interchangeable, which is a big advantage," Bradley said. "Both of them can play the point or play the off guard.

"We know how well Daryl can shoot, and Jaylen is improving his jump shot."

Bradley said Macon and Barford's defense is a plus, too.

"To me, it's all about getting after it, and both Jaylen and Daryl proved last year they're willing to defend baseline-to-baseline and rotate," Bradley said. "They understand those things."

Macon said he and Barford are both comfortable handling the ball.

"If Jaylen gets the ball and brings it up the floor, I'm going to take off," he said. "Or if I get the ball and bring it up, Jaylen's going. It's really interchangeable at any point in the game."

An SEC media poll listed 12 players on two all-conference teams, but no Razorbacks.

"I mean, it is what it is," Macon said of the Razorbacks being snubbed. "But that's just someone's opinion. They're not out there on the floor playing us. So I try not read too much into it.

"I can't say I'm shocked, but it's basketball at the end of the day. You've still got to go out there and play. That list doesn't mean anything."

Macon was asked whether he expects himself or Barford to be on an All-SEC list after the season.

"How about we just wait and see," he said with a smile. "Give us a chance to show people what we can do."



'0-0' Hogs set sights on tourney

FAYETTEVILLE The Arkansas Razorbacks hope their next game in the state of Missouri goes better than the last one.

The Razorbacks (21-10) open SEC Tournament play in St. Louis on Thursday night against either South Carolina (16-15) or Ole Miss (12-19).

The Gamecocks and Commodores play Wednesday night with the winner advancing to face the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville in Scottrade Center.

Arkansas goes into the SEC Tournament after losing 77-67 at Missouri on Saturday in Columbia, Mo., a two-hour drive on Interstate 70 west of St. Louis.

"Before this game here, I thought we were playing really good," Razorbacks Coach Mike Anderson said. "So we'll get back to that."

Arkansas had won six of seven games before losing to Missouri (20-11), which like Arkansas should be a lock for the NCAA Tournament.

ESPN is projecting eight SEC teams will be in the NCAA Tournament: conference cochampions Auburn and Tennessee along with Florida, Kentucky, Alabama, Texas A&M, Arkansas and Missouri.

Arkansas senior guard Jaylen Barford said the Razorbacks will get over the loss auickly.

"This game won't affect us," Barford said. "We've just got to put it behind us and get ready for next week.

"We're still confident. The SEC Tournament is a new slate, and we're ready to start winning again."

Arkansas tied Kentucky and Missouri for fourth in the SEC's final regular-season standings at 10-8, but the Razorbacks are the No. 6 seed because they lost tiebreakers against the Wildcats and Tigers.

Kentucky is the No. 4 seed because it went 2-1 against Arkansas and Missouri, including a victory over the Razorbacks in Walton Arena.

Missouri is the No. 5 seed because the Tigers went 2-2 against Kentucky and Arkansas.

The Razorbacks were 1-2 against the Wildcats and Tigers.

"We've had a decent season," Arkansas freshman forward Daniel Gafford said. "We lost a couple games that we shouldn't have lost, but we can't worry about that now.

"We just need to get ready to play Thursday and have that mindset we're going to win a championship. But take it one game at a time."

The Razorbacks went 2-0 in the regular season against South Carolina and Vanderbilt, but both of those games were in Walton Arena, where Arkansas finished 15-2. The Razorbacks beat the Gamecocks 81-65 and Vanderbilt 72-54 in back-to-back games on Feb. 6 and Feb. 10.

If Arkansas wins Thursday night, it will play No. 3 seed Florida (20-11, 11-7) on Friday night.

The Gators have won eight in a row over the Razorbacks, including an 87-73 victory on Jan. 17 in the O'Connell Center in the teams' only meeting this season.

But as the coaches like to say, what happened in the regular season doesn't matter in the postseason.

"This is a new season now." Anderson said of the SEC Tournament. "Everybody starts out 0-0 again."



Hogs turn 50 in SEC tourneys

ST. LOUIS -- The Arkansas Razorbacks will play their 50th SEC Tournament game tonight when they take the court at Scottrade Center.

It will be the 36th time Coach Mike Anderson has been on the Razorbacks bench for the event.

Anderson was with the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville for its first 24 SEC Tournament games -- 23 as an assistant to Nolan Richardson and one game as the interim head coach in 2002.

Since returning to Arkansas for the 2011-2012 season, Anderson has coached in 11 SEC Tournament games with the 12th being tonight.

"I think it's a spectacular event, especially back in the early days when it was played at the Georgia Dome with 30,000 some odd people there -- and obviously we had a strong continent of Razorback fans," Anderson said. "So I'm talking to the Razorback fans: I want to see you in St. Louis.

"The SEC Tournament was a great, great happening when you talk about the teams that were in it, the type of players that were in it. And I think right now with the way these teams are this year, it's going to be an even more exciting tournament.

"Why I say that is, you can say this team here will win it, that team will win it. Whoever gets hot at the right time."

The Razorbacks have a 24-25 SEC Tournament record, including 1-6 in championship games.

Arkansas' title came in 2000, when the Razorbacks needed to win to earn an automatic bid to play in the NCAA Tournament. The six times the Razorbacks lost in the championship game, they received an NCAA at-large bid.

Arkansas entered the 2000 SEC Tournament 15-14, including 7-9 in conference games.

The Razorbacks hadn't won more than two consecutive SEC games during the regular season -- and they only did that once -- but they won four in a row in Atlanta by beating

Georgia 71-64, No. 16 Kentucky 86-72, No. 10 LSU 69-67 and Auburn 75-67.

"We just got hot," Anderson said. "That's the year Joe Johnson became eligible at the semester, and we kind of rode his back. It was four games in four days, and our guys rose to the occasion.

"Each and every game I think our guys got better. Their confidence grew in that setting."

Anderson has led the Razorbacks to the SEC Tournament championship game two of the previous three seasons, with Arkansas losing to Kentucky 78-63 in 2015 and 82-65 last year.

The Razorbacks are 13-2 in the quarterfinals, the round they're playing in tonight.

Modica a Legend

Jonathon Modica, a Smackover native who ranks 12th on the Arkansas all-time scoring list with 1,589 points from the 2002-2003 through 2005-2006 seasons, will be honored at halftime of Arkansas' game tonight as the UA's SEC Legend.

Rob Evans, a former Razorbacks assistant coach, was honored Wednesday night as Ole Miss' SEC Legend. John Brady, a former coach at Arkansas State University, is being honored as LSU's SEC Legend tonight when the Tigers play Mississippi State.

Short prep time

The Razorbacks didn't know their opponent tonight until the end of the South Carolina-Ole Miss game on Wednesday night.

Arkansas Coach Mike Anderson said that's not a problem because the Razorbacks focus on themselves, not their opponent.

"Well, we always talk about what we do," he said. "Throughout this year, we don't just prepare for one particular team. We're preparing for everyone each and every day we go out.

"The things that we do, we're preparing for whether it be South Carolina, we're also preparing for Ole Miss. We're more worried about ourselves right now, in terms of how we can get better."

At Scottrade

Arkansas is playing at Scottrade Center for the second time, but it will be the seventh game in the facility for Razorbacks Coach Mike Anderson.

Anderson's Alabama-Birmingham team lost to Kansas in an NCAA Tournament Sweet 16 game in 2004, and his Missouri teams were 2-3 against Illinois in Scottrade Center in the annual Braggin' Rights between the Tigers and Illini.

In the Razorbacks' previous game there, Louisville beat Arkansas 96-66 on Nov. 17, 2009.

That game featured a matchup of Louisville Coach Rick Pitino and Arkansas Coach John Pelphrey, who played for Pitino at Kentucky.



Hogs hold off Gamecocks to advance in St. Louis

ST. LOUIS — Arkansas guard Jaylen Barford transformed himself from a belowaverage 3-pointer shooter a year ago to one of the best in the country from deep this season.

Barford pushed his newfound shooting ability to its limits on Thursday night, and he responded when the Razorbacks needed him the most in a 69-64 win over South Carolina in the second round of the Southeastern Conference Tournament.

The senior, a first-team All-SEC selection, scored 13 of his 17 points in the second half to help sixth-seeded Arkansas (22-10) hold off a furious late charge from the Gamecocks. It wasn't just the number of points Barford scored that was so impressive, but rather when — and how he scored them.

In particular, with Arkansas' earlier 15-point lead having dwindled to two with just over three minutes remaining, Barford connected on a high-arcing 25-foot 3-pointer as the shot clock was winding down.

The shot was part of five straight points for the 6-foot-3 playmaker, who has improved from a 26.6 percent 3-pointer shooter a year ago to making 43.4 percent of his shots from deep this season — second in the SEC.

"I shoot every day, but I guess it was kind of like a H-O-R-S-E shot," Barford said. "I knew it was good when it left my hands."

The win is the seventh in the last nine games for the Razorbacks, who advance to face No. 3 seed Florida on Friday night.

Chris Silva had 15 points and 11 rebounds to lead the No. 11 seed Gamecocks (17-16), who advanced to the second round with a win over Mississippi on Wednesday night.

Maik Kotsar also scored 15 points and Frank Booker added 11 for South Carolina, which now must wait to see if its late-season recovery following a six-game losing streak was enough to earn a postseason berth.

"We fit the criteria, but it's not my decision," South Carolina coach Frank Martin said. "If the NIT invites us and we sign the paperwork, we'll go. Outside of that, we'll stay home."

RAZORBACKS CHARITY

Arkansas led 36-28 at halftime thanks to its performance at the free throw line, where it hit 14 of 15 in the half. The Razorbacks entered the game 12th in the SEC in freethrow percentage (67 percent), but they continued to shoot the ball well from the line in the second half — finishing 23 of 26 (88.5 percent) overall in the win. Daryl Macon scored 12 points and hit 8 of 8 free throws for the Razorbacks, including two in the final minute that helped seal the win. "We made free throws," Arkansas coach Mike Anderson said. "We've been shooting not very good this year, but when it counted we were pretty good tonight."

BIG PICTURE

South Carolina: The loss puts an end to any hopes South Carolina had of returning to the NCAA Tournament, where it reached the school's first Final Four a year ago. After trailing by as many as 15 points in the second half, the Gamecocks rallied and closed Arkansas' lead to two points several times in the closing minutes. However, they were unable to overcome a 38.3-percent (23 of 60) effort from the field - similar to the 41.2 percent South Carolina shot in a loss at Arkansas on Feb. 7.

Arkansas: Sophomore Adrio Bailey started at power forward on Thursday night for Arkansas in place of Dustin Thomas, who was kicked off the team earlier this week for violating team rules. The 6-foot-7 Bailey was undersized against South Carolina's frontcourt for much of the night, but he scored nine points and had three steals and two blocks in 24 minutes — including a powerful dunk early in the second half. "I thought (Bailey) played like a warrior, and that's what we've been looking for," Anderson said.

Jaylen Barford scored 13 of his 17 points in the second half to lead the Razorbacks to win No. 22 of year. Arkansas advances to Florida tomorrow night approximately 8:30 p.m.

Daryl Macon added 12 points despite a 2 of 10 night from the floor, and Darious Hall and Adrio Bailey chipped in nine big points apiece. Maik Kotsar and Chris Silva each scored 15 for the Gamecocks.

Arkansas' defense held South Carolina to 1 of 10 from the floor over the final 6:37 of the game.

Arkansas 61, South Carolina 57 - 3:59 left

Adrio Bailey knocked down a free throw line jumper, pushing him to nine points. It's the most he's scored in a game since adding 10 against Mississippi State on Jan. 2. He's been great tonight. He's going to be the guys at the 4 going forward you would think.

South Carolina does not have a make from the floor in more than three minutes. This is going to be a big defensive stretch for the Razorbacks. The Gamecocks are not going to go down easily.

Arkansas 56, South Carolina 53 - 7:36 left

The Gamecocks have turned the ball over 17 times tonight but finds itself within a score of tying the game behind an 11-2 run.

Arkansas' bench, aside from Darious Hall, has not provided a whole lot offensively, but Adrio Bailey is a +17 tonight (6 points, 4 rebounds). That's what Arkansas needed tonight from him.

Arkansas 52, South Carolina 39 - 11:42 left

The Gamecocks battled back to within 10 points, but Jaylen Barford knocked down a filthy stepback 3 from the left wing. He's got eight in the second half and 12 for the game. He's cooking.

Trey Thompson continues to impress as a passing big. He just hit Darious Hall for a bucket after a nice cut to the rim. Good finish from Hall as well. He has nine for the game.

Arkansas 47, South Carolina 32 - 15:59 left

Jaylen Barford has five points early in the second half after a quiet first half. Daniel Gafford also has a pair of scores since the break and Adrio Bailey has a bucket.

Bailey has been really solid tonight. He's a guy I figured would step up in place of Dustin Thomas. Arkansas has five guys with 6+ points. Again, contributions all around will be huge for Arkansas in postseason play.

This is Arkansas' largest lead of the night.

Arkansas 36. South Carolina 28 - Half



Daryl Macon leads all scorers with eight points and Darious Hall has seven off the bench. The Razorbacks ended the first half on a 10-2 run after the Gamecocks knotted the game at 26 at the under 4 timeout.

Adrio Bailey had a solid half, scoring four points from the free throw line and grabbing three rebounds. Six Razorbacks have at least four points, and that balance has been nice considering Jaylen Barford was pretty quiet in the first half.

Arkansas beats South Carolina, and that's all that matters at SEC **Tournament**

South Carolina just isn't very good. Arkansas needed to put away a lesser, but feisty, Gamecocks team and simply advance. How the Razorbacks did it was irrelevant. Winning is all that matters from here on out.

Good thing, too, because the game was tiring. Not in an up-and-down, excitable kind of way, either. Boring. Unattractive. South Carolina does that to teams. That's how it wins

No such luck for Frank Martin's boys on Thursday. Arkansas booted South Carolina from the SEC Tournament 69-64 in the final game of the round. The Gamecocks won't be headed to the NCAA Tournament although the NIT is a possibility - while Arkansas does the old cliched "live to play another day."

Some absolutely mind-numbing basketball late in the first half helped ruin South Carolina's upset bid. Although Arkansas tried like crazy to give the Gamecocks every chance.

With about 12 minutes left, the Razorbacks were comfortable. They led by 15 points. Life was smooth. Then they stopped rebounding, stopped making shots and stopped stopping South Carolina. At the under-8 timeout, that 15-point lead had turned into a 3-point lead. It was down to 2 points after Chris Silva made 2 free throws coming out of the under-4 minute timeout.

After that, simply put, Jaylen Barford took over.

He buried a 3-pointer, a prayer, to build the lead back to 5 points. The Razorbacks responded with a stop, which included a blocked shot and a turnover, and Barford went to the other end and followed with a lay-up. Seven points felt far more comfortable than 2.

Barford finished with 17 points, leading the team. The first-team All-SEC pick had just 4 points at halftime.

South Carolina built its own hole, really. The game was tied with less than 4 minutes left in the opening half. The Gamecocks kept surviving Arkansas salvos. They would be down 8, then 2, then 8, then 3, then 8, then tied. Not precisely those totals, but the game had that feel, like Arkansas was going to put South Carolina away then the underdog would pull back.

Those final 4 minutes, though, were atrocious. There was no pulling back from them. Arkansas didn't even make a field goal in those final 4 minutes and still turned a tied game into an 8-point halftime lead. South Carolina players were too handsy. Arkansas built its 36-28 advantage by going 14 of 15 from the free-throw line in the first half. Eight of those came in that flurry.

Apparently the Gamecocks decided in the second half to stop touching, too, because four of Arkansas' first five buckets came on a lay-in, a dunk and two more lay-ins. Easy as you like. The lead built to 14 points less than 4 minutes into the half before South Carolina's rally in the middle part of the second half.

The highlight

Thank heavens for free throws. Guard Daryl Macon is one of the best in college basketball and his teammates helped on a night Arkansas needed all of them. The team went 23 of 26 from the line overall. They entered the game 12th in the SEC in free-throw percentage at .690.

The lowlight

Rebounding is a serious, serious problem. South Carolina outrebounded Arkansas 22-9 in the second half.

What's next for Arkansas?

Arkansas gets another shot at Natural State native KeVaughn Allen and the third-seeded Florida Gators in the SEC quarterfinals. Florida won the teams' first meeting by 15 points in January.



Razorbacks survive droughts, hear hog calls

ST. LOUIS -- Normally, the one consistent at the SEC Tournament is that Kentucky is going to have the most fans, not only at their games but at all the sessions.

They get their money's worth, but Thursday night there were only a few dozen Wildcat fans. When the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville fans did a hog call, it could be heard

And there seemed to be more Razorback fans than in recent years, and they were especially loud when the Hogs went on a run, like they did to open the second half when they converted South Carolina turnovers into seven points and jumped out to a 47-32 lead after Jaylen Barford converted a three-point play.

South Carolina scratched and clawed to get back to 47-37, then used three consecutive three-pointers to pull within 56-53 with 8:07 to play as the Gamecocks outrebounded the Hogs 15-4 to start the second half.

If not for free throws, which the Hogs made 20 of their first 22 to grab a 59-56 with 6:33 to play, the Razorbacks would have been out of it midway through the second half.

No doubt there seemed to be too many whistles on both ends of the court, but the foul differential was not as great as the free throws.

With 3:59 left, the Hogs held a 61-59 advantage, but with one second on the shot clock Barford hit a 26-footer then got a steal and a layup -- those were sandwiched by a big blocked shot by Daniel Gafford -- for a 66-59 lead that slipped to 66-62 with 1:58 to go.

At that point, South Carolina had twice as many threes and Arkansas was struggling in its half-court offense, but Daryl Macon made two free throws -- he was 8 of 8 for the night -- and South Carolina missed a shot. Anton Beard was fouled, made one, and with 13.6 seconds left the Razorbacks had a 69-64 lead.

Tonight they will face the Florida Gators, and if they hope to play Saturday they will have to be more consistent on offense and hit the boards harder. The Hogs were outrebounded in the second half 24-9.

The game started oddly. The Gamecocks obviously were a little tired playing their second game in 24 hours, and Ole Miss stretched them to their limit before falling 85-84. The fatigue really showed up in the second half as Mike Anderson pushed South Carolina almost from start to finish.

At one time, South Carolina had five turnovers and only two field goals, but the Razorbacks led by only five. The Gamecocks had no limits -- they could miss inside and out and even from the free-throw line, where they were 2-7 in the first half, including missing the front end of a one-and-one and all three after a foul on a three point shot

In less than two minutes that changed, at least momentarily.

Arkansas missed three consecutive shots and got no rebounds, and South Carolina hit three consecutive three-pointers to tie it at 26-26 with 4:07 to play.

The Razorbacks wouldn't score another field goal in the half, getting only three shots, but they went into intermission with a 36-28 lead as they made 10 consecutive free throws, including four on one possession when South Carolina head Coach Frank Martin got a technical foul after Adrio Bailey had made the first of two free throws.

Macon stepped in and nailed the technical free throws, and Bailey made another. All the Gamecocks could manage was one field goal on seven shots to close the half.

Saying they had cold spells would be like saying St. Louis is a great baseball town, but maybe not so much basketball, as attendance was sparse and it wasn't just the Big Blue staying away.



Hogs hold on, face Gators next

ST. LOUIS -- The Arkansas Razorbacks will get a shot to beat Florida tonight.

It's been awhile.

The Razorbacks will look to break an eightgame losing streak against the Gators that spans five years when the teams play tonight in the SEC Tournament quarterfinals.

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (22-10) advanced to play the Gators by beating South Carolina 69-64 Thursday night at the Scottrade Center before an announced crowd of 11,752.

Arkansas last beat Florida on Feb. 5, 2013, when the Razorbacks upset the No. 2 Gators 80-69 in Walton Arena.

"It would be awesome to break that streak," said senior guard Jaylen Barford, who led the Razorbacks with 17 points against South Carolina.

Senior guard Daryl Macon, who had 12 points, 4 rebounds and 4 assists for the Razorbacks, said he didn't realize Arkansas had lost eight in a row to the Gators.

Barford and Macon, both junior-college transfers, are 0-3 against Florida, including the Gators' 88-73 victory earlier this season at the O'Connell Center.

"It's going to be an uptempo game," Macon said of tonight's matchup. "They try to get up and down the floor like we did. We've just got to execute and get multiple stops and stay together."

Senior forward Chris Silva led South Carolina (16-16) with 15 points and 11 rebounds. Sophomore forward Maik Kotsar scored 15 points and senior guard Frank Booker 11.

Barford scored five consecutive points to push the Razorbacks' lead from 61-59 to 66-59 with 2:52 left.

The shot clock was about to expire when Barford hit a three-pointer from about 26 feet to make it 64-59.

"I shoot every day, but I guess it was kind of a H-O-R-S-E shot," Barford said. "I knew it was good when it left my hands."

Barford stepped back to create just enough space to get the shot off over Booker.

"He sat back a little bit," Barford said. "So I shot it while the clock was running down."

Barford followed the three-pointer by making a steal and scoring on a breakaway layup.

"He's supposed to make big plays," Arkansas Coach Mike Anderson said. "He's a tremendous player, and he seized the opportunity."

Silva hit two free throws to pull South Carolina within 66-64 with 1:11 left.

Macon was fouled on a rebound attempt and hit two free throws to make it 68-64 with 39.1 seconds left

After Hassani Gravett missed a three-point attempt, senior guard Anton Beard was fouled and hit 1 of 2 free throws with 13.6 seconds for a 69-64 Arkansas lead.

South Carolina missed three shots on its final possession.

"Our guys hung in there and found a way to finish the game off," Anderson said. "Our guys showed some resilience, some resolve with defensive stops and making free throws."

Arkansas 6-6 sophomore forward Adrio Bailey started in place of Dustin Thomas -who was dismissed by Anderson on Monday for an undisclosed violation of team rules -- and had 9 points, 4 rebounds and 3 steals.

"I thought Adrio played like a warrior," Anderson said. "The opportunity presented itself, and I think he's taking advantage of that. He knows what's needed on this basketball team, the mentality."

Freshman forward Darious Hall scored nine points off the bench for Arkansas and hit 4 of 5 shots to break out of a slump. In the previous five games, he scored a combined eight points on 3-of-13 shooting.

"You can see he's oozing with potential," Anderson said.

Razorbacks freshman forward Daniel Gafford had 8 points, 4 rebounds and 4 blocked shots. Beard had 7 points, 5 assists, 4 rebounds and 3 steals.

Arkansas held off the Gamecocks by hitting 23 of 26 free throws.

"They've got a dynamic, high-powered team," South Carolina Coach Frank Martin said of the Razorbacks. "They've got hard shot-makers."

The Gamecocks had 19 turnovers Thursday after having 18 in their 81-65 loss at Arkansas on Feb. 6.

Arkansas outscored South Carolina 19-11 in points off of turnovers Thursday night and 26-11 in the teams' regular-season meeting.

Martin noted the Razorbacks' 10 steals Thursday night.

"Against Arkansas, that's a big problem," he said. "That's the difference in the game."

The Gamecocks outscored the Razorbacks 16-10 on second-chance points thanks to 18 offensive rebounds. South Carolina had a 42-29 overall rebounding advantage.

"Looking at the offensive rebounds we gave up, that's one stat I'm really disappointed in," Anderson said. "Florida doesn't have a lot of size, but those guys are very athletic."

Arkansas evened its SEC Tournament record at 25-25, including 3-2 against South Carolina and 1-4 against Florida.

The Razorbacks outscored South Carolina 11-4 to open the second half -- including dunks by Gafford and Bailey and Barford's three-point play on a driving basket and free throw -- to take a 47-32 lead with 16:18 left.

The Gamecocks pulled within 56-55 with 7:22 left on Kotsar's basket when Gafford was called for goal-tending.

Gafford scored inside and Bailey hit 1 of 2 throws for a 59-55 Arkansas lead.



Ugly basketball, thy name is Arkansas ... and who cares?

Arkansas doesn't want North Carolina again. No one wants North Carolina again. So, to ensure that they don't get the worst of bad luck yet again, the Razorbacks need to keep winning.

Doesn't matter how. Go all Al Davis. Just win.

Well, they did for a start at the SEC Tournament in St. Louis. Arkansas dispatched No. 11 seed South Carolina by five points, 69-64, to advance to the semifinals. It was not the most impressive of victories. Or even close to impressive. In fact, it was somewhat troubling given the improbably high free-throw percentage and terrible rebounding that went with Arkansas' play.

But a win it was. As such, Arkansas kept itself alive for a 6 seed when the NCAA Tournament draw is announced Sunday. Right now, most brackets have Arkansas as a 7. That's less than ideal for avoiding UNC, as the Tar Heels are almost universally pegged as a 2. For those who may have forgotten, or simply didn't know, North Carolina has knocked Arkansas out of each of the Hogs' last three Big Dance appearances.

Even take North Carolina out of it for a minute. A 6 seed is a ton better than a 7. Sure, it's just one better (Spinal Tap joke, anyone?), but it makes a whale of a difference. The Nos. 7, 8, 9 and 10 seeds not only get comparable competition in the first round, they get a practically guaranteed matchup with one of the 10 best teams in the nation in the second round. The 6 seed gets a 3. Loads of upsets happen in the 6/3 game. Not quite as many in the 7/2 or 8/1.

To get it, though, Arkansas needs to keep winning or have someone just barely in front of it lose soon. It's going to be tougher against Florida than it was against a bad South Carolina team. But who knows. The way Arkansas finished its regular season, the Hogs showed they're capable of beating some of the best teams in the country.

ST. LOUIS - Arkansas was still basking in the glow of a second-round SEC Tournament win over South Carolina late Thursday night when longtime Razorbacks beat writer Bob Holt brought a wet blanket into the postgame news conference.

Florida (20-11) is up next for Arkansas (22-10) in the quarterfinals Friday (9:30 p.m. ET, SEC Network), and Holt correctly pointed out that the Hogs have lost eight straight and 13 of 14 over the last decade - against the Gators. Their last win in the series was in 2013 in Fayetteville.

"How do you feel about that?" Holt, one of the league's most curious and courteous media characters, asked players.

"Actually, I didn't know that," said senior guard Daryl Macon, who in an unrelated quirk has missed his last seven 3-point attempts but has made 14 consecutive free throws. "It would be great to break that losing streak. It would be our time to peak, I think."

Fellow senior guard Jaylen Barford, who scored 17 points in a 69-64 win over South Carolina, started to answer the question,

"First," Macon interrupted, "Bob, where do you get your stats? Like, you know everything."

It's true. Holt knows everything - at least about the Razorbacks. And he knows better than just about anyone how tall an order it will be for Arkansas to beat Florida, which rattled off wins over Auburn, Alabama and Kentucky to end the regular season.

"You said 0-8?" Barford asked Holt. "I think it would be awesome to break that streak, and I think we've got a great chance of doing it if we stay together and get stops and execute on the offensive end."

The Hogs lost their only meeting with the Gator this season, 88-73, in Gainesville on Feb. 17. but this Arkansas team looks different than that one. Mike Anderson's team has won seven of its last nine games wins over Texas A&M, Alabama and Auburn among them — and solidified its place in the NCAA Tournament.

The Gators are streaking, too, having beaten Auburn, Alabama and Kentucky consecutively to end the regular season.

"We had some games [against Florida] where we were right there," Hogs coach Mike Anderson said. "We had an overtime game at our place [in 2014]. We had one where we thought we had it won down there [1-point loss in 2015]. We're good teams that match up well with each other; for some reason, they make more plays than we do."

But Bob Holt already knew that, and so did

Lots of complaints echoed through the southeast as the SEC Basketball Tournament began this week in St. Louis. The city is about as Southern as ice hockey.

Arkansas, though, turns out kind of likes having the league's tournament in the Gateway to the West. Razorbacks fans were only outdone this week by Missouri, which is a two-hour drive away (if that), and the always-popular Kentucky. When Mizzou lost, it left Arkansas as the loudest remaining group, Kentucky or otherwise. And as they found out, the ninth time's a charm.

They were helpful in the Razorbacks' upset of third-seed Florida on Friday night. Arkansas guard Jaylen Barford took over in the second half in a 80-72 win, the Hogs' first against the Gators since February 2013. Florida had owned an eight-game winning streak in the series. It's the first Arkansas has beaten the Gators in the SEC Tournament since 1998. That was the only other time that's happened.

Until Friday.

The win over Florida, in and of itself, is small potatoes. What makes it most significant for six-seed Arkansas is that potentially helps get the Hogs better NCAA Tournament positioning. Mike Anderson's team was a consensus 7-seed when the day began. That would pit Arkansas against a top-10 team in the country in the second round, not even included the similarly-talented team the Razorbacks would have to play in the first round.

Florida's ice-cold stretches in the second half did them in. The biggest one came between the under-8 and under-4 timeouts. Arkansas went on a 12-0 run to build a 14-point lead with just 6:07 to play. Florida, during that stretch, missed five straight shots and hadn't even scored in more than four minutes.

Really the run was more 16-2 than 12-0. The game was tied with about 11 minutes before Florida fell off the planet and Barford took ownership.

Arkansas' senior guard, named first-team All-SEC earlier this week, scored a gamehigh 27 points. His 3-pointer with 6:58 left forced a timeout from Florida coach Mike White. The Gators tried to stop the bleeding, but by that point, it was too late to rally.

The win books Arkansas into the SEC semifinals for the third time in four seasons.

The highlight

Barford and Daniel Gafford. The senior scored his 27 points on 9 of 17 shooting. He also grabbed 10 rebounds. The freshman big man had 16 points and 12 rebounds for a double-double, too.

Really, though, while it's less sexy: rebounding. usually that stat is in the next section. But against Florida, the Hogs won the board battle, 42-28.

The lowlight

Not a whole lot. The assist-to-field goal ratio was a bit low (seven on 27 buckets) and bench points were down, but it was a complete game for the Razorbacks.

What's next for Arkansas?

Arkansas gets a rematch with Tennessee, the team it opened SEC play with this year. The Razorbacks won that game at Bud Walton Arena in December. Tip is at 3 p.m. ET.

No more Florida jinx: Barford, Gafford power Arkansas to semifinals

ST. LOUIS -- The Arkansas Razorbacks decided they'd had enough of losing to Florida and did something about it.

The Razorbacks beat the No. 23 Gators 80-72 Friday night in Scottrade Center in the SEC Tournament quarterfinals to end an eight-game losing streak to Florida.

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (23-10) advances to play Tennessee (24-7) in a semifinal game at 2:30 p.m. today.

Arkansas' last victory over the Gators had been five years ago, 80-69 on Feb. 5, 2013, in Coach Mike Anderson's second season with the Razorbacks.

"It was fun out there," said senior guard Jaylen Barford, who led Arkansas with 27 points and 10 rebounds. "We were into it defensively and offensively.

"I know the fans were excited, and we were excited and Coach was juiced. We wanted to win that game bad."

None of the current Razorbacks -- including five seniors -- had beaten Florida.

"From what I've been hearing, the excitement from the seniors, it was a real big win," said Arkansas 6-11 freshman Daniel Gafford, who had 16 points and 12 rebounds. "This was a win we really needed, so we just came out and handled our business."

Gafford punctuated the victory with a windmill dunk with 15 seconds left after catching a pass from senior guard Anton Beard.

"From the mouth of Arlando Cook, that was the icing on the cake from his perspective," said Gafford, referring to Arkansas' senior forward. "When Anton caught the ball, in my mind, I was pretty ready to throw it down. So I went ahead and windmilled it to put some flash on it."

Senior guard Daryl Macon scored 13 points for the Razorbacks and hit 4 of 4 free throws in the final 30 seconds. Beard scored 10 points.

Sophomore forward Keith Stone led the Gators (20-12) with 22 points, and senior guard Chris Chiozza had 16 points and 6 assists.

"I thought Arkansas was really good," Florida Coach Mike White said. "I thought they were the aggressor from the tip.

"I thought they got the majority of loose balls, pounded us on the glass, and we really struggled to string together consecutive stops versus a terrific, terrific offensive team.

"In addition, I thought they defended us at a high level, especially with their matchup zone."

Florida guard KeVaughn Allen, a junior from North Little Rock, had 11 points and shot 4

In Florida's 88-73 victory over Arkansas in the O'Connell Center on Jan. 17, Allen scored 28 points and hit 8 of 12 shots while junior Jalen Hudson scored 21. Hudson had six points on 2-of-9 shooting Friday night.

"Our guys did a good job of paying special attention to those guys," Anderson said of Allen and Hudson. "You're going to give up something to somebody, but you don't want those big scorers to go off.

"I thought from that standpoint we did a good job defensively being with those guys, so they're not having target practice out there."

Arkansas went on 20-4 run, including eight points from Barford and six from Macon, to take a 66-50 lead with 3:28 left after Florida had tied it 46-46 on Stone's three-pointer.

"I thought our guys were dialed in," Anderson said. "All of a sudden the defense triggered the offense, and before you know it, our guys got multiple stops and we really started attacking the basket and knocking down some shots."

Florida couldn't pull closer than seven points the rest of the game.

Arkansas outscored Florida 8-0 over the final 3:49 of the first half to take a 30-29 halftime.

Barford started the Razorbacks' run with a driving basket. Gafford then got a onehanded rebound dunk, Macon scored on a bank shot and Adrio Bailey scored on a layup with an assist from Gafford.

Gafford blocked a shot by Chiozza with a second left in the half to make sure Arkansas kept the lead.

It was the 40th consecutive victory for the Razorbacks when they led after the first half.

Anderson downplayed stopping the losing streak to Florida.

"It's the next game on the schedule, that's all I look at," he said. "It's Arkansas versus Florida.

"What has taken place last year, or earlier this year, they played well. They had our number. But it's the next game to get us to one of the goals we've talked about, and that's winning a conference championship."

Arkansas outrebounded Florida 43-28.

"Every game I say if we outrebound them, we win the game," Gafford said. "And that's what we did."

Arkansas is in the SEC Tournament semifinals for the 14th time, and second year in a row, since joining the conference for the 1991-1992 season.

Hogs' defense chomps down on Gators

ST. LOUIS -- The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville needed a live-or-die defensive effort to take out the No. 3 seed Florida Gators on Friday in the SEC Tournament.

It didn't happen right away for the No. 6 Razorbacks.

It took several minutes before Mike Anderson sent a reminder to his players that they are only as good as their defense. When he did, it became a sweaty, gasping defensive brawl.

Every shot was contested, and so was nearly every dribble. The shot clock reverberated as both teams ran out of time on big possessions.

With 7:56 to play, the Razorbacks led 55-48 and were showing no signs of playing their second game in 24 hours. They seemed to be growing stronger with every minute.

The Hogs' fun was just beginning as the 16-2 run continued and the lead swelled to 62-48 with 5:55 left, forcing Florida to take a much-needed timeout. The Gators seemed to have zero answers for what Arkansas was throwing at them on every possession.

Arkansas' defense was so tough that Florida couldn't buy a bucket at a discount hardware store.

They missed inside and out before finally getting a pair of free throws and then a three. But the Hogs were dominating everything, including the boards where Daniel Gafford produced a rim-ringing dunk with 3:25 to play. With 2:49 left and going into a timeout, the Hogs led 66-55.

Arkansas had nine more rebounds and was shooting 52 percent from the field in the second half, and the Gators were just 9 of 25 from the floor (36 percent). The Gators' dejected faces in that huddle hinted there was no magic to come.

Even head Coach Mike White was sitting, and not even a shot-clock violation on Arkansas with 2:28 to play seemed to help. Even though a three-point play with 2:18 left cut it to 66-58, the Hogs were not panicking.

Jaylen Barford scored -- he had 27 points -- and Florida put up an air ball, which kicked off the free-throw shooting contest.

The Hogs made enough free throws to survive 80-72 and advance to play No. 2 seed Tennessee at 2:30 p.m. today.

Arkansas trailed for the first 19:05, but with 4:51 to play in the first half the Gators hit a wall -- a big part of it because Arkansas' perimeter defense had stepped up big time after a slow start.

Florida hit 6 of its first 10 threes, but the Hogs went to work and the Gators missed their next 5 and got called for shot-clock violations three times.

The Razorbacks' offense feeds off its defense, seemingly gaining confidence with every stop and extra ego every time the shot clock went off. They outscored the Gators 8-0 in the last four minutes of the half and went into intermission leading 30-29.

At one point Florida was hitting 60 percent of its shots, but at the break it was down to 44 percent. While Arkansas was only 40 percent, the Hogs had seven more shots. That's what Mike Anderson likes: Field goals come from attempts.

Earlier Friday, Alabama and Auburn fans demonstrated they would show up if the two schools were playing a game of Minecraft. When No. 1 seed Auburn went down to No. 9 seed Alabama, there was a lot of that old burn.

The most exciting thing though, as Bama won going away 81-63, might have been after the game when Auburn head Coach Bruce Pearl and the Crimson Tide strength coach -- a hulking dude who wouldn't lose a fight with any basketball coach -- accidentally bumped into each other. Pearl lost his cool.

Not enough to confront the guy, as he ran his mouth while two older security guys led him off the court.

Sometimes it's a throwaway, lazy line to say a team ran out of gas and that's why it lost. In Arkansas' case, it's the truest way to state

Exhausted, though likely never to admit it, the Razorbacks' run toward an SEC Championship fell a game short. Tennessee, the league's 2-seed, blasted the Hogs, 84-66, in St. Louis' Scottrade Center to book a spot in the title game against Kentucky on Sunday. Arkansas, meanwhile, heads back to Fayetteville to wait on Selection Show for the NCAA Tournament.

No doubt Arkansas will be called Sunday evening. The question is where the Hogs will land. They were bumped up to a consensus 6-seed as of Saturday morning. Their win over Florida the day before being the biggest reason. And that's the preferred spot, too, the 6-. With that number next to its name, Arkansas avoids a similarly-talented 10-seed or, worse, an 8/9 game in the first round and then the 2-seed or 1- after that.

Losing might actually be helpful in that regard, although that, too, is something no one around the team would admit. Falling to Tennessee gives Arkansas an extra day's rest before the most important tournament. Given coach Mike Anderson dismissed a player who was getting about 20 minutes a game just this past week, the added day could be beneficial. Especially true when considering it was the exhaustion that was the biggest reason for the loss against the Volunteers.

Tennessee just stepped on Arkansas early. Three players scored in double figures by halftime. Jordan Bone hadn't missed a shot. The Vols shot 76 percent from the field in the opening 20 minutes. Arkansas was chasing the whole time, feet too slow.

A little flurry, an 8-0 run, in the early parts of the second half suggested Arkansas might make a game out of it yet. Trouble with that was the rally only turned it from a 19-point Tennessee lead to an 11-point Tennessee lead. The Vols hit a couple quick buckets in counter and more or less kept a lead in the teens most of the rest of the game.

Daryl Macon led Arkansas in scoring with 19 points. Jaylen Barford and Anton Beard added 14 and 11, respectively. Bone led five Vols players in double figures with 19.

The game was Arkansas' third in three days. A break of at least three days comes now as the team waits to find where it heads for the NCAA Tournament.

The highlight

Macon bounced back after a couple subpar games. Some had suggested he hit a wall. Doesn't look to be the case. Important, too, as Arkansas will need him next week.

The lowlight

No closeout. Tennessee made 11 3pointers as Arkansas was too slow to respond, not because the Hogs were terrible. They were just tired.

What's next for Arkansas?

Arkansas heads back to Fayetteville to watch the Selection Show just like everyone else. Depending where they head, the Hogs will play their first-round NCAA Tournament game on either Thursday or Friday of next



Loss to Tennessee doesn't uproot Arkansas' seed

Tennessee had an unbelievable first half, powering to a 48-29 lead and coasting home with an 84-66 win over the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville. The Vols now will face Kentucky for the SEC Tournament championship.

No excuses for the Razorbacks, who were coming off an emotional win over No. 3 seed Florida on Friday night, just 16 hours earlier. The matchup zone and man defense that baffled the Gators did nothing to the Volunteers.

The Vols were 19 of 25 on first-half field goals, 7 of 8 on threes, and the insideoutside attack was just too much for the Razorbacks to overcome, although they battled until the very end.

There was no doubt playing their third game in about 40 hours took its toll on the Hogs, but that's what happens when you don't beat Missouri on the road and drop from a No. 4 seed and a game on Friday to a No. 6 seed and playing on Thursday.

There is no perfect bracket for 14 teams and a five-day tournament, but playing back-to-back games at 8:40 p.m. and then coming back at 2:30 p.m. on the third day is hard.

Mostly, the Vols were just much better Saturday.

The good news for the Razorbacks is the loss shouldn't hurt their seeding when the NCAA Tournament bracket is announced today.

The Hogs started the day with an RPI of 27, and getting beat by the team that has the SEC's best RPI, 8, shouldn't hurt.

The NCAA says margin of victory doesn't matter, and the Hogs split with the Vols this season, so whatever seed the Hogs had Saturday should remain today.

The selection committee looks at many things, including how a team did against teams that are lumped by the RPI into quadrants 1 through 4.

Quadrant 1 is really three parts: home victories against teams in the Top 30 RPI; neutral site victories against teams in the Top 50; and road victories against teams in

the Top 70. Arkansas was 6-8 in quadrant 1 games.

The second quadrant is at home against RPI 31-75, neutral 51-100, and away victories over the RPI 76-135. Arkansas was 3-2 in that area.

While 9-10 against the first two quadrants, the Razorbacks were 14-1 against the third and fourth quadrants. The Hogs one loss outside the top two quadrants was the home setback against No. 91 LSU.

In the world of dot.com bracketology, the Hogs are a solid No. 6 seed today.

CBSsports.com has the Razorbacks traveling to Dallas (that works!!!) to play Loyola-Chicago, with the winner advancing to play the winner of Michigan and New Mexico.

That's not a great draw. Loyola-Chicago is coached by Porter Moser, who won 54 games in three years at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock from 2000-2003, and he has put together a team that was good enough to go to Florida and win earlier in the season.

ESPN.com has the Hogs traveling to Wichita (second best site for the Razorback Nation) to take on either Arizona State or Texas, which could pit two longtime Southwest Conference rivals.

Jerry Palm, CBSsports.com, and Joe Lunardi, ESPN.com, are both really good at predicting the bracket, especially the 68 teams that make the field, but they aren't perfect. Lunardi has changed his site for the Hogs at almost every meal.

But a 23-11 season and No. 27 RPI should bring the Razorbacks enough respect to get a regional game.

Palm and Lunardi both have the SEC getting eight teams in the field, which would be a new record by two teams, and that speaks well for the league. Just like the regular season, the SEC Tournament showed it isn't just a football league.



Vols scorch Hogs: Tennessee shoots 76 percent in first half, coasts

ST. LOUIS -- Tennessee's shooting cooled off considerably against the Arkansas Razorbacks in the second half of Saturday's SEC Tournament semifinal matchup.

Unfortunately for the Razorbacks, the Volunteers' shooting needed to go into arctic regions for Arkansas to overtake Tennessee.

The No. 13 Vols beat the Razorbacks 84-66 at Scottrade Center before an announced crowd of 18,729 after shooting 76 percent in the first half to build a 19-point lead.

Tennessee (25-7) advances to play Kentucky (23-10) in today's championship game after the Wildcats beat Alabama 86-63 in Saturday's first semifinal.

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville (23-11) will head home to await today's announcement about who and where the Razorbacks will open NCAA Tournament play.

"I don't think it's hit me yet that we're going to the [NCAA] Tournament because I wanted this one so much," said senior guard Daryl Macon, who led the Razorbacks with 19 points. "I wanted this tournament.

"Maybe when I see our named called [today], I might be a little excited. It's not hitting me yet."

Tennessee hit 19 of 26 shots, including 7 of 8 three-pointers, in taking a 48-29 halftime lead.

"We came out the first half and arguably played the best basketball we've played all vear." Vols Coach Rick Barnes said. "When we walked off the court at halftime. I said that I wished we could bottle that."

Arkansas senior guard Anton Beard said the Vols played like they wanted the game more than the Razorbacks.

"We didn't give them no resistance in the first half," said Beard, who had 11 points, 4 assists and 3 steals. "In the second half, we tried to change the narrative."

Tennessee opened the second half by shooting 1 of 7 -- including missed layups by forwards Kyle Alexander and Grant Williams

-- and Arkansas pulled within 53-42 on Beard's steal and layup with 15:24 left.

But the Razorbacks couldn't draw closer than 11 points the rest of the game, and the Vols pushed their lead to as many as 20 at

"I thought they were fresher, I thought they were crisper than we were," Arkansas Coach Mike Anderson said. "I thought they had more energy than we did."

Arkansas was playing its third game in three days after beating South Carolina 69-64 and No. 23 Florida 80-72.

It was the second SEC Tournament game for Tennessee, which opened with a 62-59 victory over Mississippi State on Friday night.

"I thought the toll of three days might have caught up with us," Anderson said. "But I love what took place in the second half.

"I thought our guys came out and showed a lot of fight, a lot of heart. They dug down real deep after being down 19 at halftime."

Tennessee sophomore point guard Jordan Bone hit a jump shot eight seconds into the game and stayed hot. He scored 19 points on 8 of 11 shots -- including 3 of 4 threepointers -- and had 4 assists with 1 turnover.

"I just think starting off the game we were really aggressive," Bone said. "It's really just playing within the offense.

"We were playing against a really good defensive team, but we were just getting to our spots and we were making shots."

Tennessee shot 9 of 24 in the second half but still finished at a season-high 57.1 percent (29 of 48). The Vols also shot a season-high 64.7 percent (11 of 17) on three-pointers.

"We didn't have any energy today," Macon said. "I think that's what cost us. We usually play with a lot of energy out there."

Junior forward Admiral Schofield had 16 points and 7 rebounds for the Vols while hitting 2 of 2 three-pointers. Williams, Alexander and James Daniel each added 12 points for the Vols.

Senior guard Jaylen Barford scored 14 points for the Razorbacks. Freshman forward Darious Hall had 11 points and 7 rebounds off the bench, and freshman forward Daniel Gafford had 8 points and 5 rebounds.

"They pretty much just picked us apart," Gafford said. "They got real hot, and we couldn't do anything about it in the first half. But we came out in the second half and played better."

Tennessee had an extra day of rest compared to the No. 6 seed Arkansas because the Vols were the Tournament's No. 2 seed after sharing the conference's regular-season title with Auburn.

"That's the blessing of a double bye," Schofield said. "That's why you compete as hard as you can in the regular season to get a higher seed."

Schofield said he couldn't discredit the Razorbacks, who beat the Vols 95-93 in overtime in Walton Arena on Dec. 30 to open SEC play.

"They're a great team, a very dangerous team if you let them get certain things going in the game that apply to their winning philosophy," he said. "We didn't allow that. We didn't turn the ball over or take bad shots leading to run outs and easy points in transition that eliminated a lot of their scoring."

The Razorbacks are set to make their second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance and third in four years.

"I'm feeling pretty good," Gafford said. "I just can't wait to see our name on the board so we can get ready to go play in another tournament.

"We've still got a lot more basketball left."

The Razorbacks have won 8 of their past 11 games with the losses to Kentucky, Missouri and Tennessee -- all teams projected to be in the NCAA Tournament.

"We're playing real good," Gafford said. "We've got our confidence going. We've just got to make sure we get the rest we need before we come out and play again."

Arkansas rallied from a 1-3 SEC start.

"I'm real, real proud of those guys and what they've done up to this point," Anderson said. "That ends this season. So now we move on to the next season."



UA draws Butler in NCAA opener

FAYETTEVILLE -- The Arkansas Razorbacks are opening NCAA Tournament play against a Big East opponent for the second consecutive year.

This time it's Butler.

The No. 7 seed Razorbacks (23-11) and No. 10 seed Bulldogs (20-13) play Friday in Detroit's Little Caesars Arena in a first-round East Regional game.

Tipoff is approximately 2:10 p.m. Central time with the game televised on truTV.

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville opened last year's NCAA Tournament by beating Seton Hall of the Big East 77-71 in Greenville, S.C.

The Arkansas-Butler winner will advance to play Sunday against the winner of No. 2 Purdue against No. 15 seed California State-Fullerton.

If the Razorbacks win two games in Detroit, they'll advance to the East Regional semifinals in Boston.

The NCAA Tournament selection committee decided to send the Razorbacks to Detroit - 885 miles north of Fayetteville -- rather than closer sites such as Dallas, Wichita, Kan., or Nashville, Tenn.

"Obviously, we'd like to have gotten a seed closer to home," Arkansas senior forward Trey Thompson said. "But I guess we've got to pack our coats and get ready for Michigan."

The Razorbacks have played Butler once previously, but it was 86 years ago.

Butler beat Arkansas 37-21 at home in Indianapolis during the 1931-32 season.

The Razorbacks are in the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive year, the third time in four years and the 32nd time overall.

"The one thing you always want to do is hear your name called," Arkansas Coach Mike Anderson said. "You're in one of the greatest sporting events there is, the NCAA Tournament.

"To me, that's going to be the given every year we play. That's the standard here at

Arkansas and always has been, and now we get the chance to play for a national championship.

"I know our guys are super, super excited about having a chance to play in this event and having a chance to play against an outstanding Butler team."

Butler 9-9 in the Big East this season, including a 101-93 victory over No. 1 Villanova on Dec. 30 at home and 67-66 in overtime over Ohio State at the Phil Knight Invitational in Portland, Ore.

The Bulldogs went 1-1 at the Big East Tournament in New York, where they beat Seton Hall 75-74 and lost to Villanova 87-68

"I've had the chance to watch them play a little bit," Anderson said of the Bulldogs. "I haven't really just studied them, but any team in this tournament is a very, very good basketball team."

Butler is led by 6-7 senior forward Kelan Martin, who averages 20.8 points and 6.2 rebounds. Kamar Baldwin, a 6-1 sophomore guard, is averaging 15.5 points and 4.8 rebounds.

The Bulldogs are averaging 79.2 points and have a plus-3.0 turnover margin and a plus-1.3 rebounding advantage over their opponents.

"They have multiple guys that can score," Anderson said. "Their bigs can step out and shoot the basketball. Defensively, they do a really good job of contesting three-point shots.

"They rebound the basketball well. Fundamentally, they do a lot of great things ... But more importantly I'm worried about what we do.

"Obviously, we love the up-tempo. So for the fans, you get two teams that like to score. I think the fans are the winner."

Razorbacks guard Anton Beard, a senior from North Little Rock, already has some fans in Detroit.

"I've actually got family in Detroit," Beard said. "My dad's side of the family is from Detroit. I'm actually going home."

Butler will be the 12th NCAA Tournament team Arkansas plays this season. The Razorbacks are 8-8 against 11 teams in the field with victories over Alabama, Auburn, Bucknell, Florida, Missouri, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Texas A&M and losses to Auburn, Florida, Houston, Kentucky,

Missouri, North Carolina, Tennessee and Texas A&M

Butler is led by first-year Coach LaVall Jordan, a former player and assistant coach for the Bulldogs.

The Bulldogs are making their fourth consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance and 10th in the last 12 years. They didn't make the NCAA Tournament in 2012 and 2014.

The matchups are too preferable.

Butler is on the downward trend. The Bulldogs lost three of four and six of nine to end the season. Part of that, granted, is playing in the Big East. Two conferences were better than the SEC in basketball this year and one of them was the Big East. It's a slog. Teams at the bottom are not as good as the SEC's, but the top and middle are just as good. Better, in fact, in the former. They're experienced, too, having gone to the Sweet 16 last season and falling to the same team that knocked out Arkansas the game before: North Carolina.

The game will be close. The 7/10 games almost always are. Arkansas could, in fact, lose. But the Hogs should be the favored team and advance to meet Purdue.

As for the why of picking the Razorbacks over the Boilermakers? Well, gut. The team I saw over the last two weeks is not the team. I saw in December. It's not the team I banked on seeing in October when I did, in fact, pick it for 19 wins.

Arkansas has flaws. Arkansas can disappear for stretches. But this team just looks different.



Arkansas basketball 2018 NCAA Tournament: 7-seed Hogs get Butler in Detroit

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. — The Arkansas basketball team has learned their seed, destination and opponent for the NCAA Tournament.

Arkansas was announced Sunday evening as the 7-seed in the East Region. The Razorbacks will play 10-seed Butler in Detroit, Michigan Winner of that first-round game will get the winner of 2-seed Purdue and 15-seed Cal State-Fullerton.

The NCAA Tournament appearance is the third in four years for Arkansas under coach Mike Anderson. Or, as his critics note, it's the third in seven years. The former way is more appropriate.

Arkansas (23-11) has seen a resurgence in recent years. Those three of four years have been best the Razorbacks have had since the retirement of Nolan Richardson. In fact, Anderson is the first Arkansas coach to take the Hogs to the Dance three times in a tenure since his old boss did it four straight times (1997-98 to 2000-2001).

Arkansas will bring plenty of honored players to the Dance. That is, the Hogs have three on the roster who made All-SEC or All-Freshman status in the league. Senior guard Jaylen Barford was on the first-team after averaging a team-high 18 points per game and hitting a team-high 85 3-pointers. Backcourt mate Daryl Macon was a second-team player after his 16.9 PPG season. Macon also led the team with 134 assists and made 84 3s

The Razorbacks' run into the tournament may depend on a freshman, though. Big man Daniel Gafford, a potential NBA Draft lottery pick this summer, averaged 11.9 points and 6.2 rebounds this year. Over his last five, he's been even better, scoring almost 14 a game and playing his best basketball. Few teams can match him offensively in the paint.

The SEC had eight teams qualify for the NCAA Tournament. That's the most in conference history. Arkansas finished sixth in the regular-season standings and made the semifinals of the SEC Tournament this week.

TV coverage and tip time for the game will be announced at a later time.

TT: Postseason play is very physical. We have 3 days to prepare for what they do and just be ready to play.

-Anderson said he hasn't watched Butler play a lot, just a few times, but he knows its a dangerous team. "Our mindset is just to go in and go after the first game."

-I thought we played one of the more difficult schedules and our guys performed well. Like most teams, we want to be close to home but Arkansas fans will travel up there. Anderson has family in Detroit and says he's hoping to get to see them.

-Anderson said Arkansas took today off and will get back to practice tomorrow. They'll travel on Wednesday, have meetings on Thursday then play on Friday. Playing on Friday is beneficial for Arkansas, he said.

-Some young guys can get overwhelmed and we saw that this week at the SEC Tournament. They had some nerves and jitters going. The experience Jaylen, Adrio and Daryl got last year is valuable.

-It's one thing to make the NCAA Tournament and just be happy to be there. "I'm not in that mode. My goal is to win a championship."

-The bench guys were very instrumental in both wins in St. Louis. Arlando Cook, defensively, was probably the best option at the 4. Darious Hall played some of his best ball of the season as well. They dug real deep in the second half to try to climb back after the break.

-Arkansas was 8-8 against NCAA Anderson Tournament teams. said Mississippi State very well could have been the ninth SEC team in the field.

-Butler is a very good basketball team, they have big-time scorers and have some bigs that can step out and shoot the ball. Every team in this tournament is good. When you get two teams that like to really score it's a treat for the fans.



Anderson: Hogs 'knocking on the door' of championship

FAYETTEVILLE — Mike Anderson has finally returned Arkansas to being a regular of sorts in the postseason, having reached the NCAA Tournament in two of the last three years.

Now the Razorbacks coach is ready to do more than just make the field.

He's ready for Arkansas to reassert itself as one of the premier programs in the Southeastern Conference — and he just might have the team to do exactly that this season.

"I still want to win a championship, that's who I am," Anderson said. "We're knocking on the door, we've just got to keep going forward and getting better."

The Razorbacks finished 26-10 last season and lost to eventual national champion North Carolina in the second round of the NCAA Tournament. They reached the postseason thanks to a late surge that featured eight wins in nine games and a berth in the SEC Tournament championship game, and they enter this year with two of the key cogs in that success back in the fold.

Guards Jaylen Barford and Daryl Macon both stayed at Arkansas this offseason after briefly entering the NBA draft to have their professional prospects evaluated.

The duo combined for 26.2 points per game a year ago in their first year after transferring from junior college, and they're full of confidence entering their second year of major college basketball.

"I feel like we have some of the most experienced guards in the country, and some of the best guards in the country," Barford said. "It's a strong point for us and the team."

Some things to watch as Arkansas tries to reach the NCAA Tournament for a third time in four seasons:

GIFTED GAFFORD

With center Moses Kingsley gone after graduating, Arkansas will turn to 6-foot-11 freshman Daniel Gafford. The talented center has shown an ability to finish with force close to the basket in practice and he had eight points and seven rebounds in 15 minutes during the team's preseason opener last week.

"If it's any indication from what's taken place throughout the summer and what's taking place in practice right now, he will impact our team," Anderson said.

BEARD'S LEAD

Anderson expects guard Anton Beard to play a pivotal role this season alongside Barford and Macon. Beard missed the first semester two years ago after an arrest on forgery charges, but he played well in a full season a year ago — averaging 7.2 points while playing in all 36 games. The senior lost 15 pounds during the offseason and has his sights set on returning to the form that earned him a spot on the All-SEC freshman team three years ago.

SUSPENDED COOK

Forward Arlando Cook has been suspended indefinitely to begin the season after being arrested on accusations of first-degree assault, public intoxication and disorderly conduct. The 6-foot-8 forward averaged 2.8 points and 2.3 rebounds per game last season after transferring from junior college. "We're going to let the law take its course, and then we'll go from there and I'll be able to make my decision about what takes place," Anderson said.

BREAKOUT JONES

C.J. Jones didn't see much action a year ago as a freshman, totaling only 126 minutes and averaging 2.6 points in 21 games. However, the 6-foot-5 sophomore is being counted on to fill the 3-point shooting void left by the graduation of sharpshooter Dusty Hannahs. Jones hit half of his 24 3-point shots a year ago, and Anderson needs him to improve defensively.

GARLAND'S HEALTH

Standout freshman Khalil Garland will miss the start of the season with an undisclosed health condition, but Anderson is optimistic the 6-foot-5 guard will be cleared to return to the court at a later date. Garland averaged 12.9 points as a senior in high school at Little Rock Parkview.

Mike Anderson, Arkansas ahead of trends

FAYETTEVILLE — T.J. Cleveland holds the ball at the top of the key as guards Daryl Macon and Jaylen Barford crisscross each other at the 3-point line and cut off the Arkansas assistant to each wing.

When Cleveland hits Barford with a pass on the wing, the senior dribbles toward the corner and throws a skip pass to Macon in the opposite corner for a 3-pointer.

Rinse and repeat, with two more players stepping up for their turn. The off-ball action is one of several movements Cleveland drills during practices as he works to drive home the motion tenets of Mike Anderson's offense.

Split cuts, the action described above, are also a favorite of the defending NBA champion Golden State Warriors, who like to use them with Stephen Curry and Klay Thompson whirring around a big like Draymond Green.

"I watched a couple Golden State YouTube videos and they move the ball just like we do, kind of run similar stuff," Barford said.

Arkansas, of course, doesn't have Curry or Thompson, two of the best shooters of alltime. Ditto for Green, an incredible passer who doubles as a perennial defensive player of the year candidate.

But Golden State coach Steve Kerr's flow offense incorporates a lot of motion elements similar to what Anderson and his staff preach in Fayetteville.

Pushing the pace is prioritized. It's easier to score against a defense that isn't set. Arkansas ranked in the top 10 percent in the nation in offensive pace last year, averaging a zippy 15.7 seconds per possession. In the halfcourt, cutting, screening, passing and moving without the ball are championed. High IQ, team-first players are valued.

Seemingly everyone wants to play like the Warriors these days. Anderson's teams have aimed to play that brand of ball his entire coaching career.

"That's something we use in recruiting because our offenses are similar," Cleveland said. "It's very similar to that. When people look at the way we play and how it translates (to the NBA), that's the way a lot of people are going now."

The results have been hard to argue with throughout Anderson's coaching career. In 16 years, his teams have ranked in the top 80 nationally, essentially the 75th percentile or better, in offensive rating on 12 occasions. Six of his 11 teams since he took the Missouri job have had top-46 offenses, which is akin to being in the 87th percentile or better.

Sure, part of that is the result of Arkansas getting out and running, pushing the tempo. But the Razorbacks also fared well in the halfcourt under Anderson once he stocked the roster with players he recruited, ranking in the 70th percentile or better in 2015 and 2017. The Hogs won 27 games in 2015 and 26 last season, the two highest win totals the program has enjoyed since a repeat trip to the national title game in 1995.

Like Kerr, who only calls set pieces from the bench about 15 to 20 percent of the time, Anderson encourages player freedom and pace over slowing the tempo and hollering out a different play each trip up the floor.

Of course, Arkansas has sets like every team, employing popular actions like floppy and Horns at times. But most possessions are unscripted, with the core motion philosophies dictating the correct basketball play as the players read and react to the defense.

Anderson empowers players to shoot their shots and doesn't pigeonhole guys into playing within what may be outdated archetypes for guards, forwards or centers.

The Razorbacks, like many NBA teams, want to play positionless basketball. Rather than searching for the point guard to hit with an outlet pass, anyone who can handle the ball has the green light to bring the ball up the court.

"Guys who have aspirations of playing at the next level (will say) 'How does how you guys play translate?' And you can look at the Golden State Warriors and you can look at the Boston Celtics and there's a number of other teams that play that way also," Cleveland said. "Atlanta Hawks when they were really good, they played the same way with coach (Mike Budenholzer). That's something we use. We like to recruit basketball players. We don't want to give them numbers."

Arkansas' offense was often at its best last year with 6-foot-9, 260-pound center Trey Thompson in the game and working as the de facto point guard, operating in the high post and either hitting cutters backdoor or using his screening ability to free guards with dribble handoffs.

With Thompson on the floor, Arkansas averaged 126.2 points per possession. To put it in perspective, Oklahoma State led the nation on the team level with a 126 offensive

"Trey's a very intelligent basketball player," Anderson said. "His basketball IQ is so important, he's like a coach out on the floor. ... It's important when you've got a guy that skilled that can do those type of things."

When Arkansas is in sync, whether by pushing the pace (they ranked 33rd nationally in offensive pace last season) or in the halfcourt with all five players bought in and working in unison, the result can be pretty basketball, the kind difficult for defenses to guard.

"We get the freedom to cut, screen, feed off each other and make each other better," Barford said. "That ball gets swung to the open side, make a play. That's just how we play, play free."

Anderson has long preferred a smaller, more skilled player at the 4, dating back to his days at Missouri when DeMarre Carroll, now an NBA veteran small forward, manned the position. That used to be an outlier, with most teams preferring to operate with two traditional bigs.

Not anymore. With the rise of small ball, more and more teams are sliding players up a position or two and trying to put as much skill on the floor as possible, prioritizing players who can shoot and pass over lowpost brutes who post up with middling efficiency.

"Everybody's trying to do it," Cleveland said. "Hey, we were ahead of the curve."

The obvious caveat with motion is the onus falls on all five players to move, cut, screen and ping the the ball around while reacting to the defense appropriately. The scheme loses it's effectiveness when players stand around or pound the rock and isolate.

Last year, the Razorbacks had plenty of offensive talent capable of scoring one-onone. As a result, ball movement and crisp action sometimes suffered.

Barford and Macon arrived on campus after being the go-to guys at their respective junior colleges. Both players possess great one-on-one ability and can create their own shot with ease, which meant learning the importance of moving without the ball and making the extra pass took time to sink in. There were stretches of stagnant offense and poor spacing as they and the rest of an overhauled roster learned each other and what was expected.



"Where they came from, they were the man," Cleveland said. "They had the ball probably 85, 90 percent of the time and were looking to score. Here, it's a different kind of offense. There's going to be times where you're going to have to move without the ball because people are going to guard you, especially those two guys."

But Arkansas adjusted and got better late in the year, winning nine of 12 games down the stretch as the roster began to gel and get the system. Seeing the benefits of sprinting hard off a pindown screen or backcutting and getting an easy layup off a slick Thompson dish encouraged buy-in.

"I think it was just the trusting part, for me and Daryl, coming from junior college and having the ball in our hand most of the time," Barford said. "Learning how to trust each other and trust our teammates helped out a lot."

Barford and Macon each possess well-rounded skill sets, something Arkansas targets in recruiting. The Razorbacks prizes versatility, targeting players with the ability to check a lot of boxes. Class of 2018 wing commit Jordan Phillips is a prime example, a 6-7 wing who can handle like a guard, has good vision, can shoot and get to the rim.

His frame means he could feasibly play 1 through 4 in Anderson's system in time. In truth, the positional numbers refer more to who players guard on the defensive end than their role on offense.

Everyone has the freedom to make plays in a fast, up-tempo system that, when executed correctly, is precisely how modern basketball is trending.

Don't expect Cleveland and company to stop using the Warriors pitch anytime soon.

"We run the offense minus the players," Cleveland said.

While no one is going to compare Barford and Macon to Steph and Klay, Arkansas' duo is arguably the best backcourt in the SEC.

In year two in Fayetteville and in the system, they could be even scarier for defenses to face.



24 predictions for Arkansas' 2017-18 basketball season

FAYETTEVILLE - Arkansas opens its basketball season Friday against Samford. Here are 24 predictions about the upcoming

Daryl Macon will finish in the top five in the SEC in scoring

The senior guard averaged 13.4 points per game on a loaded offensive team last year and did so with incredible efficiency — his 62.6 true shooting percentage ranks second in the SEC among returning guards. Even if, likely when, his efficiency dips a bit with the expanded workload, he is going to rack up the points. Last season, he attempted less than 10 shots in 23 of 36 games. This year, with more of a scoring burden, he may need to put up 12, at the very least, a game. When he did that last year, he averaged 24.5, which brings me to my next prediction.

Macon will score 20 or more in at least 12 games

He's going to go off for some big nights. He only had three of these games last year, but will have the ultimate green light. He doesn't have a weakness in his offensive game. He can shoot it with range, shoot off the dribble, break down the defense, score off floaters and pull-ups, finish around the rim over size and create plays for teammates. That last part will be important, too, but Macon is going to get buckets.

Jaylen Barford will lead the team in assists and average at least 3.5 per game

Part of Barford's NBA feedback focused on improving his decision-making basketball IQ. Last year, his 11 field goal attempts per game led the team and he didn't always do a good job taking advantage of the defensive attention he drew on his rampages into the lane. Walking the line between scorer and creator will be important for him and Macon, because those two can't outscore teams by themselves. They know that. Barford only hit the four-assist mark five times last year. With the ball in his hands more and not as much playmaking around him, he may need to triple that this season.

Barford will shoot at least 33 percent from 3-point range

This was the other part of his game he was told to improve after shooting just 26.6 percent from range a year ago. His 75.2 free throw percentage is encouraging, but his perimeter shooting was dragged down by hitting just 4 of 30 jumpers in the final four seconds of the shot clock. Natural improvement along with helping get the offense into better shots quicker could lead to a sizable jump. Small sample size alert: Barford went 7 of 13 from deep in the Red-White game and two exhibition wins.

Anton Beard will finish third on the team in scoring

Sophomore guard C.J. Jones or freshman center Daniel Gafford are trendy picks, but Beard is going to have the ball in his hands a lot. Aside from Barford and Macon, he is the only other guard comfortable handling it. He's at his best when he mixes in playmaking and will need to be more efficient than he has been to this point in his career, but he's going to get up plenty of

Jones will finish second on the team in made 3-pointers

Macon will take and make the most 3s. easily. Barford and Beard may challenge Jones for second-most attempts, but the sophomore is the best shooter of the trio. His ability to space the floor effectively and play off of others will be big. He shouldn't be expected to replace all of Dusty Hannahs' production, but he does need to replace some of the perimeter shooting void left by the new member of the Memphis Hustle. Jones is the kind of player who can get hot and produce offensive outbursts when he's feeling it. Arkansas has to hope that's often.

Arkansas will win 75 percent of games in which Dustin Thomas has at least three assists

Arkansas was 6-0 in these games last year. Thomas is a skilled passer with a good feel for the game — when he's not trying to post up. Having him operate on the perimeter and be more of a playmaker this year will be important, because he should theoretically be able to take advantage of mismatches. The Razorbacks are a bit limited on primary ballhandlers, but Thomas and Trey Thompson's passing ability can help make up for that a bit.

Thomas will start the majority of the games at the 4

This is with factoring in what could be a three-game suspension to start the season. Thomas was much better as a starter last year and keeping him in that spot allows Adrio Bailey to play the role of energizer bunny off the bench, using his athleticism and motor to inject life and tempo into the game.

One of Bailey and Daniel Gafford will shoot less than 50 percent from the foul

Bailey continued to work on his shot diligently in the offseason and the form is smoother, without the hitch he had a year ago, but his shot is still a work in progress. He made just 6 of 19 at the line last year and was 2 of 7 in the Red-White game and first exhibition. Gafford was a poor foul shooter in high school, making just 53 percent as a senior. He began working to expand his range when he arrived on campus, but has a ways to go.

Darious Hall will start at least half of the games

This is a semi-bold prognostication because he's competing with two other players (Beard and Jones) to share the third backcourt spot next to Barford and Macon. Hall won't score like the other two, but brings a lot of other stuff to the table, namely defense, length and rebounding. Perhaps that fits well next to the two stars. He's also a smart passer and should be a threat in transition. He could in time grow into the stopper role Manny Watkins embraced, but is much more physically gifted than Watkins. Anderson has been very complimentary of him.

Arkansas' pace will be in the top 50 nationally

Last year, Arkansas ranked in the top 10 percent nationally in offensive pace, finishing 33rd with an average possession time of 15.7 seconds. That's super fast, but could be even speedier this year because these Razorbacks are more athletic and are paced by a trio of senior guards who like to get out and run. That added athleticism should also help speed up opposing offenses after the Hogs ranked just 288th nationally in defensive pace last year. There should be an increase in turnovers and rushed possessions. Arkansas hasn't ranked higher than 87th in overall tempo since the shot clock was lowered to 30 seconds in 2015. Look for that to change this year.

Khalil Garland won't play this season

Hopefully this is wrong, for his sake, but Garland has been limited by a medical condition since he arrived on campus and took a physical at the beginning of the summer and there is no sign he will be cleared any time soon. The absence of the athletic, 6-5 Little Rock native takes away from some of the potential flexibility of the roster, but his health is comes first and his wellbeing is all that really matters.

#FASTEST40

Arkansas will finish in the bottom two of the SEC in 3-point attempts for a third straight year

The Razorbacks were near or at the bottom in the conference in attempts with Hannahs on the team the last two years. Without him, that probably won't change. Barford, Macon, Beard and Jones may take close to 90 percent of the 3-point attempts. The underlying factor is the lack of a stretch big. When Anderson teams have had one, they've ranked near the top of the league in attempts.

Bigs will combine to make less than a jumper per game this season

Last year, Arkansas bigs not named Moses Kingsley shot 26 of 84 on jumpers, according to Synergy Sports tracking data. Thomas and Thompson are seniors who haven't proven to be reliable or volume shooters to this point in their careers. Gafford and Bailey aren't threats to stretch the defense for now, either.

The team's defensive rating in SEC play will improve

This isn't a cinch given that Kingsley and Watkins were Arkansas' two most impactful defenders a year ago, but the Razorbacks better hope this happens. They gave up an ugly 107.8 points per 100 possessions in conference play a year ago, 11th in the league. The offense may not be as explosive, so getting more stops will be important, even if it's only a modest improvement to, say, 104, which would make them an average defense. Reasons for hope: Gafford's rim protection, Hall's length at the 3, experience for returnees, Jones being more athletically capable than Hannahs.

Gafford will break the program's freshman record for blocks

Hunter Mickelson holds the mark at 72 from when he averaged 2.25 in 2011-12 and ranked second in the SEC behind Anthony Davis. That's a fairly high bar, but Gafford has the tools to be an elite rim protector and should get the playing time to best it. Mickelson averaged only 16.7 minutes per game that year, so Gafford should have the added advantage of playing significantly more.

Gafford is the starting center by the time SEC play rolls around

Anderson started Thompson in the exhibition games and may continue to do so during nonconference play. It makes sense on a few levels. He is a senior who's put in the time with the program and his playmaking and experience are valuable.

You know what you're getting from him. Gafford, on the other hand, is a bit of a wild card and raw, evidenced by picking up a pair of fouls in the first two minutes he played in the exhibition opener. But his ceiling is high. Both will play plenty, even sharing the court together at times, but once Gafford has some experience, he is a good bet to get the starting nod.

Thompson will lead Arkansas in assist percentage

This isn't exactly going out on a limb. He assisted on a team-best 17.8 percent of Arkansas' makes when on the court last year. Macon and Barford should have better assist numbers this year, but will also have to shoulder a large scoring burden. Passing is Thompson's best skill and his ability to operate from the high post will be valuable for a team without a surplus of ballhandlers.

Arlando Cook will play less than 200 total minutes

Bailey played 199 last year as the third 4 on the roster. There's a good chance Cook is in that role this year thanks to his run-in with the law. He has a court date set for Jan. 3 and while he may work out a deal before it gets to that point, it's a good bet he will miss at least most of the nonconference portion of the schedule. When he gets back, he'll have Thomas and Bailey presumably ahead of him, Hall capable of playing the 4 in small-ball lineups and the likelihood Gafford and Thompson will play together some.

The Thompson-Gafford pairing will be a net negative against high-major opponents

Arkansas outscored opponents by a massive 17 points per 100 possessions last vear when Thompson and Kingslev shared the floor. The pairing was a staple in the late-season push. So why would Gafford and Thompson not work well together? Spacing is one potential reason. Kingsley could shoot. Gafford can't. Perhaps having Thompson operate exclusively from the high post is a workaround, but the two may suffocate the paint if that doesn't happen. The defense will need to be strong with this group, which it wasn't last year with Kingsley and Thompson, when teams scored 110.8 per 100 with them on the floor. A blistering 127.8 offensive rating was the difference. This year's version may not be able to produce the same firepower, but the pairing is worth experimenting with, especially early when the Hogs could be short-handed in the frontcourt.

Arkansas will finish in the top 10 nationally in attendance for the first time since 2008

The Hogs have been in the top 12 for three straight years after slipping into the 20s from 2010 to 2014. Last season's tournament run and an impressive home schedule that features Kentucky in SEC play and a nonconference slate with Minnesota, Oklahoma State and a slew of good midmajors on it should draw sizable crowds. Last season, Arkansas sold an average of 15,247 tickets, 659 less than 10th-place North Carolina State. It shouldn't take much of a bump up to crack the top 10.

Hogs enter SEC play with less than 10 wins

This would mean a record of 9-3 at best. Losing two games on the trip to the Phil Knight Invitational is very possible. Home games with Bucknell, Fresno State, Colorado State, Minnesota and CSU Bakersfield are legitimately tough matchups and then there's a game at Houston in early December. Arkansas' strength of schedule could be among the nation's best, which would actually make a 9-3 mark a pretty impressive accomplishment.

They win at most 10 SEC games

The SEC is deeper this year. Five teams have been ranked in at least one preseason Top 25, with Kentucky, Florida and A&M in the preseason AP poll and Alabama positioned as the first team receiving votes. Obviously the news that Crimson Tide point guard Collin Sexton is not eligible at least to start the season could affect the landscape drastically, but league play will likely be a bloodbath regardless. Protecting the home court will be important and avoiding slip-ups against the bottom three or four teams will be a must. An unexpected loss or two could be the difference between winning 10 and finishing fourth and winning eight and finishing seventh. Arkansas will probably be in the 8 to 11-win range, so a 9 or 10-win conference season seems fair.

Arkansas makes a repeat trip to the NCAA Tournament

KenPom projects the SEC as the third-best conference in the nation entering the season. Last year, the Big Ten and Big East tied for the second-most tournament bids with seven apiece. The Razorbacks could be this year's Vanderbilt, a team that played a ridiculously tough schedule and didn't have a glistening record, but was a good team and made the tourney. Arkansas should finish in the top seven in the conference. I picked them sixth, which is where they finished in the preseason media poll. They've outperformed that four years in a row. A fifth straight year exceeding outside expectations and a brutal schedule would punch the ticket.
