THE MUSS BUS

- Has over 700 wins in 22 seasons as a head coach
- Has been a collegiate head coach, international head coach and a professional head coach, including two stints in the NBA
- In 22 seasons as a head coach (professional and collegiate), has finished first in his conference/division 13 times
- In 14 seasons as a professional head coach, was first or second in wins 10 times – most wins 7x and second-most wins 3x
- As a collegiate head coach, has won three conference titles and has appeared in each of the last six NCAA Tournaments played while advancing to the Sweet 16 four times with two Elite 8 berths
- Only needed 130 games as collegiate head coach to record 100 wins – the ninth fastest to reach the milestone in the last 50 years
- First coach in professional basketball history to win 100 games by the age of 28
- Has won at least 20 games in each of his eight years as a collegiate head coach
- In the last five years, nine of his players have played in the NBA – Cameron Oliver (NEV), Caleb Martin (NEV), Cody Martin (NEV), Jalen Harris (NEV), Isaiah Joe (ARK), Mason Jones (ARK), Moses Moody (ARK), Jaylin Williams (ARK) and Stanley Umude (ARK)
- In the last five years, eight of his players have been drafted with four “one-and-dones,” three first-round selections and two lottery picks – Cody Martin (2019 2nd Rd at NEV), Jalen Harris (2020 2nd Rd at NEV), Isaiah Joe (2020 2nd Rd at ARK), Moses Moody (2021 1st Rd at ARK), Jaylin Williams (2022 2nd Rd at ARK), Anthony Black (2023 1st Rd at ARK), Nick Smith Jr. (2023 1st Rd at ARK) and Jordan Walsh (2nd Rd at ARK)
- Has produced four All-America honors, two Conference Players of the Year, three Conference 6th Man of the Year awards, two conference Freshman of the Year awards and 21 All-Conference honors while a total of 32 players have signed professional contracts

JERRY AND GENE JONES FAMILY STUDENT-ATHLETE SUCCESS CENTER

There is no debate about the most influential newcomer to Razorback Athletics in 2015-16. Opened for the start of the academic year, the Jerry and Gene Jones Family Student-Athlete Success Center, was officially dedicated on September 19 with members of the Jones Family, Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics Jeff Long, Arkansas Governor Asa Hutchinson, Southeastern Conference Commissioner Greg Sankey and hundreds of Razorback student-athletes looking on.

The 55,000 square-foot facility dedicated to the development of more than 460 Razorback student-athletes was made possible by a \$10.65 million gift from the Jones family. The Jones Success Center addresses the academic, nutritional, personal and professional development of our student-athletes and creates an integrated academic support program focused on the graduation of all student-athletes at the University of Arkansas.

The Student-Athlete Success Center is the home of the Bogle Academic Center and provides student-athletes with multiple learning environments including academic advising and course preparation, leadership training through the Razorback Leadership Academy and career planning and service learning. It also houses the Sports Nutrition Center, serving the fueling needs of student-athletes competing in 19 sports.





MARSHA AND MARTY MARTIN FAMILY BASKETBALL PERFORMANCE CENTER EDDIE SUTTON MEN'S BASKETBALL PRACTICE GYM

The 66,000 square-foot Basketball Performance Center opened in the fall of 2015 and is the home of the Razorback Basketball program. In May 2019, the University of Arkansas System Board of Trustees adopted a resolution to name the men's facility the **EDDIE SUTTON MEN'S BASKETBALL PRACTICE GYM** after the Hall of Fame coach. Then, on Jan. 26, 2023, a \$5 million donation secured naming rights to the Basketball Performance Center. The newly named **MARSHA AND MARTY MARTIN FAMILY BASKETBALL PERFORMANCE CENTER** was unveiled on Mar. 4, 2023, prior to the Arkansas-Kentucky men's basketball game.

The facility includes two full-court gymnasiums, locker rooms, a weight room, an athletic training room, coaches' offices, team meeting rooms, a student-athlete lounge, study areas and an equipment room.

The largest components of the facility are two identical practice gyms, which are approximately 12,280 square feet each. Each gym has six wall mounted goals and two portable goals that are identical to the goals used in Bud Walton Arena.

A state-of-the-art video coaching system is available in each gym with a large format video display for the team's use in reviewing video footage recorded during practice through the remotely operated cameras mounted on the ceiling.

The Performance Center's training room is approximately 1,720 square feet and contains a large treadmill treatment pool, cold plunge pool, hot plunge pool and a dual extremity pool.

The weight room is 4,030 square feet with a dedicated plyometric training area, private massage rooms and strength coach offices.



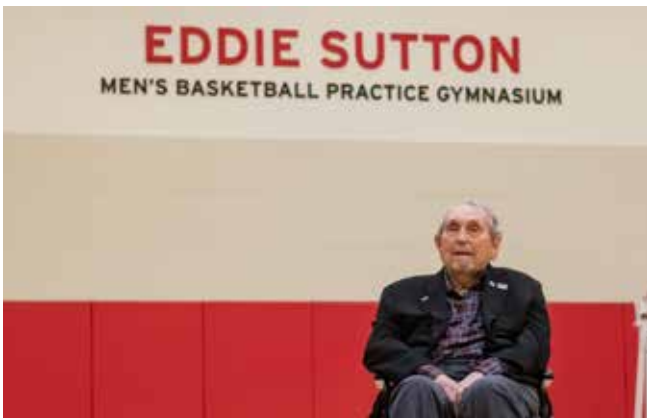

- Arkansas has won 81.7 percent of its games played in **BUD WALTON ARENA** since it opened in 1993-94.
- The Razorbacks have ranked in the top 30 in national attendance in all 29 years playing in Bud Walton Arena, including 24 times among the nation's top 15. In fact, **ARKANSAS LED THE NCAA IN TOTAL ATTENDANCE IN BOTH 2020-21 AND 2021-22.**
- On Oct. 20, 2019, the floor at Bud Walton Arena was named **NOLAN RICHARDSON COURT** in honor of the Razorback Hall of Fame coach.

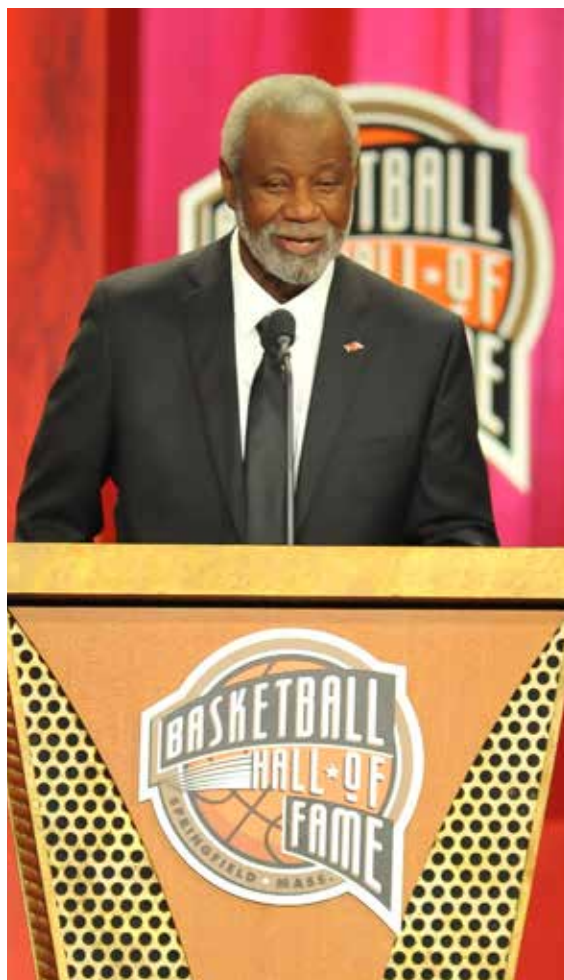

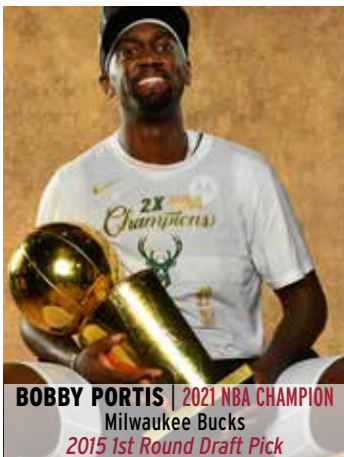

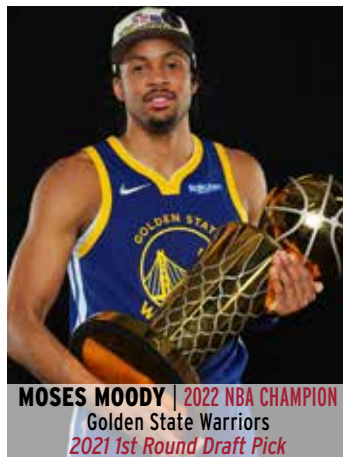
