# 2017 PREVIEW

Consistently recognized as one of the most talented and complete programs in the country, Arkansas men's track and field will embark on its 2017 campaign on Friday, Jan. 13 with the Arkansas Invitational.

The first of four home indoor competitions at Arkansas' world-renowned Randal Tyson Track Center, the Arkansas Invitational is set to feature top collegiate action on Friday and morphs into one of the most loaded regular season high school meets on Saturday, Jan. 14.



#### Fast Times At Randal Tyson

Originally built by Mondo for the World Championships in Toronto, Canada, the Tyson track first became available for Arkansas athletic use in 2000. Since the opening of the center, Arkansas has hosted eight Southeastern Conference Championships and 13 NCAA Championships at the facility.

The first indoor venue to feature a televised regular season indoor track and field meet, Tyson will reprise its 2015 historic feat by hosting a live broadcast of the Razorback Invitational on Saturday, Jan. 28. The two-day meet beginning on Friday, Jan. 27 will showcase the best-of-the-best in track and field, boasting strong programs from each of

the power five conferences.

Arkansas will close out its indoor homestand with the prestigious Tyson Invitational on Feb. 10-11 and the Arkansas Qualifier on Friday, Feb. 17.

#### On the Road (Indoor)

Fortunate to have arguably the best indoor venue in the country, the Razorbacks will spend little time away from home during the regular season making stops at the Vanderbilt Invitational (Jan. 20-21), the Iowa State Classic (Feb. 10-11) and the UCS Invitational (Feb. 18).

Arkansas will complete its indoor charge with postseason championships in Nashville, Tennessee, (SEC indoor championship) and College Station, Texas, (NCAA indoor championship) set for Feb. 24-25 and March 10-11, respectively.

#### The Great Outdoors

The Razorbacks will open the 2017 outdoor season at home, competing at the Arkansas Spring Invitational at John McDonnell Field on March 24-25.

Arkansas will then head out on the road, traveling to the Stanford Invitational (March 31-April 1), the Baylor Invitational (April 8) and the Bryan Clay Invitational (April 13-14).

Head coach Chris Bucknam's crew will return home to Fayetteville on April 21-22 as the hosts of the John Mc-Donnell Invitational which promises an exciting decathlon duel between the Razorbacks and Wisconsin Badgers.

Two more final tune-ups will follow for Arkansas prior to the start of outdoor championship season in the form of the SEC Relays (April 28-29) at LSU and the Arkansas Twilight (May 5).

Outdoor postseason competition will kick off with the SEC Championship (May 11-13) in Columbia, South Carolina.

The Razorbacks will close out May at the NCAA West Preliminary Round (May 25-27) at Mike A. Myers Stadium in Austin, Texas, before heading out to Eugene, Oregon, on June 7-10 for the NCAA Outdoor Championship.

Arkansas will cap the year at the USATF Junior and Senior Championships set for June 23-25 in Sacramento, California.

National runner-ups at last year's NCAA indoor competition, Arkansas' men's track and field team has been ranked as the fourth-best in the nation in the USTFCCCA

2017 preseason polls. The Razorbacks return seven indoor All-Americans from last season, including triple jump national champion Clive Pullen.

The national team rankings are compiled by mathematical formula based on national descending order lists. The

purpose and methodology of the rankings is to create an index that showcases the teams that have the best potential of achieving the top spots in the national team race. Rankings points do not equate with NCAA Championships team points. Preseason rankings will include marks from 2016, and the National Team Computer Rankings will continue to do so through the third regular season edition.

#### 2017 Outlook

The Razorbacks' jumps squad led the way at the 2016 NCAA Indoor Championship, accounting for 24 of Arkansas' 39 points. Responsible for 14 of those points, Pullen (10) and Trajkovski (four) return this season with the latter hoping to follow Lawson's lead and capture a long jump gold at the national meet.

Coming off of its best cross country showing since 2006, Arkansas' distance crew boasts several student-athletes to watch in the distance events including Jack Bruce, Alex George, Andrew Ronoh and Frankline Tonui. Of the four, Tonui made the biggest progression last track and field season, racing to a silver medal in the steeplechase at the outdoor national championship. Bruce and George will lead Arkansas' DMR resurgence as the Razorbacks look to reassert their claim as one of the nation's best teams in the event.

Arkansas' sprint contingent will be headlined by Cotton who promises to be an individual title contender once again in both the 60 and 200-meter dashes. Taking the reins from former Razorback quartermile-specialist Marqueze Washington will be Igbokwe, who earned a spot in the event at the indoor national meet during his freshman year last season.

Another sophomore with the potential to shake things up is middle distance standout Carlton Orange who will look to improve on his 2016 sixth-place NCAA indoor performance in the 800.

#### Coach Bucknam Quotables (Indoor, Outdoor and Program of the Year)

"Once again we're going to have some outstanding meets here in Fayetteville which will bring in some of the best track programs in the country. In particular, I'm really excited about the Razorback Invitational where we'll get to see a lot of SEC schools such as Georgia, Auburn, Florida, Tennessee, [Texas] A&M, Ole Miss and Mississippi State. Even though we aren't hosting a conference championship indoors or outdoors this year, that meet will definitely have an SEC Championship flavor. After the Razorback Invitational, the Tyson Invitational continues to be one of the best meets in the world. There will be a plethora of outstanding athletes trying to qualify for the indoor championships."

"We're also excited about the John McDonnell Invitational outdoors. So far we have Kansas State, Missouri and Wisconsin coming in and more teams will be added as the meet approaches."

"It's all about preparation in our sport and being ready for the championship season. The regular season prepares us for those SEC and NCAA championships during cross country, indoor and outdoor which leads to a great overall program performance."



Chris Bucknam enters his ninth season as the head coach of the nationally dominant Arkansas men's cross country and track and field program. A veteran in the coaching ranks, Bucknam took the Razorback head coaching position on June 27, 2008, after a 25-year stint at Northern Iowa.

Since assuming the head coaching position at Arkansas, Bucknam has enjoyed tremendous success in the form of 17 Southeastern Conference championships, five NCAA regional titles, and 240 All-Americans, guiding the Razorbacks to 61 individual SEC event titles.

Nationally, Bucknam's guidance has led the Razorbacks to 17 top 10 finishes since his arrival in Favetteville. His cross country squads have placed in the top 10 in three times in his tenure while track and field has 14 top 10s including four national runner-up finishes and a national title.

The 2015-16 season brought the program's 15th SEC Triple Crown as Bucknam masterfully guided the Razorbacks to decisive conference victories during the cross country, indoor and outdoor seasons. Arkansas' dominance didn't end at the league level, exceeding expectations at the national ranks as well with three top-six NCAA finishes – two of which were national runner-up performances.

Known for his development of elite distance runners Bucknam kicked off 2015 with a phenomenal cross country campaign which saw an unprecedented five different student-athletes take the lead for Arkansas during the season. Steamrolling through SECs and Regionals Bucknam's crew surprised the polls placing just two spots shy of the podium – the program's best NCAA finish since 2006 - off the heels of first-year All-Americans Jack Bruce and Frankline Tonui.

The Razorbacks success carried though to track season with Bucknam relying on a combined effort from all event groups to lead Arkansas to postseason titles. Arkansas' tremendous versatility and depth were on full display as several newcomers forged their paths at the most different league championships in the country. His squad rose to the occasion as over 90 percent of the Razorbacks' conference roster contributed at the SEC Championships and further delivering two NCAA national runner-up performances making the Razorback men the most complete team in the SEC.

One of the most phenomenal performances in the history of NCAA track and field came in 2016 from one of Bucknam's Razorback leaders Jarrion Lawson. In an incredulous feat of athleticism Lawson captured three NCAA individual titles for the Razorbacks, completing the Jesse Owens triple with victories in the 100, 200 and long jump at the outdoor championship.

Last season's success was a continuation of Arkansas long-standing tradition of excellence including the 2013 indoor track squad who captured Bucknam's first and Arkansas' 41st NCAA title.

Entering the competition as the No. 1 ranked team in the nation, the Razorbacks did not disappoint the hometown crowd at the Randal Tyson Track

Center as Arkansas scored 74 points and racked up 25 All-America honors at the meet. Two individuals captured NCAA titles and a collegiate record in the 4×400 relay added a third to the Razorbacks' dominating performance.

Along with the indoor title, Arkansas placed 10th at the NCAA Cross Country Championship and third at the outdoor meet allowing the program to claim its first John McDonnell Program of the Year award, named after the legendary Arkansas coach whom Bucknam took over for following his retirement.


The national recognition as the best program in the nation was no fluke as Bucknam and his staff have been building to that for several years. In 2011-12, Arkansas won the program's 13th SEC Triple Crown and the first with Bucknam at the helm. The Razorbacks duplicated the effort in 2012-13 giving them 11 league championships over the past five years. No other SEC school has more than two in that same time frame. For his part Bucknam has been named the SEC Coach of the Year 15 times and national coach of the year one time.

As the head coach, Bucknam's charge is to look at the big picture and lead his team to championships, but that doesn't deter him from his work with the Razorback distance crew. He has led the program to 142 marks that have etched themselves on Arkansas' prestigious all-time top 10 lists including 12 school records since his arrival in 2008.

During his first season distance medley relay squad of Alex McClary, Ben Skidmore, Chris Bilbrew and Dorian Ulrey eclipsed an 11-year-old record, which had not even been close to being broken since it was set in 1998, at the UW Invitational when it ran 9:28.35. The outdoor school record was set by Shawn Forrest, when he shattered the 10,000-meter mark with a time of 27:52.10 at the Payton Jordan Invitational.

Ulrey's three-year Arkansas career was one of the more celebrated in Razorback history as the Port Byron, Ill. native earned eight All-America honors, one NCAA Championship, seven SEC titles, two SEC Athlete of the Year awards and the league's sportsmanship award. The lessons that Ulrey picked up in Fayetteville have served him well since he completed his eligibility as he continues to perform well professionally.

Along with the success of his student-athletes in the competition arena, Razorbacks have been equally as good in the classroom. Arkansas has placed six student-athletes on the Capital One Academic All-America squads over the past eight years, including three this past season and had more than 75 named to the SEC Academic Honor Rolls. The Razorbacks were named the USTFCCCA Indoor and Outdoor Scholar Team of the Year in 2015 in recognition of the program's excellent cumulative gpa and athletic performance.



Prior to taking over the Arkansas program, Bucknam was a well-respected head coach at Northern Iowa where he led his teams to 35 conference championships, two top-10 and six top-20 finishes at the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. He was named conference coach of the year 33 times while in Cedar Falls, Iowa, and coached three individual national champions and 34 All-Americans who earned a total of 85 honors.

His time with the Panthers saw him lead the men's program for 25 seasons and a combined track and field operation for the final 11 years. Bucknam's career at Northern Iowa began as an assistant in 1979 before he assumed the head coaching job prior to the 1984 campaign. Along with his various conference coach of the year awards, Bucknam was also honored

regionally for his acumen with nine USTFCCCA Midwest Region Coach of the Year honors.


Under Bucknam's tutelage, Northern Iowa product Joey Woody was a three-time All-American and the 1997 national champion in the 400-meter hurdles. Woody placed second in the 400-meter hurdles at 2003 World Championships and was a member of the 1999 World Champion 4×400-meter relay team.


A native of Beverly, Mass., Bucknam attended Norwich University in Northfield, Vermont, where he was a cross country and track letterman. He was elected cross country co-captain his senior year and is a member of the Norwich Athletic Hall of Fame. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1978. He earned his master's degree in physical education from Northern Iowa in 1982.

He and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of a son, Eric, and a daughter, Kate.

Since arriving in Fayetteville, following an extended stay at Northern lowa, Case has revitalized the Arkansas sprint teams and led his student-athletes to 10 NCAA individual titles, including the first-ever championships in the pole vault, 60-meter hurdles, 100-meter hurdles, 4x100-meter relay and indoor 4x400-meter relay, and 123 All-America honors. Case's guidance has helped Razorbacks claim 18 Southeastern Conference individual championships and grab 17 of the last 24 SEC league titles in cross country and track & field.

The crowning achievement of Case's time with Arkansas came during the 2013 indoor track season when he and longtime friend and mentor Chris Bucknam led the Razorbacks to the NCAA Championship. The duo followed up the win with a third-place finish at the outdoor meet which led to the University's first John McDonnell Program of the Year award.

Case's work at Arkansas has not gone unnoticed to his colleagues as he earned the United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches' Association (USTFCCCA) South Central regional assistant coach of the year in 2011 and most recently for his efforts in 2015.

Along with his ability to teach his protégés to race and compete, Case has also put his stamp on the Razorback record books. In seven years, 67 marks on Arkansas' top 10 performance lists across 16 events in two seasons belong to student-athletes developed by Case. This past season Case guided Arkansas sophomore Omar McLeod past the Razorback record books and into collegiate history to claim the NCAA all-time best spot at both 60-meter and 110-meter hurdles, the latter which had previously stood for 36 years. The two collegiate records were the second and third for Case having coached the 2013 4x400-meter relay team (currently second best performers in NCAA history) to a collegiate best during the indoor season that culminated to the team's 41st national title.

Over the last two years Case developed McLeod from a young man with raw talent to one of the best high-hurdlers in the world. In his freshman season as a Razorback McLeod earned the title of SEC Freshman Runner of the Year for his second place performance in the 60-meter hurdles only to drop .12 seconds two weeks later to collect his first national title. With the guidance of Case, McLeod continued on to two more SEC titles, defended his indoor national title, collected two outdoor national titles breaking the Razorback 4x100-meter relay record with his teammates in the process.

He capped his amateur career as a Bowerman Trophy semifinalist and with a victory at the Jamaican National Championships as the first collegian to run a non-wind assisted sub-13 time in the 110-meter hurdles.

Along with McLeod, the 2015 NCAA Championship winning 4x100-meter team assembled by Case included SEC Freshman Runner of the Year Kenzo Cotton and individual indoor event All-Americans Jarrion Lawson and Marqueze Washington. The entire group followed their national championship performance with a sixth place finish in the 4x400-meter relay. In addition to managing the athletes in relay competition, Case was responsible for the breakthrough performance by Lawson at 100 meters who went from unknown in the event to the third fastest in the country in the a span of one month.

2016 brought further notoriety for the sprints and hurdles specialist as both Cotton and Lawson as well as McLeod (on the professional circuit) continued to thrive under Case's guidance.

The collegiate duo and returning 4-x-100 relay members both placed nationally in individual sprint events during the indoor and outdoor season – Lawson accomplishing the coveted Jesse Owens triple with victories in the 100, 200 and long jump at the NCAA outdoor championship. Cotton and Lawson also assisted the 4-x-100 team once again racing to a spot on the podium with a third-place finish. In all, Case's event group accounted for half of Arkansas' point total, largely contributing to the program's national runner-up finish.

Lawson and Cotton both qualified for the U.S. Olympic Trials advancing to the semifinals in both the 100 and 200 in their debut at the event. As the seventh place finisher in the 100, Lawson earned a spot on Team USA's 4-x-100 relay team, going on to assist them at the Olympic Games during the preliminary round of competition.

A product of the mentoring of both Case and assistant field events coach Travis Geopfert. Lawson was the first member of the Arkansas men's track and field team to be a finalist for the sport's most prestigious honor the Bowerman Award. He also was the first collegiate track athlete to earn an ESPYs nomination in the Best Male College Athlete category.

Still responsible for the development of McLeod, Case coached the Jamaican hurdle talent through several major competitions during 2016, watching on as the fourtime NCAA champion implemented his techniques to race to a World indoor championship, a second Jamaican national title and an Olympic gold medal.

His work isn't limited to the track as Case developed the abilities of All-American pole vaulter Andrew Irwin who in his time with Arkansas won two NCAA championships and five SEC titles. Case's work with Irwin has won the Mt. Ida, Ark., native five All-America honors, SEC Freshman Field Athlete of the Year awards both indoor and out, the SEC Field Athlete of the Year for the 2012 outdoor season and USTFCCCA South Central Region Field Athlete of the Year accolades.

Prior to joining his mentor on the Arkansas coaching staff. Case was a very successful coach at Northern lowa, leading his student-athletes to two individual national championships, 43 All-America honors and 68 national championship qualifiers. His athletes dominated the Missouri Valley Conference with 97 individual and relay championships in his time with the Panthers and set school records in 10 events.

While Case is proud of the efforts of all of his former competitors, 800-meter runner Tyler Mulder and pole vaulter Jacob Pauli hold a special place with Case after the tandem won national titles in 2008 and 2001, respectively. Mulder earned his title with a spectacular 1:49.20 at the national meet and Pauli went on to finish third at the 2007 USA Outdoor Championship.

Case's career path saw him make a stop at Arkansas State before taking the head coaching position at Drake and eventually Northern Iowa. At Arkansas State, the Red Wolves won nine Sun Belt Conference titles and Case recruited 52 outdoor and 49 indoor individual conference champions, four All-Americans, seven Olympic Trials qualifiers and three Olympians. His three-year stint at Drake included three school records and a ninth-place finish by the distance medley relay at the NCAA Championship.

A former Northern Iowa sprinter, Case set eight school records between 1982 and 1986 and was an all-conference performer. A native of Marshalltown, Iowa, Case received his bachelor's degree from UNI in 1987 and served as a graduate assistant with the Panthers the next two seasons. He and his wife, Chris, have four children: Kelsey, Lauren, Cameron and Regan.

# TRAVIS GEOPFERT

# **ASSISTANT COACH - 8th SEASON NORTHERN IOWA, 2002 JUMPS, THROWS, MULTIS**

Travis Geopfert begins his eighth season at the University of Arkansas and his 14th as a collegiate coach. He is charged with coaching the field and multi-event athletes with the Razorbacks while also acting as the recruiting coordinator for the Arkansas cross country/track & field programs.

In his 14 years on the sideline at Arkansas, Geopfert has built an impressive resume that includes 10 NCAA National Champions, (4 long jump, 2 triple jump, 1 high jump, 1 combined-event, 1 100 meters, 1 200 meters), 67 First Team All-Americans and 17 second team All Americans (84 Total). 121 NCAA National Qualifiers. 69 Conference Champions (14 SEC Champions). 132 All-Conference Performances, three Olympians and four World Championship Qualifiers. Those numbers don't include the myriad of honors bestowed upon the student-athletes that Geopfert has recruited, an array of performers that have been among the top 10 recruiting classes in the nation in each of the past three years.

The work that Geopfert has done has not gone unnoticed to his peers. In 2008 he received the United States Track & Field Cross Country Coaches Association's (USTFCCCA) Midwest Assistant Coach of the Year award for outdoor track and took the same honor indoors in 2013. His most recent honor led him to the USTFCCCA National Assistant Coach of the Year award for the 2013 indoor track season.

Geopfert's 2013 track season was not just rewarding for him as an individual, but from a team standpoint as he helped Arkansas claim its 41st NCAA Championship during the indoor track season and win the John Mc-Donnell Program of the Year award. The team also won its second straight SEC triple crown and Geopfert's fingerprints were all over Arkansas' team success in 2013 as he coached student-athletes to a national title in the heptathlon, 14 All-America honors and an SEC Champion.

In 2014 Geopfert repeated at the USTFCCCA National Assistant Coach of the Year for the indoor season following guiding one of his student-athletes to an individual national title for the second-consecutive year. In addition to the first-place finish five more from his training group earned All-American honors with three out of Geopfert's six finishing among the top-five in their events at the national meet.

While his overall credentials are staggering, his numbers since arriving in Fayetteville are even better. He has coached three national champions, nine SEC titlists, five SEC runner-ups, 27 first-team All-Americans and 22 second-team All-Americans.

Kevin Lazas, the 2013 NCAA heptathlon champion, tallied 6,175 points on the way to his national title, a total that ranks No. 3 in NCAA history. The lofty numbers are not limited to just the multi-events. Geopfert's first and third national champions were long jumpers Alan Bailey (2010) and Jarrion Lawson (2014). Lawson whose mark of 27-6.5 earned him a world No. 1 ranking at the time went on to finish second at the USATF Championships to cap his second season as a Razorback.

During the 2015 season Geopfert returned Lawson to the national spotlight guiding the junior to a silver medal in the long jump at the NCAA Indoor Championships. Picking up where they left off from the indoor season, Geopfert watched over Lawson's outdoor progressions developing him into a dual-threat national contender in the 100-meter run and the long jump. With Geopfert's mentoring, Lawson finished among the top-three competitors in both events at the NCAA Outdoor Championships bringing his All-American honors total to 12 in three years as a Razorback.

Geopfert's seventh campaign at the helm of Razorback jumps, multis and throws brought several accomplishments including five SEC individual champions as well as multiple marks on Arkansas' top-10 all-time bests list. In Lawson's final year with the Razorbacks the Texarkana, Texas native found his rhythm under Geopfert's watch, sweeping the SEC and NCAA long jump titles in dominant fashion. Along with his collegiate success which saw him match Jesse Owens' 100, 200, long national sweep Lawson landed international notoriety, leaping to a world-lead in the long jump at the U.S. Olympic Trials of 28-1 3/4.

Geopfert followed through with Lawson's training all the way through the Olympic Games, molding the natural talent into a top-five finisher on the most elite stage in track and field. For his efforts in 2016 Lawson was selected as the NCAA National Outdoor Athlete of the Year and nominated as a finalist for the Bowerman Award and for the Best Male Collegiate Athlete ESPY Award.

Only one of Geopfert's many talented student-athletes Lawson was joined on the national and Olympic stage by Jamaican triple jumper Clive Pullen who captured the NCAA indoor title and became the first Jamaican to qualify for an Olympic Games since the 1970s.

Away from the field and onto the Rio oval Geopfert also played an instrumental role in assisting four-time NCAA champion Omar McLeod navigate his first Olympic games to become the first Jamaican gold-medalist in the 110-meter hurdles. Under Geopfert's watch McLeod became the second men's track and field Olympic champion in Razorback history joining the elite company of famed U.S. triple jumper Mike Conley.

In addition to his duties with the Razorbacks, Geopfert is a rising star on the national stage and in 2013 coached



his second Thorpe Cup, a decathlon competition between the United States and Germany. A long-time advocate of the competition, Geopfert was also a member of three Thorpe Cup championships as a competitor between 2003 and 2006.

Familiar with Coach Bucknam's philosophies and coaching style, Geopfert was an athlete during the head Razorback's run at Northern Iowa before joining the coaching staff. The long-time Panther even took over the program for one season, after Bucknam left for Arkansas, before joining his mentor one year later. His coaching at Northern Iowa led to Missouri Valley Conference indoor and outdoor championships in 2009 as well as coach of the year honors both seasons. In six years as a coach at UNI, Geopfert was a part of numerous conference championships and his recruits continue to hold 12 UNI school records.

Geopfert's coaching career began at Central Missouri State where he spent two years as an assistant coach. In that time he coached two Divison II national champions, one national runner-up, six All-Americans, five conference champions and 10 all-conference performers.

A standout student-athlete for Northern Iowa, Geopfert earned All-America honors and was a three-time MVC champion. Including his professional career as an athlete, he was a two-time Drake Relays decathlon championships, three-time member of the Thorpe Cup and a six-time USA Championships qualifier in the decathlon.

A native of Panora, Iowa, Geopfert earned his bachelor's degree from Northern Iowa in 2002. He and his wife Nicole have one daughter, Ellyn and two sons, Jones and Jax.

Matthew Downs enters his first season as the director of operations for the Arkansas men's cross country and track and field program.

As the Razorbacks' director of operations Downs is charged with complete oversite of the team's administration responsible for coordination of travel, meet operations, student-athlete eligibility, team equipment and gear and assisting with the promotion of the program.

Downs comes to Fayetteville from Eugene, Oregon where he was employed in a similar capacity with the Oregon Ducks for the last four years.

At Oregon Downs was instrumental in the production and coordination of four NCAA Outdoor Championships at Hayward Field.

In addition to home meet oversight Downs played an integral role in the Ducks day-to-day operations, acting as a the team's athletic department liaison with compliance, eligibility, meet operations, finance, marketing and promotions and public relations.

Downs came to Oregon after spending three years (2009-12) as the director of track and field operations at the University of Virginia. In addition to his role as home meet director for the Cavaliers, he also assisted with the program's alumni relations and with the planning, fund-raising and development of Virginia's \$7 million track and field facility.

Previously, Downs also worked with the SunTrust National Marathon in Washington, D.C., as well as college football's Military Bowl and the NCAA Frozen Four.

Downs, from Richmond, Va., was a three-time all-conference runner for the University of Mary Washington and team captain from 2006-08. He graduated from Mary Washington in 2008 with degrees in history and economics, and received his Masters in sport leadership from Virginia Commonwealth in 2009.

Prior to Virginia, Downs was an assistant track and field coach at St. Christopher's High School in Richmond from 2008-09. Downs is also a USATF certified official with six years of experience.

# JOSPHAT BOIT

Former Razorback distance harrier Josphat Boit is in his first season as a volunteer assistant coach with the Arkansas distance crew.

Boit was a two-time NCAA Champion while running for the Hogs. He took the 2006 NCAA Indoor 5K title and followed that up by winning the 2006 NCAA Outdoor 10.000-meter race.

Boit earned eight All-America certificates and was a six-time SEC Champion during his time at Arkansas. He was also a 10-time All-SEC per-

He remains the second fastest 8K cross country performer in Razorback history from his 22 minutes 59.10 seconds showing at the 2005 SEC Championships and is one of only three Razorbacks to win consecutive SEC individual titles (2004-05).

Boit also still holds the second fastest 10K on Arkansas' all-time bests list with his 28:07.27 in 2005.

Following his time with the Razorbacks Boit began competin on the professional circuit, setting a new PR in the 10K of 27:40.44 in Palo Alto, California.

In 2014 Boit finished 21st at the IAAF World Half Marathon Championship, recording a time of 1:01:33 over the 13.1 mile course in Copenhagen, Denmark.



# ANDREW IRWIN

#### **VOLUNTEER COACH - 2nd SEASON**



as a Razorback Andrew Irwin took on a new role with the program in Fall 2015 as a volunteer coach focused on developing a new group of young pole vaulters.

During his time as a student-athlete at Arkansas, Irwin played an instrumental role in the overall success of the team, regularly contributing six to 10 points in the pole vault at the indoor and outdoor conference and national levels. Irwin won his first SEC and NCAA titles during the indoor season in 2012, posting clearances of over 18 feet during both competitions.

The vertical talent repeated the difficult feat a second time earning gold medals at the conference and national meet, setting a PR of 18-9 1/4 in the former to help the Razorbacks to their 14th SEC Triple Crown and 41st national title.

Irwin bettered his career best in 2015, vaulting over a bar of 18-10 1/4, finishing second at the Tyson Invitational. The mark remains the best performance by a Razorback in the pole vault and gave him claim as one of the best pole vaulters to ever compete in the NCAA, ranking at No. 8 on the collegiate all-time best performer's list.

A six-time SEC champion and five time first team NCAA All-American Irwin divides his time between conaching the Razorbacks and competing on the professional circuit.

He received his bachelor's degree from the University of Arkansas in May, 2015 and currently resides in Fayetteville where he continues to train.

# JARRION LAWSON

#### **VOLUNTEER COACH - 1st SEASON**

ARKANSAS, 2016

#### **SPRINTS & JUMPS**

Revered as one of the best and most dynamic athletes to ever compete in collegiate track and field former Razorback Jarrion Lawson is taking on his first season as a volunteer coach with the Arkansas men's track and field program. He is charged with assisiting coach Case and coach Geopfert with the development of Arkansas' sprints and jumps squads.

Lawson' four-year stead as a student-athlete in Fayetteville brought in six NCAA national titles, 19 All-America recognitions, two SEC titles and a place in history as one of two men to ever win the long jump, 100 and 200 at the NCAA Outdoor Championship -- the other, Jesse Owens.

Primarily focused in the long jump, Lawson swept the event at the conference and national level during his senior collegiate season before taking the world by storm at the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials. Freshly finished with NCAA eligibility Lawson jumped to a world-leading mark of 28-1 3/4 at Hayward Field in Eugene, Oregon, earning a spot on the United States Olympic Team.

Lawson went on to finish in fourth-place in the long jump at the 2016 Rio Olympic Games, missing out on the gold medal due to a slight grazing of the sand by his fingers prior to the landing of his final and furthest attempt in Brazil.

Lawson was also a model student in the classroom. He was named the SEC Indoor Scholar-Athlete of the Year and a CoSIDA First Team Academic All-American in spring 2016. Lawson graduated with his bachelors degree from the University of Arkansas in 2015 and is currently pursuing an MBA. He resides in Fayetteville where he continues to train.





# OMAR MCLEOD

#### **VOLUNTEER COACH - 1st SEASON**

### ARKANSAS, 2017



The fastest high-hurdler in NCAA history, Omar McLeod joins head coach Chris Bucknam and staff, entering his first year as a volunteer coach with the Arkansas men's track and field team.


McLeod burst onto the collegiate scene in spring 2014. One of the most sought after recruits a year prior, McLeod proved why by capturing the NCAA 60-meter hurdles national title as a freshman. Though injury plagued him during most of the outdoor season McLeod returned back to competition as resilient as ever in 2015.

During his sophomore campaign as a Razorback McLeod left no stone unturned in his pursuit of greatness, racing to SEC and NCAA indoor and outdoor crowns in the high hurdles. McLeod set a collegiate record in the 60 hurdles of 7.45 in route to defending his indoor national title. His speed more than transferred over to other races as he earned his fourth NCAA title in two years as a member of Arkansas' 4-x-100-meter relay team who set the meet record at Hayward Field in Eugene, Oregon at the 2015 NCAA Outdoor Championship with their time of 38.47.

Following his collegiate season McLeod set another record, clocking 12.97 in the 110 hurdles to win the 2015 Jamaican National Title and earn a bid to the World Championships. HIs performance at that meet is the fastest all-seasons time by a collegian.

McLeod went on to collect more top accolades capturing the 2016 World Indoor title in the 60 hurdles, a second Jamaican National title in the 110-hurdles and an Olympic gold medal in the 110-hurdles. He continues to attend the University of Arkansas and will complete his bachelors degree in 2017.





### **SEC INDOOR**

The best athletes in the Southeastern Conference gathered for day one of the 2016 SEC Indoor Track and Field Championships at 'The Fastest Track in the World.' Arguably the best track and field conference in the nation, the conference indoor championship backed up its reputation as the athletes threw up major performances. The Razorbacks stood tall at the end of the day with the highest point total through day one collecting 42 points. Arkansas also put nine athletes into the finals section of six different events for day two at the Randal Tyson Track Center.

Amongst the top performances were Jarrion Lawson and Andreas Trajkovski in the long jump. Right out of the gate, in his first jump, Trajkovski put himself on the top of the leaderboard with a new personal record. The junior college transfer, Trajkovski leapt to a distance of 7.87m/25-10. Fueled by his teammate's success, Lawson claimed the SEC

Championship title in the long jump by reaching a distance of 8.11m/26-7.25 on his fifth jump of the night. Lawson, and Trajkovski took first and second place respectively for the Razorbacks.

Ken LeGassey brought in another SEC medal for Arkansas as he collected first place for his performance in the high jump. LeGassey took the top spot with the help of three first attempt clearances. The junior fought off Auburn competitor Shawn Johnson and elevated himself to a height of 2.19m/7-2.25.

The No. 1 Arkansas Razorbacks secured their 21st Southeastern Conference title in the program's storied history. Scoring points in all 11 events that they competed in, the Razorbacks collected 67 points in the final day of competition leading to a total of 109 for the 2016 SEC Indoor Track and Field Championship.

Kenzo Cotton and Jarrion Lawson combined to receive 11 points in the 60 meter dash. Sophomore, Cotton stayed con-

sistent running a 6.63 earning third place. Lawson followed Cotton finishing fourth and collecting five points. The Bowerman Watch List nominee raced down the track to finish with a time of 6.68.

Cotton returned to the track for the 200 and hung tough with a talented field picking up a fourth place finish. The product from La Vista, Neb. collected five more points for the Razorbacks crossing the line in the second heat with a new personal best time of 20.66 putting him fourth on Arkansas's all-time indoor top times list.

Marqueze Washington raced a competitive field to win his heat and finish fourth overall in the 400-meter dash. Washington received five points with a time of 46.17. Obi Igbokwe also took part in the finals section of the 400 crossing the line in 46.48. Competing in his first SEC Championship meet the freshman Igbokwe helped add to the Razorbacks point total.

Arkansas's three 800 meter finalists Carlton Orange, Andrew Pisechko and Ryan Thomas scored, bringing in nine points for the team. Memphis, Tenn. native Orange led the crew finishing fourth with a time of 1:49.10. Former NCAA Elite 89 award winner Pisechko came in sixth while Thomas came in eighth with times of 1:49.66 and 1:53.28 respectively. Distance runners Gabe Gonzalez and Cameron Griffith put forth solid efforts and earned Arkansas more points in their respective events. Out of Sydney, Australia Griffith was the lone freshman competing in the mile but showed veteran poise on the big stage setting a personal record of 4:03.80. Racing in the 5K, Gonzalez battled a tough Ole Miss contingent and finished fifth overall.

Razorback hurdler Davon Anderson raced to a sixth place finish in his first SEC Championship. The sophomore transfer continues to show consistency as he posted a time of 7.87.

Clive Pullen sealed the gold-medal jump trifecta with a first place finish in the triple jump. Pullen picked up 10 points with a personal best jump of 16.55m/54-3.75. The Razorbacks sweep of the jumps yielded an astounding 42 of the teams 109 points.

Heptathletes Brad Culp and Derek Jacobus got in on the point production as well with fourth and seventh place finishes respectively. Both Culp and Jacobus earned personal records and moved up the Razorbacks' all-time indoor top times list. Culp propelled himself in day two of events to a point total of 5651 after impressive showings in the pole vault and 60 meter hurdles. The new PR total for Culp moved him up to third on the indoor top times list. Jacobus, the sophomore transfer also moved up to sixth on the list with as he collected 5336 points through the seven events.

Arkansas's relay teams capped off the night the same way the day started, producing the


Razorbacks points. The Distance Medley Relay team and 4x400 relay team combined to secure nine points. The distance medley relay team came in fourth place with a time of 9:41.38 and the 4x400 meter relay team finished fifth with a 3:09.46.

### **NCAA INDOOR**

Arkansas men's track and field team checked in at No. 1 in the latest USTFCCCA polls. The Razorbacks led the nation in NCAA qualifiers securing 12 opportunities to score at the 2016 NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championship in Birmingham, Ala. on March 11-12.

Ranked 10th in the first rankings release on Jan. 6, Arkansas has since seen the progress in the development of both its veteran and new student-athletes. The Razorbacks last won the national indoor championship in 2013 collecting points from 15 of their 18 qualifiers.


Ranked 10th in the first rankings release on Jan. 6, Arkansas has since seen the progress in the development of both its veteran and new student-athletes. The Razorbacks last won the national indoor championship in 2013 collecting points from 15 of their 18 qualifiers.

Bowerman Watch List selection Jarrion Lawson leads the Razorback charge as the NCAA co-leader in the long jump. Lawson holds the fifth best performance in NCAA history with his PR of 8.39m/27-6.5 which won the senior a national indoor long jump title in 2014. In addition to his performance in the field Lawson is also a major contributor on the track qualifying for nationals in the 60-meter dash and as a member of the 4x400-meter relay team.

The Arkansas men's track and field team collected a phenomenal 25 points on the final day of the 2016 NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championship in Birmingham, Ala. Already with one national champion, the Razorbacks picked up another with Clive Pullen who placed first in the triple jump.

Arkansas's runner-up finish marked its fifth consecutive NCAA indoor top-three performance since the 2012 season.

Leaping to SEC gold one week earlier Pullen returned to the runway as the No. 4 best collegian in a talented triple jump field. The Kingston, Jamaica native opened Clive Pullen, 1st (Triple Jump)



With Jarrion Lawson (long jump) and Pullen's golden efforts, Arkansas successfully swept the horizontal jumps at the NCAA meet for the eighth time in program history.

Continuing to carry momentum from their solid showing on day one the Razorbacks picked up points in the 60, 200 and 800 propelling them to their second place finish.


Lawson and Kenzo Cotton kicked off the track efforts placing fifth and seventh respectively in the 60-meter dash. Already a national champion in the field, Lawson put out an outstanding effort on the track clocking a new PR of 6.60. Only a sophomore, Cotton followed suit running 6.70 to secure his first individual All-America honor.

Another underclassman to score for the Razorbacks, freshman Carlton Orange placed sixth in the 800-meter run in 1:49.69. A USATF Junior champion in the 800 last year, Orange kept pace with the group through the majority of the race. Determined to contribute to the team, Orange dug deep over the final 50 meters to passing several competitors to

finish inside the top eight as the second best freshman in the coun-

Following completion of the 800-meter run short-sprints specialist Cotton returned to the track for the 200-meter dash finals. Blasting out of the blocks in the first section Cotton cruised to an easy heat victory as the only sub-20 performer. His time of 20.74 placed him third overall in an event almost entirely dominated by SEC competitors.

Following their tremendous effort at the 2016 NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championship the No. 2 Arkansas men's track and field

team picked up 13 All-America honors, announced by the USTFCCCA on Monday afternoon.

The Razorbacks racked up 39 points at the national indoor meet to place among the top three schools in the country for the fifth consecutive year. Arkansas moved up one spot from last year, when they placed third, to cap the 2016 indoor season as the national runner-ups.

Arkansas's two best performers of the weekend were horizontal jumpers Jarrion Lawson and Clive Pullen who earned individual national titles in the long jump and triple jump respectively.

The NCAA event win was the first for Pullen and the second for Lawson. The weekend also marked the eighth time in program history that the Razorbacks have swept both events. Lawson's career total of 33 points in the long jump surpassed former NCAA long jump career-point leader and Razorback legend Erick Walder who held the record with his total of 30 points since 1994.

In addition to Lawson and Pullen, sophomore Kenzo Cotton placed in the top three off his 20.74 performance in the 200-meter finals.

Arkansas received seven First Team honors and six Second Team honors.



### **SEC OUTDOOR**

The fourth-ranked Arkansas men's track and field team advanced five Razorbacks out of three event preliminaries and placed two runners in the 10,000-meter run on day one of the 2016 Southeastern Conference Outdoor Championships.

#### **Combined Events**

Arkansas decathletes Derek Jacobus (10.93 seconds), Brad Culp (10.94) and Lane Austell (11.13) opened up the meet for the Razorbacks with three lifetime best performances in the 100. A transfer from Northern lowa, Jacobus also posted a huge mark in the long jump of 7.25w/23-9 1/2 to finish as the fourth-best in the event. The trio also posted career bests in the 400 with Jacobus and Austell racing to the sub-50 second performances to cap the first day of the competition.

Gabe Gonzalez was the first Razorback to score points placing third in the 10K in 29:50.01. One of two Arkansas runners to score in the event, Gonzalez was joined by newcomer Andrew Ronoh who crossed the finish line in fifth place to add four points to the team total.

The No. 4 Arkansas men's track and field team had a remarkable afternoon at Sam Bailey Track Stadium in Tuscaloosa on day two of the 2016 Southeastern Conference Outdoor Championships.

The Razorbacks amassed 35 points from wins in the 3,000-meter steeplechase and long jump while also placing two student-athletes among each event's top five.


Arkansas heads into the final day of competition ranked second by a one point margin behind Georgia.

#### **SEC Champions**

Senior captain Jarrion Lawson was the first Razorback to win an individual title with a first attempt mark in the long jump of 7.91/25-11.

The mark remained the best performance through the duration of the event, giving the Texarkana, Texas native

his second conference title of the year.



Cross country All-American Frankline Tonui followed Lawson's performance with a spectacular showing of his own as the lowa Central transfer posted a new lifetime best of 8 minutes, 39.82 seconds to earn a gold medal in the 3KSC.

Confident in his speed and endurance, Tonui raced to the front from the start of the race and maintained pace with the event leaders through the majority of the competition. Upon entering the bell lap, Tonui shifted gears, opening up his stride to cover more ground than his competitors never yielding in speed until the title was well in hand.



Not the only success stories of the day, Lawson and Tonui were joined by teammates Andreas Trajkovski (long jump) and Cale Wallace (3,000-meter steeplechase) who both added to the Razorbacks' point totals through exceptional performances of their own.

In the first SEC Outdoor Championship of his career, Trajkovski picked up four points with a fifth-place in the long jump with his best mark of the day 7.48/24-6.

Although more familiar with the conference meet, Wallace had the most productive SEC championship of his career with eight points for his runner-up finish in the 3,000-meter steeplechase. His new PR in the event of 8:41.47 ranks Wallace as the

10th-best performer in program history.

Razorback multis Derek Jacobus (seventh) and Lane Austell (eighth) also contributed to the Arkansas's team total combining to collect three points off a pair of top-eight finishes in the decathlon.

Behind an incredible final day performance, the fourth-ranked Arkansas men's track and field team went from second place to a 20-point win at the 2016 Southeastern Conference (SEC) Outdoor Championships to complete the program's 15th SEC Triple Crown.

The Razorbacks bested three of the strongest programs in the country, taking down No. 1 Texas A&M, No. 2 Florida and No. 3 LSU en route to their 19th SEC outdoor title with a score of 121, good for a 20-point margin over the second-place Aggies.

### SEC OUTDOOR

Arkansas senior captain Jarrion Lawson led the way for the Razorbacks, collecting 20 points towards the team total. Lawson took home the title the long jump, a runner-up finish with the 4-x-100-meter relay squad, a fourth-place showing in the 100 and sixth place finish in the 200.

Other Razorback individual event champions included Frankline Tonui in the 3,000-meter steeplechase and Clive Pullen who won the triple jump with an NCAA-leading mark of 16.78/55-0 3/4.

In the middle distance and distance events the Razorbacks accumulated 51 points. Jack Bruce, Austen Dalquist, Alex George and Wallace all placed in the 5K, while Carlton Orange and Ryan Thomas did the same in the 800. Arkansas also placed two in the 10K (Gabe Gonzalez and Andrew Ronoh) and steeplechase (Tonui and Wallace) while Bruce backed up his 5K performance in the 1,500.

The sprint events were highlighted by the aforementioned 4-x-100 relay runner-up finish as the Razorback relay team of Kenzo Cotton, Lawson, Roy Ejiakuekwu and Josh Washington combined to run the third-fastest time in program history at 38.96 seconds. The quartet joins LSU as the only other program to post a sub-39 second performance in the event this season.

Along with Lawson, Cotton contributed in the open sprints placing fifth behind his teammate in the 100 racing to a lifetime best of 10.28.

Hurdle trio Davon Anderson, Larry Donald and Kemar Mowatt all contributed to the team win, Anderson placing fourth in the 110 hurdles with a PR of 13.82, while Mowatt and Donald finished fourth and sixth, respectively, in the 400 hurdles.

Ken LeGassey added eight points to the team total with a second-place finish in the high jump off a clearance of 2.19/7-2 1/4.

Decathletes Lane Austell and Derek Jacobus also had productive weekends, as the combined event performers both posted top-eight finishes in the event. Jacobus led the way with a new PR of 7,356 points for seventh place. The Razorbacks capped the afternoon with a seventh-place finish in the 4-x-400 off the heels of Ejiakuekwu, Eric Janise, Anderson and Obi Igbokwe.





Following a tumultuous weather-stricken opening day at the 2016 NCAA West Preliminary, the No. 5 Arkansas men's track and field team returned on day two resilient and determined to succeed in spite of the poor conditions. The Razorback men secured 12 NCAA qualifiers in the form of 11 student-athletes in eight events during the second day of the regional competition.

Lawson (10.29) and Washington (10.20) advanced automatically as the winners of heats one and four, respectively, while Cotton qualified as the fastest non-heat winner in a new PR of 10.25 seconds. The trio will return to Hayward Field with Washington leading the way as the top performer out of the West.

#### 400 Meters

• Freshman Obi Igbokwe raced to the fifth-best time of the day in the 400 with a time of 46.32, qualifying for the second national championship meet of his career in his first year as a Razorback. The performance was a new outdoor personal best for The Woodlands, Texas native and distinguished him as one of the best underclassmen quarter-milers of 2016.

#### 800 Meters

• Ryan Thomas picked up the final qualifying spot of the day in the 800 with his time of 1:48.77 in heat three. Thomas had the 11th-best overall performance of the day and was the third-best Southeastern Conference (SEC) performer in the event. The senior heads to outdoor nationals with a personal best of 1 minute, 47.62 seconds which placed him fifth

at the 2016 SEC Outdoor Championships.

#### 10,000 Meters

 Razorback captain Gabe Gonzalez was the first to earn a trip to Eugene following his fourth-place finish in the 10K in 29 minutes, 52.76 seconds. The Northwest Arkansas native matched pace with a lead pack of about 10 runners through the majority of the 25-lap race before surging into the top five over the last 400 meters to secure his spot in Oregon.

#### 400 Meter Hurdles

• The top performer in the intermediate hurdles earlier this season at 🍱 the Texas Relays, Larry Donald battled through the quarterfinal races at the preliminary round to advance to Oregon off his time of 51.17 in heat one. Donald is the first Razorback to qualify for nationals in the event since Caleb Cross in 2012 and was one of only two SEC competitors to make it through to the semifinals in Eugene.



Lawson was joined by international standouts Kurt Jenner (Australia) and Andreas Trajkovski (Denmark), who also advanced to the NCAA long jump final with the sixth and seventh-best performances of the day, respectively.

The No. 5 Arkansas men's track and field team secured an impressive 20 national qualifiers (inclusive of two decathletes) in 13 events during the three-day NCAA West Preliminary, securing the team's reputation as one of the most well-rounded programs in the nation.

Senior captain Jarrion Lawson put on a show for the spectators at Rock Chalk Park gaining three automatic berths to outdoor nationals in the 100-meter dash, the 200 and long jump as well as contributing to the Razorbacks' national qualifying 4-x-100-meter relay team.

Along with Lawson, 2015 4-x-100 NCAA national champions Kenzo Cotton and Margueze Washington both qualified for the

national championship in the 100 and the 200, with Cotton also assisting the Razorbacks' 4-x-100 and 4-x-400 efforts.

Arkansas will travel its large squad to Hayward Field in just over one week in preparation for the 2016 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championship on June 8-11.

#### 2016 NCAA Qualifiers - Saturday, May 28 200 Meters

· Carrying over their dominance in the 100 on day two, Cotton, Lawson and Washington proved to be just as formidable in the 200 on the final day of competition. The exceptional trio posted three of the four-best times in the West region led by Lawson's personal best of 20.17 seconds, which ranked the Bowerman Watch List No. 2 on Arkansas' all-time bests list. Cotton also collected a new PR of 20.35 to advance as the fastest non-heat winner while Margueze Washington cruised to an easy heat win in 20.54.

- Razorback team members Obi Igbokwe, Cotton, Eric Janise and Jamarco Stephen completed Arkansas' outstanding stead at the regional meet becoming the program's 20th national qualifier with a season's best performance in the 4-x-400 with a time of 3:05.62.

Resolute in its pursuit of national success, the No. 5 Arkansas men's track and field team held nothing back on the first day of the 2016 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championship at the historic Hayward Field in Eugene. Arkansas senior and 15-time All-American Jarrion Lawson struck gold for the fourth time in his career claiming the NCAA

his second attempt. Coming off the 200-meter semifinal, Lawson opened up the long jump finals in remarkable form, improving by almost two full feet with a mark of 8.13m/26-8 1/4. Lawson is the fourth Razorback in history to sweep the NCAA indoor and outdoor long jump competition (Mike Conley, Erick Walder and Robert Howard).

Another Arkansas senior delivered dividends for the Razorbacks as Springdale native Gabe Gonzalez completed his career in cardinal red and white as a first team All-American from a bronze-medal finish in the 10,000. Gonzalez took off from the sound of the gun and maintained pace with the lead pack through the majority of the race. With 2K left, Gonzalez joined an elite group of six including dis-

tance talents Futsum Zienasellassie of Northern Arizona and Edward Cheserek of Oregon distancing themselves from the rest of the field. In the final 400 of the 25 lap-race, Gonzalez displayed hidden strength powering around the second bend and on to the home stretch to score six points, the first points of the night for Arkansas.

The final day of 2016 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championship saw Arkansas men's track and field team cap its year at Hayward Field as one of the three best programs in the nation for the third time in four years.

The Razorback men finished the outdoor season up three spots from their No. 5 ranking as the NCAA national runner-ups with a score of 56 points, narrowly edged out by Southeastern Conference rival Florida who won the national title by a six point margin.

#### Bowerman Watch List Selection: Jarrion Lawson

The SEC indoor and outdoor Scholar-Athlete of the Year, Lawson, displayed incredible athleticism over the men's two-day competition.

Lawson kicked off the final meet of his collegiate career on Wednesday afternoon earning spots in the finals of three events (100, 200 and 4-x-100) and leaping to the fourth national crown of his career with a mark of 8.15m/26-9 in the long jump.

A now 19-time All-American, Lawson showed off his versatility navigating through three event finals with ease. His Friday began with bronze-medal finish as the second leg of the 4-x-100-meter relay which was promptly followed by not one but two gold medal-meriting efforts in the 100 (10.22) and 200 (20.19).

Currently in contention to receive the most prestigious award in track and field, The Bowerman, Lawson completed his career at Arkansas as a six-time NCAA national champion with five top-10 program performances and one Razorback record (100 - 10.04).

#### **#NCAATF Scorers**

Kenzo Cotton was another major Razorback contributor collecting 7.5 points with a seventh place finish in the 100, fifth place in the 200 and a third place with the 4-x-100 relay. His performance at the national meet was remarkable considering his battle with injuries earlier on in the season. A product of La Vista, Nebraska, Cotton will join Lawson at the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials as a qualifier in the 100 and 200.

Senior Gabe Gonzalez was the first Razorback to score as the Springdale, Arkansas native placed third in Wednesday's final section of the 10K in 29 minutes 11.09 seconds. Gonzalez's top-eight finish earned him the second All-America honor of his decorated career as a Razorback.



Arkansas newcomers Kemar Mowatt and Josh Washington became immediate impact-makers for the Razorbacks earning the opportunity to be a part of one of the best 4-x-100 relays in the nation. Mowatt and Washington along with Cotton and Lawson combined to record the second fastest time in the event in program history with 38.49 placing the quartet third. The crew only ranks behind the 2015 NCAA championship team (inclusive of Cotton and Lawson) who won last year's race in 38.47. Iowa Central transfer Frankline Tonui PR'd in the 3,000-meter steeplechase by nine seconds since his SEC victory a few weeks earlier in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Tonui put on a sensational performance in the event keeping stride with the lead pack before moving up from fourth place to runner-up over the final 400 meters of the race.

A true competitor, Tonui leaned across the finish as he was coming through the line edging out Edwin Kibichiy of Louisville by .04 of a second.

Through three seasons (cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field) Arkansas men's cross country and track and field have placed no lower than sixth at a national meet, amassed 38 All-American honors and secured all three SEC titles.












### LAWSON'S LEGACY



Athletically and academically gifted long before setting foot on 'The Hill', Jarrion Lawson's time at the University of Arkansas brought immeasurable success and noteworthy achievement to an already venerated track and field program.

Lawson received an abundance of national attention after a record setting NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships and a remarkable senior campaign. Due to his performance throughout the season, Lawson was recognized as the USTFCCCA Men's Track Athlete of the Year.

Lawson is the first Razorback to win the outdoor award since the new format was presented in 2006. Combining his success from the indoor and outdoor season, Lawson landed on the Bowerman Men's Watch List for the 12th time in his career. He is the second male athlete from Arkansas to be named a semifinalist for the prestigious award as Omar McLeod became the first last year.

The Bowerman emerged in 2009 as the top award in collegiate track and field presented annually to the most outstanding male and female athletes in the country. Past recipients of the trophy include Olympians and World championship medalists.

The Texarkana, Texas, native etched his name in history as he accomplished a feat that had not been seen in 80 years since track legend Jesse Owens competed in 1936. Lawson joined the decorated Olympian as the only men to win the 100, 200 and long jump triple. With more still in his tank, Lawson also ran a leg of the 4-x-100 relay helping the team to a third place finish. The senior captain led the way for the Razorbacks as he brought in 31.5 points guiding the team to a second place finish, their highest since 2003. The point total for Lawson also broke the modern-era scoring record set by former Razorback Mike Conley.

Lawson pulled in four All-American honors to go with his three gold medals to swell his career totals and

make him a 19-time All-American and six-time gold medalist. Lawson also joined elite company in his signature event as he became the fourth long jumper in Razorback history to win both the NCAA indoor and outdoor titles in the event. Claiming the crown in the long jump for the SEC Indoor and Outdoor Championships as well, Lawson played a significant role in helping the Razorbacks secure their 15th SEC Triple Crown.

Fresh off his national triple crown performance, Arkansas senior Jarrion Lawson was selected as a nominee for the Best Male College Athlete category at the 2016 ESPY awards on July 13 in Los Angeles. He is the first collegiate track and field athlete ever to be nominated in that category since the award show's inception.

A five-time NCAA national champion, Lawson followed in the footsteps of American sports legend Jesse Owens becoming the second man in history to capture gold medals in the 100-meter dash, the 200 and long jump at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championship.

His awe-inspiring performance, which included a bronze medal finish at the second leg of the 400 relay, allowed him to contribute an incredible amount of points to the Razorback men's overall team total. Lawson individually accounted for 31.5 of the final tally of 56.

One of the most decorated athletes to ever don an Arkansas uniform, Lawson has reached the podium at eight NCAA championships on 17 different occasions - four times apiece during the

past two outdoor seasons.

He holds program records in the 100 (10.04) and 400 relay (38.47) as well as ranking among the top eight in six additional events on Arkansas' all-time bests list.

At the 2016 USTFCCCA Convention in a room full of track and field coaches and enthusiasts as well as his family, friends and coaches, Lawson was selected as the 2016 Bowerman Award winner - the crowning individual achievement in NCAA track and field for a student-athlete.

#### Looking Back

Lawson arrived on campus from Texarkana, Texas, in 2012 as a raw, gangly jumping phenom without the slightest expectation of what his future held yet trusting firmly in three coaches who had his best interest at heart.

He earned his first national standing in March 2013 with a fourthplace finish in the long jump, scoring five points toward Arkansas' 41st NCAA team title. That meet marked the first-and last-time he would ever compete in just one event on the national stage. By his sophomore year, his growing skill set earned him a spot on the top of the podium, seizing a gold medal with the third-best mark (8.39m/27-6.5) in NCAA indoor meet history.

Lawson was simply special.

More greatness was unleashed his junior season when the once jumps-focused star emerged in 2015 as one of the strongest sprinters in the country. After clocking a program-record 10.04 in the semifinal round at the NCAA outdoor meet, Lawson ran to a bronze finish in a wind-aided 9.90 performance. He went on to bring home the first non-jumps NCAA gold of his career with a powerful second leg as a member of the Razorbacks' 4\pm 100-meter relay squad. Lawson teamed with Omar McLeod, Kenzo Cotton and Margueze Washington to post a school-record time of 38.47.

As fruitful as his output was during his first three years as a Razorback, Lawson saved the best for last, valiantly giving his all for the team during his senior year to the tune of four individual gold medals and one bronze at the indoor and outdoor nationals meets.

Legendary Razorback coach John McDonnell once likened the coming of Mike Conley to Arkansas as Michael Jordan to the Chicago Bulls. The same can be said about Lawson, the promising freshman that came to Fayetteville in 2012 and departed as a legend with 19 All-America certificates, six NCAA event titles and the 2016 Bowerman Award.

Upon graduating Lawson continued his historic 2016 season, thundering down the runway in Rio de Janeiro on Saturday evening in the long jump finals as fans marveled at his power and explosion off the board and into the perfectly manicured sandpit.

The 2016 Bowerman Award winner placed fourth in his Olympic debut in the action-packed competition which saw four athletes mark jumps exceeding 27 feet.

The world-leader in the long jump heading into the Olympic Games, Lawson opened Friday's qualifying round with a solid leap of 7.99m/26-2 3/4. 




### **ROAD TO RIO**



Considered by most as 'the best track and field team in the world,' United States Track and Field (USATF) announced its Olympic delegates Monday afternoon for the 2016 Olympic Games on August 5-21 in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Among the delegates announced, six members of the newly formed Team USA - Taylor Ellis-Watson, Tyson Gay, Jarrion Lawson, Sandi Morris, Lexi Weeks and Chrishuna Williams – are current or former University of Arkansas student-athletes.

The announcement came following the completion of the 2016 U.S. Olympic Trials which saw over 170,000 fans travel to Hayward Field in Eugene, Oregon, to take in a bevy of awe-inspiring performances over a 10-day span.

Of the six Razorback U.S. qualifiers, Gay is the lone returning Olympian having first represented Team USA in 2008 (Beijing) and a second time in 2012 (London).

All of the five new Arkansas Olympians – including recent graduates Ellis-Watson, Lawson, Morris (2015) and Williams (2015) as well as freshman phenom Weeks - train in Fayetteville, Arkansas, under the guidance of their respective college event coaches.

A three-pronged dynamo, Lawson led the Razorback men academically, on the track and in the field. He followed his historic collegiate senior season which saw him match Jesse Owens' NCAA accomplishments with a world-leading mark (8.58m/28-1 3/4) and

second-place finish at the trials.

Already a tested and proven Olympic medalist, Gay raced onto his third-consecutive U.S. national 400 relay pool off two top-six finishes in the 100-meter dash and 200. Set to celebrate his 34th birthday in Brazil, Gay showed the world that he's still capable of posting fast times, clocking a sub-10 second time in the 100 for a 10th-straight year earlier this season in June.

One of the premier track and field teams in the world, the Jamaican Athletics Administrative Association (JAAA) announced its Olympic delegates Tuesday for the 2016 Olympic Games on August 5-21 in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.

The newly formed Team Jamaica features four members among the delegates announced - Kemoy Campbell, Veronica Campbell-Brown, Omar McLeod, and Clive Pullen - that are current or former University of Arkansas student-athletes. The announcement was made following the final day of qualification permitted by the International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF).

Two of the three new Arkansas Olympians - McLeod and Pullen - train in Fayetteville, Arkansas, under the guidance of their respective college event coaches.

Following a breakthrough year, Pullen continued to build on his collegiate success. The NCAA Indoor Triple Jump

champion, Pullen became the first Jamaican to qualify for the Olympics after setting a personal best of 16.90m/55-5 1/2 and claiming gold at the National Senior Championships.

The national record holder in the 5,000, Campbell defended his crown in the event cruising to a first place finish. Campbell, a 2015 Razorback graduate, already met the Olympic standard after posting the second-best time in Arkansas history with a 13:20.39 in the event at the 2015 Payton Jordan Invitational.

An already accomplished professional in his first full season on the circuit, McLeod has won a World Indoor Championships title in the 60-meter hurdles and is the only hurdler in the world under 13 seconds in the 110 hurdles. McLeod returned home to claim his second-straight 110-meter hurdle title at the National Senior Championships with a time of 13.01.

Recent Arkansas graduate Jarrion Lawson continued his historic 2016 season, thundering down the runway in Rio de Janeiro on Saturday evening in the long jump finals as fans marveled at his power and explosion off the board and into the perfectly manicured sandpit.

Four-time NCAA national champion Omar McLeod cruised into the 110-meter hurdle semifinals in front of a rain-saturated crowd as the heat one winner in 13.27 seconds in his Olympic debut. Ignoring the less than ideal conditions, McLeod focused on the mission at hand, obtaining an automatic next-round gualification .23 seconds ahead of the first section runner-up.

McLeod heads into the semifinal as the only competitor with a season's best sub-13 second performance to his credit. There will be three semifinal heats tomorrow at 6:40 p.m. CST. The top two runners from each heat plus the next two fastest times will advance to the final to be contested at 8:45 p.m.

The best performer of the day in his event, McLeod was the lone Razorback to make it out of today's qualifying rounds. First-time Olympic qualifier Clive Pullen (triple jump) put forth a solid effort but both came up short in his attempts to move on to next round competition.

No. 1 in the preliminary and semifinal rounds of the 110-meter hurdle competition, Omar McLeod proved to be unrivaled in the international meeting of the world's best, sprinting to first place in the final section of the event in his Olympic debut with a time of 13.05 seconds.

He is the third Razorback, joining Michael Conley (Barcelona, '92) and Veronica Campbell-Brown (Athens, '04 and Beijing '08) to ever win an Olympic gold and the first to do so since Pullen on the Rio runway Campbell-Brown's 200 victory at the 2008 games in Beijing.



McLeod is also the third member of Jamaica's athletics delegation to earn a spot on top of the podium, joining the elite company of Usain Bolt (100) and Elaine Thompson (100). One of the most dominant hurdlers in NCAA history McLeod is the countries' first gold medalist in the event.

Improving his speed through each round, McLeod proved unaffected by the preliminary competition's torrential downpours, slicing through the rain with a powerful lead to cross the finish in 13.27. As the weather conditions improved,

so did McLeod, taking advantage of the increased clarity and dry surface to clean up his race execution in the semifinals by coming through in 13.15.

Lining up in lane five for the final track and field event of the day McLeod gave the audience a reason to cheer, besting the event's runner up by .12 seconds as he closed his first Olympic outing with a gold medal-meriting performance. With his March World Indoor Championship 60 hurdle gold and Olympic triumph in the 110 hurdles, McLeod has

successfully completed the world high-hurdle sweep.

Two bronze medals proved just out of reach for Team USA 4-x-100 relay members Tyson Gay and Jarrion Lawson as the group was disqualified following their third place finish for an illegal exchange.



#### NCAA Individual Champions

#### Joe Falcon - 1987



One of the most decorated distance runners in Arkansas history, Joe Falcon compiled seven NCAA titles, 15 SEC crowns and was named an All-American 11 times. He was the 3,000-meter champion in 1987 and 1988, indoor mile champ in 1988, outdoor 10,000-meter champion in 1987, outdoor 1,500-meter champion in 1988 and NCAA cross country champion in 1987.

His NCAA win in 1987 propelled Arkansas to its third NCAA Cross Country team title. Falcon and the squad recorded a team score of 87 to edge out Dartmouth (119 points).

Falcon was ranked among the top distance runners in the world throughout his career by Track and Field News, including a No. 1 ranking at 5,000 meters in 1989 and 1,500 meters in 1990. He was the champion of the annual Oslo Dream Mile in 1990 in Oslo, Norway with a time of 3:49.31, a race that saw his fastest 1,500-meter split: 3:33.6.

#### Godfrey Siamusiye- 1995, 1996



A two-time Olympian for his native Zambia, Godfrey Siamusiye competed at 5,000 meters in the 1992 Barcelona Games and in the 3,000 meter steeplechase at the 1996 games in Atlanta. He finished 10th in his semifinal heat of the steeplechase with a time of 8:37.41. At Arkansas he was a two-time NCAA Champion in cross country (1995-96), and a back-to-back champion in the outdoor 10,000 meters (1995-96).

Siamusiye's race win in 1995 led Arkansas to its eighth NCAA Cross Country team title. The '95 squad scored 100 points to beat Northern Arizona's 142 points. Arkansas earned an NCAA runner-up finish in the team race behind Siamusiye's win in 1996.

His individual exploits translated into team success for Arkansas. He was a member of four NCAA-title teams as the Razorbacks pulled off the national triple crown in 1995 and captured the 1996 outdoor crown. Siamusiye also helped Arkansas to five SEC team titles, the league triple crown in 1995 in addition to the 1996 cross country and outdoor team honors.

#### **HISTORIC SENIOR WALK**

As you make your way around campus, you're sure to notice something unique about many of the sidewalks. Historic Senior Walk showcases the names of more than 150,000 University of Arkansas graduates, grouped by year of graduation. Senior Walk is the university's longest tradition in both length and years. It's concrete proof of

the university's commitment to students.

Senior Walk is also a perfect example of how the University of Arkansas celebrates its history and traditions while focusing on innovations for the future. When the costs involved in hand-etching names into concrete forced numerous other universities to give up, the U of A turned to its physical plant and engineering school grads

to create a one-of-a-kind computerized sandblasting machine: the SandHog. Each summer, the SandHog roars across campus etching the names of new graduates into sidewalks.

#### **OLD MAIN**

One of the original buildings on Arkansas' campus, Old Main symbolizes the strong connection to the past and the focus upon the future which come together in the present at the University of Arkansas. Completed in 1875, Old Main stood the test of time until the mid-1980s when age and modern building codes threatened to send it to the wrecking ball as had happened to its sister building at the University of Illinois. A major fundraising campaign by alumni totally renovated Old Main. Reopening in 1992, the building maintains the feel of a Victorian-era building with high ceilings and elaborate wooden trim. Just below the surface of the period hardwood floors, Old Main is hard-wired to the internet and built to last well into its second century.

Even with renovation, Old Main remained unfinished until 2005. One of the gifts during the Campaign for the Twenty-First Century specified the installation of a clock, originally planned for the blank faces of the south

As mentioned, Old Main was built from shared plans with its counterpart on the Illinois campus, with one important difference. The north tower of Arkansas' Old Main is taller than the south tower. Legend says this was symbolic of the Civil War as the lead engineer was a northern veteran.

### RANDAL TYSON TRACK CENTER



In a re-dedication ceremony held Feb. 12, 2011, during the 2011 Tyson Invitational in Fayetteville, the Randal Tyson Track Center was recognized as "The Home of the Fastest Indoor Track in the World." The Razorbacks' home indoor track was resurfaced prior to the start of the 2011 track and field season.

In 2000, the Randal Tyson Track Center first opened on the University of Arkansas campus with the specially designed track, originally built by Mondo for the World Championships in Toronto, Canada. Since opening, the Razorbacks' home facility has played host to several world-class indoor meets, including six SEC Championships—most recently, the 2011 indoor conference meet—and 10 NCAA Championships.

Widely considered as the fastest indoor surface ever constructed, the Tyson track has been home to numerous world records, American records and an impressive 65 percent of all current NCAA Championship meet records. Arkansas will increase its number of national hosting duties to 11 with the 2013 NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships which will be held March 8-9, 2013, in Fayetteville.

In its first year of operation, the \$8 million facility hosted the Tyson Invitational, a meet on the Golden Spike Tour, the 2000 Southeastern Conference Championships and the 2000 NCAA Indoor Championships. In 2001 and 2002, the Randal Tyson Track Center once again served as the host for the Golden Spike Tour's Tyson Invitational and the NCAA Indoor Championships.

During the 2003 season, three events were held at the state-of-the-art facility: the SEC West Challenge, the Tyson Invitational and the NCAA Championships. The 2004 campaign saw four exciting events take place at the Randal Tyson Track Center, including the Arkansas, Razorback and Tyson Invitational meets and the national championships.

The schedule was full in 2005 as the Arkansas, Razorback and Tyson Invitationals and the SEC and NCAA Championships were all held at the Tyson Track Center.

A new 36x20 custom video scoreboard system by Daktronics was installed in time for the 2005 NCAA Championships. It features a 23x13 video display screen with instant replay, electronic timing and scoring capabilities.

The track itself is a 200-meter, 60-degree banked track that has 55-meter straightways running the entire length of the facility. It also includes men's and women's jumping runways and pits. The surface of the track is red and gray Mondo and was repainted in 2003.

With all of the big name events that are held in the facility, the Tyson Track Center was built to handle the demands for the many media outlets. The press box is two-tiered offering 50 seats and has an announcer's booth. There are four elevated camera positions located around the track. A media room is also available in the north concourse.

#### FOWLER FAMILY TRAINING CENTER



The facility provides approximately 52,000 square feet of climate-controlled practice space, including a full size practice infield, throwing area, batting areas and ancillary team spaces. For track and field it provides an expansive check in and warm up area for track meets and will allow all indoor meet throwing events to be held on site.

The Fowler Family Baseball and Track Training Center provides an expansive check in and warm up area for track meets and will allow all indoor meet throwing events to be held on site.

The weight throw and discus practice/competition area is separate from the baseball training area allowing for dual training in the facility. For track competition, this facility will allow for all throwing events to be held at the Fowler Family Baseball and Track Training Center instead of the Walker Pavilion.

The facility also includes four (4) 60 meter sprint lanes for track meet warm-up prior to events.

With addition of this venue adjacent to Tyson Indoor Track Facility, track events will conduct clerking/warm-up here and make existing warm-up space in Tyson Indoor being converted to a shared strength and conditioning space and satellite training room.



#### JOHN MCDONNELL FIELD



Serving as the outdoor home to the most successful program in NCAA history, John McDonnell Field is one of the top outdoor track and field facilities in the nation. Named for legendary head coach John McDonnell, the winner of 40 NCAA national championships during his career at Arkansas, the facility will add to its list of competition duties with the recent announcement as the host of the 2014 NCAA West Preliminary.

The state-of-the-art competition areas include a nine-lane Mondo track, a grass infield as well as a full hammer cage and multiple throw areas. The pole vault and jumping pits are reversible and contain two sets of runways to accommodate multiple events. Capacity is currently set at 7,000 with the potential to hold 10,000 with additional construction.

John McDonnell Field played host to the 2006 Southeastern Conference Championships, the 2008 NCAA Mideast Regional Championships, the 2009 NCAA Outdoor Championships, in addition to the annual John McDonnell Invitational. The 2006 SEC and 2009 NCAA meets were the first in what promises to be a long line of prominent events slated for the facility.

#### **JERRY & GENE JONES ACADEMIC SUCESS CENTER**



The new Jerry & Gene Jones Family Student-Athlete Success Center is designed to address the academic, nutritional, personal and professional development of more than 460 student-athletes, creating an integrated academic support program focused on graduation of all student-athletes at the University of Arkansas. The Student-Athlete Success Center will become the new home of the Bogle Academic Center and will help meet the needs of student-athletes by providing multiple learning environments including academic advising and course preparation, leadership training through the Razorback Leadership Academy career planning and service learning. The facility is being constructed at the corner of Meadow and Stadium between Pomfret Hall and John McDonnell Field.

#### Overview

To support the health of student-athletes and meet the specialized needs of sports nutrition, a dining hall and a full-service kitchen will be integral components of the building. The facility will also include offices for the sports psychologist, nutritionist, and student-athlete development staff.

The Jerry and Gene Jones Family Student-Athlete Success center will help address the academic, nutritional, personal and professional development of more than 460 student-athletes in a 55,000 square foot facility, creating an integrated academic support program focused on graduation of all student-athletes at the University of Arkansas.

The facility will accommodate multiple learning environments including academic advising and course preparation, leadership training through the Razorback Leadership Academy, career planning and service learning. The center will also house student-athlete educational programs designed to foster healthy life choices and maximize performance through nutrition.

#### **Academics**

The facility will include tutorial rooms, group study rooms, quiet study areas, computer labs and learning labs focused on mathematics, writing, and language skills as well as a 138-seat auditorium, which could be made available to campus for special events.







### CHANCELLOR DR. JOSEPH E. STEINMETZ

Joseph E. Steinmetz became the sixth chancellor of the University of Arkansas on January 1, 2016. Prior to this appointment, he was Ohio State's chief academic officer. As executive vice president and provost, he oversaw the administration, coordination, and development of all academic functions of the university.

Dr. Steinmetz joined Ohio State in 2009 to serve as vice provost for arts and sciences and executive dean of the then-new College of Arts and Sciences. With his leadership, the former five independent colleges of arts and sciences were unified into the largest arts and sciences college in the country.

Before Ohio State, Dr. Steinmetz was dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the University of Kansas, where he was also a university distinguished professor. Before Kansas, Dr. Steinmetz spent 19 years at Indiana University, Bloomington where he served as Chair of the Department of Psychology, Executive Associate Dean of Arts and Sciences and a Distinguished Professor of Psychological and Brain Science.

A nationally respected behavioral neuroscientist, Dr. Steinmetz was recognized in 1996 by the National Academy of Sciences for his contributions to the fields of experimental psychology and neuroscience. In 2012 he was named an AAAS Fellow.

His research interests include neuroanatomical and neurophysiological substrates of learning and memory; the effects of alcohol on neural and behavioral function; neurobiological and behavioral models of fetal alcohol syndrome; and the neurobiology of simple human learning, memory, and cognitive function.

Dr. Steinmetz earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at Central Michigan University and his doctorate at Ohio University. He and his wife, Sandy, have two sons and four grandchildren.



# VICE CHANCELLOR AND DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS JEFF LONG

In his seventh full year as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics, Jeff Long has helped transform the University of Arkansas' Department of Intercollegiate Athletics into one of the most successful and nationally respected programs in the country. Along the way, Long has gained national attention and earned numerous awards for his progressive leadership of a program encompassing 19 sports and more than 460 student-athletes.

Long's appointment as the first ever chairman of the College Football Playoff Selection committee provided further evidence that he is already one of the most respected and influential leaders within intercollegiate athletics.

Long chairs a committee of 13 individuals that collectively features more than 230 years of college football experience two former top-level university administrators, five current athletics directors, three members of the College Football Hall of Fame, three former college football head coaches, a former United States Secretary of State, a former member of Congress, and a retired three-star general. As the playoff's selection committee's first chairman, Long will not only lead the distinguished group in selecting the best four college football teams for the inaugural playoff in 2014, but will help the committee define the parameters for selections for years to come.

Even before his appointment as the College Football Playoff Selection Committee's Chairman, Long's leadership and unwavering commitment to the student-athletes and maintaining integrity within intercollegiate athletics has not gone unnoticed. In 2013, Long was named as an Under Armour Athletics Director of the Year for the Football Bowl Subdivision. In 2012, Long was named a finalist for the SportsBusiness Journal and SportsBusiness Daily Athletic Director of the Year. In the spring of 2012, the Donald W. Reynolds Foundation and longtime chairman Fred W. Smith made a combined gift of more than \$1.25 million to the program in recognition of Long's leadership of Razorback Athletics.

Long leads a comprehensive athletics program committed to the development of student-athletes academically, athletically and socially. A member of Chancellor G. David Gearhart's Executive Committee, Long is helping to chart the course for the future of higher education at the University of Arkansas while integrating Razorback Athletics into the campus community.

In each of the past five years, Razorback Athletics has transferred funds totaling more than \$1 million to support the university's academic mission. For 2014-15, the department's total support of university and student programs and initiatives will include \$2.25 million in direct funding of academic programs including financial support for a new classroom and laboratory building to serve the entire University of Arkansas student population.

In Long's tenure, Arkansas has captured 19 conference championships and advanced to 94 post-season competitions, including the school's first Bowl Championship Series appearance in football and a national title at the 2013 NCAA Men's Indoor Track and Field Championships. In the Learfield Sports Directors Cup, a year-long competition ranking the nation's most successful intercollegiate athletic programs, Arkansas has finished in the top 30 programs nationally six times in the past seven years.

In the classroom, the Razorbacks continue to set new standards including posting a school record student-athlete grade point average of 3.18 in 2013-14. It marked the sixth consecutive year Razorback student-athletes posted a GPA exceeding 3.0. In 2014, for the second consecutive year, Arkansas exceeded the national APR multi-year rate in all 19 sports and had three teams earn NCAA Public Recognition awards. Graduation success rates continue to rise with a total of 112 current or former Razorback student-athletes graduating in 2013-14.

Student-athlete development has also been a priority including the establishment of the Razorback Leadership Academy, the first of its kind in the Southeastern Conference. In the community, Razorback student-athletes are more active than ever volunteering more than 6,500 hours of time for more various agencies, organizations and schools around the state.

One of the nation's most active athletic directors on Twitter, Long embraces the opportunity to interact with members of the Razorback Nation whether in person or through social media. He currently has more followers than any other athletics director.

Long was selected to replace legendary athletic director and former Razorback football coach Frank Broyles and even before he officially took the reins on Jan. 1, 2008, Arkansas announced that it would combine its previously independent men's and women's athletic programs into one combined athletic program. Long adeptly blended the men's and women's athletic departments into one unified department and established a new administrative structure.

Under Long's leadership, the program has fortified its financial standing ensuring more support for the development of studentathletes. According to USA Today, Arkansas is one of only 23 financially self-sustaining Division I-A athletic programs in the nation. As economic indicators were beginning to point toward challenging economic times, Long signed Arkansas to a deal with IMG College to form Razorback Sports Properties that guarantees the Razorback program \$73 million during the course of the decadelong agreement.

Long also negotiated an extensive all sports apparel and footwear agreement with NIKE, Inc. that will outfit all 19 Razorback sports programs through the 2014-15 season. In December 2012, Forbes Magazine estimated the value of the Razorback Football program at \$83 million, ranking the University of Arkansas in the top 10 nationally for the second consecutive year.

In 2010, Long moved to help meet the growing financial needs of fielding a nationally competitive all sports program. The athletic department launched the "Answer the Call" campaign through the Razorback Foundation which resulted in more than 2,600 new members and helped generate more than \$6.5 million in additional support for Razorback student-athletes. In 2012, Long guided the program to a record breaking fundraising year further bolstering Arkansas' financial strength.

With an eye towards the future, Long commissioned a comprehensive plan to assess the future facility needs of the program. Unveiled in October 2011, the Razorback Athletic Facilities Master Plan provided a vision and the road map for \$320 million of facility renovations and additions that will help all 19 Razorback sports remain competitive in the Southeastern Conference and nationally over the next 30 years. The first major project from the master plan, the \$40 million Fred W. Smith Football Center, opened in the summer of 2013. In the summer of 2014, the baseball and track indoor training center was completed. In addition, a Basketball Performance Center and Student-athlete Success Center are currently under construction.

According to a recent economic impact study, Razorback Athletics will have an estimated economic impact of more than \$1 billion in the next five years. The study estimated that Razorback Athletics generates \$153.6 million annually to the region's economy including the benefits of drawing more than a million fans annually to campus to cheer on the Razorbacks. Planned athletic construction during the course of the next five years will generate another \$239.7 million.

A veteran administrator with a track record of the highest commitment to the concept of "student-athlete," Long has had more than two decades experience in athletic administration at the Division I level including at the University of Pittsburgh, University of Oklahoma, University of Michigan, Virginia Tech University, Eastern Kentucky University and Rice University. Long also understands the coach's perspective from time spent in coaching staff positions at Duke University, University of Michigan and North Carolina State



University.

His experience as an athletic director and administrator in five of the six Bowl Championship Series conferences - the Big 12, Big Ten, Big East, Atlantic Coast and SEC - gives Long a uniquely informed perspective on intercollegiate athletics.

On the forefront of NCAA governance, Long has served on the NCAA Management Council, the NCAA's Sports Wagering Task Force and as a member of the Executive Committee of the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association. Long served on the NCAA Championships/Sports Management Cabinet.

Prior to assuming his current roles at Arkansas, Long served for four years as the athletic director at the University of Pittsburgh. Long redefined Pitt athletics, most notably through the "Quest for Excellence" campaign that raised nearly \$34 million to enhance the student-athlete experience. During his tenure the Panthers' were selected as the No. 17 overall program in the nation in the December 2006 Sports Illustrated on Campus' All-Sport Rankings.

Before arriving at Pitt, Long was senior associate athletic director at Oklahoma for two and a half years overseeing external affairs for the Sooners. In addition, Long was the primary administrator for the Sooners' highly successful football and men's basketball programs. along with sport supervision of baseball, wrestling and both golf teams.

Long's first appointment as a director of athletics was at Eastern Kentucky where he served for two and a half years. Prior to Eastern, Long had a brief stay with Virginia Tech as an associate athletics director.

He began his career in college athletic administration at Michigan, hired by legendary coach and athletics director, the late Bo Schembechler. During his seasons with the Wolverines, Long was promoted through a series of posts to the position of associate

A former two-sport athlete at Ohio Wesleyan, Long earned seven varsity letters for the Bishops in football and baseball before completing his degree in economics in 1982. He started his postgraduate career in athletics working on head coach Tom Reed's staff as a graduate assistant football coach at the cradle of coaches, Miami University of Ohio. Long earned his master's in education at Miami in 1983, moving on to football staff positions at Rice, Duke and N.C. State prior to joining Michigan.

An Ohio native from Kettering, Long is married to the former Fanny Gellrich of Ann Arbor, Mich. The Longs have two daughters, Stephanie and Christina.



# ASST. VICE CHANCELLOR AND SENIOR ASSOCIATE AD JULIE CROMER PEOPLES

Julie Cromer Peoples serves as associate vice chancellor for athletics, senior associate athletics director for administration and sports programs and senior woman administrator (SWA) for Razorback Athletics since joining the University of Arkansas on 2014.

As a member of the department's executive leadership team, Cromer Peoples provides strategic direction and oversight of department initiatives and units focused on sport administration, athletic performance, competitive success, student-athlete well-being and development and Title IX compliance. She serves as sport administrator for the football, women's basketball, volleyball and men's and women's track and field programs. In addition, she guides strategic planning for the executive staff while assisting with fundraising efforts and serving as a liaison to the Southeastern Conference, the Chancellor's Administrative Policy Council and various faculty groups.

Actively engaged in intercollegiate athletics nationally, Cromer Peoples has served on committees and working groups within the NCAA, various athletic conferences and several professional development associations. Cromer Peoples currently is a member of the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics and was recently elected to the Board of the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletics Administrators (NACWAA). She has delivered speeches, instructed seminars and served on expert panels at numerous national conferences and forums and was selected for the 1A AD Fellows Program. In June 2012 she received the National Association for Athletics Compliance (NAAC) Frank Kara Leadership Award for her contributions to the field of athletics governance and compliance, and she was named 2015 Nell Jackson Administrator of the Year by NACWAA. Locally, the Northwest Arkansas Business Journal honored her as one of its top 10 "Women in Business" in 2016.

Cromer Peoples joined the University of Arkansas after spending four years at Indiana University and previously working at the NCAA. As the executive associate athletics director and SWA at Indiana, Cromer Peoples was a member of the department's senior management team providing leadership, consultation and guidance to an intercollegiate athletics division with 24 varsity sports. In addition, she coordinated the department's sports administration efforts and she was one of the first women in the Big Ten to supervise all football operations, including staffing, scheduling and facility planning. While at Indiana, programs under her supervision won one NCAA team championship, five NCAA individual championships and two Big Ten team championships.

Early in her tenure, Cromer Peoples bolstered athletic compliance operations and guided the university's efforts to fulfill NCAA probation requirements. Cromer Peoples also directed the Indiana University Athletics Excellence Academy, an innovative and comprehensive student-athlete program designed to identify, assess and ensure progress toward each individual student-athlete's specific personal development and sports performance goals.

Cromer Peoples arrived at Indiana University after a distinguished tenure with the NCAA national office. As director of academic and membership affairs, Cromer Peoples coordinated the policy and NCAA legislative activities of various governance groups and created partnerships with faculty, coaches and administrative constituent organizations to advance NCAA academic reform, along with other national governance and policy initiatives. For this work, Cromer Peoples was honored in 2010 by the 1A Faculty Athletics Representatives and in 2007 she received the David Knight Award from the NCAA Faculty Athletics Representatives Association.

Prior to joining the NCAA, Cromer Peoples was the assistant athletics director and SWA at Wright State University and she started her career at the Midwestern Collegiate Conference, working in compliance and championships.

Cromer Peoples received an MPA in policy analysis from the Indiana University School of Public and Environmental Affairs and she is an Honors College graduate of Missouri State University



# ASSISTANT ATHLETIC DIRECTOR MARCUS SEDBERRY

No stranger to Northwest Arkansas, Sedberry spent two years (2012-14) at Arkansas as the Director of Student-Athlete Development and left to assume a position in the NFL as the Director of Player Engagement for the Philadelphia Eagles.

Sedberry will join Arkansas's senior staff after working for the Philadelphia Eagles. While in Philadelphia, Sedberry's player engagement responsibilities included enhancing overall team culture, financial education, career development, mentoring, rookie orientation, crisis intervention, continuing education and working closely with coaches and players to improve team performance.

He also played a role in football operations with the Eagles, collaborating with strength and conditioning, sports science, nutrition and athletic training areas to ensure a consistent culture of high performance. In addition, Sedberry assisted with team travel, practice planning, free agent recruitment, rookie player evaluations, as well as oversight of team psychologist and mental conditioning personnel.

As the director of student-athlete development at Arkansas from 2012-14, Sedberry was responsible for overseeing life skills and career development programs. Sedberry was the advisor for the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and was part of the Athletic Department Performance Team, which ensures student-athlete welfare and a consistent standard of care with sports medicine, athletic training and sports psychology.

Before joining the Arkansas athletics department, Sedberry was a member of the senior staff at the University of Central Florida as the Director of Student Services. He was in charge of the creation, development, supervision, implementation and evaluation of life skills programs for all UCF student-athletes.

In 2015, Sedberry served as the chair of the Life Skills/Student-Athlete Development Committee for the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics (N4A) and has served as a consultant for the National Consortium for Academics and Sports. He also was selected as a member of the NCAA's Leadership Institute in 2011.
