AGRI PARK CROSS COUNTRY COURSE



With one of the most successful cross country teams in the nation, there was a need for a permanent place for the University of Arkansas cross country squad to call home. In 1996, the Razorback Cross Country course at Agri Park was developed. Carved out of a portion of the University of Arkansas' on-campus agricultural area, hence the name Agri Park, the course provides the men's and women's cross country teams with an excellent practice and competition area.

As one of only a few permanent on-campus cross country venues in the nation, the Razorback Cross Country Course hosted its first events in 1996, serving as the site for the annual Chile Pepper Cross Country Festival and the Arkansas Invitational.

Agri Park is extremely versatile. The course is set up with a wide starting area that leads to a competition area that can be arranged to accommodate many different course lengths, including two-miles, 5,000 meters, 8,000 meters or 10,000 meters while using the same starting area and finish chute.

In 2007 the course hosted the NCAA South Central Regional Championship and it was the first time the event had been held in Fayetteville. A large hometown crowd enjoyed seeing the Razorbacks compete. The NCAA South Central Regional Championships returned to Fayetteville for the 2012 season and again brought good crowds to watch the home squad compete.

The current course configuration has three distinct areas. The open area of the starting chute is separated from the pond and Razorback Meadow by a grove of trees surrounding the former site of one of Fayetteville's old eateries, The Farmer's Daughter. Razorback Meadow is open and relatively flat. The men's 10K, snakes through three groves of trees in the Meadow. The pond section has more contour as the trail rises up along the rim of the course's water feature.

For the spectators, it is a great venue as you can watch most of the race from the hilltop near the finishing area. For the runners, the fast course can include challenges such as a constantly changing terrain ranging from an open field to a covered forest-like area and wooden steeple barriers.


More detail for the men's 8K course: the first mile mark is near the pond, the course then winds through agricultural fields and a few small groves of tree before coming to the 2 mile, the course follows the tree line down past the starting line and into the meadow where the second loop of the course begins repeating all of the first loop until the end of the meadow where a hair pin turn is made with a 100 meter sprint into the finish. The 3 mile mark is on the second loop at the top of the hill as the course turns to winds back toward the rim of the pond. The 4 mile mark at the end of the agricultural fields just before approaching a right-hand turn and the second grove of trees.




8K AGRI PARK COURSE MAP

2016 PREVIEW



Frankline Tonui - 2015 All-American

Arkansas' men's cross country team is set to race on its home course three times this season as the hosts of the Chile Pepper Festival (Oct. 1), SEC Championship (Oct. 28) and NCAA South Central Regional (Nov. 11).

Along with those three competitions, the Razorbacks will make early season trips to Stillwater, Oklahoma for the Cowboy Duals (Sept. 1) and Boston for the renowned Battle in Beantown (Sept. 16) hosted by Oklahoma State and Boston College, respectively.

"We're excited about the 2016 cross country season," head coach Chris Bucknam said. "We've got a lot of depth on our team with some exceptional returners and some younger guys that are looking to continue to develop, step up and get in the mix. Replacing some of our former guys like Gabe Gonzalez and Cale Wallace is a tall order but our guys are up for the challenge."

Arkansas returns a deep roster headlined by two All-Americans in upperclassmen talents Jack Bruce and Frankline Tonui. Both steady members of the Razorbacks' top seven through the duration of the season, Bruce and Tonui increased their intensity at the 2015 NCAA Cross Country Championship, pacing Arkansas to a sixth-place finish with individual top-40 performances.

Prior to the national meet, Bucknam's squad proved a force to be reckoned with, bulldozing through the Southeastern Conference and South Central Regional Championships off the heels of several student-athletes.

Two-time NCAA Elite 90 award winner Christian Heymsfield guided the Razorbacks to their 48th conference title while former captain Gabe Gonzalez led the way to Arkansas' 35th NCAA regional crown.

The Razorbacks' 2015 postseason success took a complete team effort, relying heavily on several underclassmen to step up including Cameron Griffith, Ethan Moehn and rising

junior standouts Austen Dalquist and Alex George. Dalquist and George were two of six Hogs who finished a race as Arkansas lead runner last season. 2015 first team All-SEC runners Dalquist found his stride at the Pre-National meet in Louisville while George opened strong in front of a home crowd at the Chile Pepper Festival.

In addition to its returners, Arkansas will have the help of NJCAA All-American Andrew Ronoh this season along with Texas cross country standout Carter Persyn.

A 2015 spring semester transfer, Ronoh capped his first track and field season as a Razorback as the second-fastest 10K performer in the NCAA with his time of 28 minutes, 36.20 seconds from the Payton Jordan Invitational.

"The goal in mind is to improve each year," Bucknam said. "Right now our focus is on one meet at a time. We're not focused on predictions and polls but producing results. Our guys know to tune out the noise and focus on going out there and proving it on the course."

Chris Bucknam enters his ninth season as the head coach of the nationally dominant Arkansas men's cross country and track and field program. A veteran in the coaching ranks, Bucknam took the Razorback head coaching position on June 27, 2008, after a 25-year stint at Northern Iowa.

Since assuming the head coaching position at Arkansas, Bucknam has enjoyed tremendous success in the form of 17 Southeastern Conference championships, five NCAA regional titles, and 240 All-Americans, guiding the Razorbacks to 61 individual SEC event titles.

Nationally, Bucknam's guidance has led the Razorbacks to 17 top 10 finishes since his arrival in Fayetteville. His cross country squads have placed in the top 10 in three times in his tenure while track and field has 14 top 10s including four national runner-up finishes and a national title.

The 2015-16 season brought the program's 15th SEC Triple Crown as Bucknam masterfully guided the Razorbacks to decisive conference victories during the cross country, indoor and outdoor seasons. Arkansas' dominance didn't end at the league level, exceeding expectations at the national ranks as well with three top-six NCAA finishes – two of which were national runner-up performances.

Known for his development of elite distance runners Bucknam kicked off 2015 with a phenomenal cross country campaign which saw an unprecedented five different student-athletes take the lead for Arkansas during the season. Steamrolling through SECs and Regionals Bucknam's crew surprised the polls placing just two spots shy of the podium – the program's best NCAA finish since 2006 – off the heels of first-year All-Americans Jack Bruce and Frankline Tonui.

The Razorbacks success carried though to track season with Bucknam relying on a combined effort from all event groups to lead Arkansas to post-season titles. Arkansas' tremendous versatility and depth were on full display as several newcomers forged their paths at the most different league championships in the country. His squad rose to the occasion as over 90 percent of the Razorbacks' conference roster contributed at the SEC Championships and further delivering two NCAA national runner-up performances making the Razorback men the most complete team in the SEC.

One of the most phenomenal performances in the history of NCAA track and field came in 2016 from one of Bucknam's Razorback leaders Jarrion Lawson. In an incredulous feat of athleticism Lawson captured three NCAA individual titles for the Razorbacks, completing the Jesse Owens triple with victories in the 100, 200 and long jump at the outdoor championship.

Last season's success was a continuation of Arkansas long-standing tradition of excellence including the 2013 indoor track squad who captured Bucknam's first and Arkansas' 41st NCAA title.

Entering the competition as the No. 1 ranked team in the nation, the Razorbacks did not disappoint the hometown crowd at the Randal Tyson Track



Center as Arkansas scored 74 points and racked up 25 All-America honors at the meet. Two individuals captured NCAA titles and a collegiate record in the 4×400 relay added a third to the Razorbacks' dominating performance.

Along with the indoor title, Arkansas placed 10th at the NCAA Cross Country Championship and third at the outdoor meet allowing the program to claim its first John McDonnell Program of the Year award, named after the legendary Arkansas coach whom Bucknam took over for following his retirement.

The national recognition as the best program in the nation was no fluke as Bucknam and his staff have been building to that for several years. In 2011-12, Arkansas won the program's 13th SEC Triple Crown and the first with Bucknam at the helm. The Razorbacks duplicated the effort in 2012-13 giving them 11 league championships over the past five years. No other SEC school has more than two in that same time frame. For his part Bucknam has been named the SEC Coach of the Year 15 times and national coach of the year one time.

As the head coach, Bucknam's charge is to look at the big picture and lead his team to championships, but that doesn't deter him from his work with the Razorback distance crew. He has led the program to 142 marks that have etched themselves on Arkansas' prestigious all-time top 10 lists including 12 school records since his arrival in 2008.

During his first season distance medley relay squad of Alex McClary, Ben Skidmore, Chris Bilbrew and Dorian Ulrey eclipsed an 11-year-old record, which had not even been close to being broken since it was set in 1998, at the UW Invitational when it ran 9:28.35. The outdoor school record was set by Shawn Forrest, when he shattered the 10,000-meter mark with a time of 27:52.10 at the Payton Jordan Invitational.

Ulrey's three-year Arkansas career was one of the more celebrated in Razorback history as the Port Byron, Ill. native earned eight All-America honors, one NCAA Championship, seven SEC titles, two SEC Athlete of the Year awards and the league's sportsmanship award. The lessons that Ulrey picked up in Fayetteville have served him well since he completed his eligibility as he continues to perform well professionally.

Along with the success of his student-athletes in the competition arena, Razorbacks have been equally as good in the classroom. Arkansas has placed six student-athletes on the Capital One Academic All-America squads over the past eight years, including three this past season and had more than 75 named to the SEC Academic Honor Rolls. The Razorbacks were named the USTFCCCA Indoor and Outdoor Scholar Team of the Year in 2015 in recognition of the program's excellent cumulative gpa and athletic performance.



Prior to taking over the Arkansas program, Bucknam was a well-respected head coach at Northern Iowa where he led his teams to 35 conference championships, two top-10 and six top-20 finishes at the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Championships. He was named conference coach of the year 33 times while in Cedar Falls, Iowa, and coached three individual national champions and 34 All-Americans who earned a total of 85 honors.

His time with the Panthers saw him lead the men's program for 25 seasons and a combined track and field operation for the final 11 years. Bucknam's career at Northern Iowa began as an assistant in 1979 before he assumed the head coaching job prior to the 1984 campaign. Along with his various conference coach of the year awards, Bucknam was also honored





regionally for his acumen with nine USTFCCCA Midwest Region Coach of the Year honors.

Under Bucknam's tutelage, Northern Iowa product Joey Woody was a three-time All-American and the 1997 national champion in the 400-meter hurdles. Woody placed second in the 400-meter hurdles at 2003 World Championships and was a member of the 1999 World Champion 4×400 -meter relay team.

A native of Beverly, Mass., Bucknam attended Norwich University in Northfield, Vermont, where he was a cross country and track letterman. He was elected cross country co-captain his senior year and is a member of the Norwich Athletic Hall of Fame. He earned his bachelor's degree in physical education in 1978. He earned his master's degree in physical education from Northern Iowa in 1982.

He and his wife, Cindy, are the parents of a son, Eric, and a daughter, Kate.

DOUG CASE

Doug Case enters his ninth season as an assistant coach with the University of Arkansas cross country and track and field teams. He is charged with working with the Razorback sprinters, relay teams and pole vault and is starting his 23rd year of coaching at the collegiate level.

Since arriving in Fayetteville, following an extended stay at Northern Iowa, Case has revitalized the Arkansas sprint teams and led his student-athletes to 10 NCAA individual titles, including the first-ever championships in the pole vault, 60-meter hurdles, 100-meter hurdles, 4x100-meter relay and indoor 4x400-meter relay, and 123 All-America honors. Case's guidance has helped Razorbacks claim 18 Southeastern Conference individual championships and grab 17 of the last 24 SEC league titles in cross country and track & field.

The crowning achievement of Case's time with Arkansas came during the 2013 indoor track season when he and longtime friend and mentor Chris Bucknam led the Razorbacks to the NCAA Championship. The duo followed up the win with a third-place finish at the outdoor meet which led to the University's first John McDonnell Program of the Year award.

Case's work at Arkansas has not gone unnoticed to his colleagues as he earned the United States Track & Field and Cross Country Coaches' Association (USTFCCCA) South Central regional assistant coach of the year in 2011 and most recently for his efforts in 2015.

Along with his ability to teach his protégés to race and compete, Case has also put his stamp on the Razorback record books. In seven years, 67 marks on Arkansas' top 10 performance lists across 16 events in two seasons belong to student-athletes developed by Case. This past season Case guided Arkansas sophomore Omar McLeod past the Razorback record books and into collegiate history to claim the NCAA all-time best spot at both 60-meter and 110-meter hurdles, the latter which had previously stood for 36 years. The two collegiate records were the second and third for Case having coached the 2013 4x400-meter relay team (currently second best performers in NCAA history) to a collegiate best during the indoor season that culminated to the team's 41st national title.

Over the last two years Case developed McLeod from a young man with raw talent to one of the best high-hurdlers in the world. In his freshman season as a Razorback McLeod earned the title of SEC Freshman Runner of the Year for his second place performance in the 60-meter hurdles only to drop .12 seconds two weeks later to collect his first national title. With the guidance of Case, McLeod continued on to two more SEC titles, defended his indoor national title, collected two outdoor national titles breaking the Razorback 4x100-meter relay record with his teammates in the process.

He capped his amateur career as a Bowerman Trophy semifinalist and with a victory at the Jamaican National Championships as the first collegian to run a non-wind assisted sub-13 time in the 110-meter hurdles.





Along with McLeod, the 2015 NCAA Championship winning 4x100-meter team assembled by Case included SEC Freshman Runner of the Year Kenzo Cotton and individual indoor event All-Americans Jarrion Lawson and Marqueze Washington. The entire group followed their national championship performance with a sixth place finish in the 4x400-meter relay. In addition to managing the athletes in relay competition, Case was responsible for the breakthrough performance by Lawson at 100 meters who went from unknown in the event to the third fastest in the country in the a span of one month.

2016 brought further notoriety for the sprints and hurdles specialist as both Cotton and Lawson as well as McLeod (on the professional circuit) continued to thrive under Case's guidance.

The collegiate duo and returning 4-x-100 relay members both placed nationally in individual sprint events during the indoor and outdoor season — Lawson accomplishing the coveted Jesse Owens triple with victories in the 100, 200 and long jump at the NCAA outdoor championship. Cotton and Lawson also assisted the 4-x-100 team once again racing to a spot on the podium with a third-place finish. In all, Case's event group accounted for half of Arkansas' point total, largely contributing to the program's national runner-up finish.

Lawson and Cotton both qualified for the U.S. Olympic Trials advancing to the semifinals in both the 100 and 200 in their debut at the event. As the seventh place finisher in the 100, Lawson earned a spot on Team USA's 4-x-100 relay team, going on to assist them at the Olympic Games during the preliminary round of competition.

A product of the mentoring of both Case and assistant field events coach Travis Geopfert, Lawson was the first member of the Arkansas men's track and field team to be a finalist for the sport's most prestigious honor the Bowerman Award. He also was the first collegiate track athlete to earn an ESPYs nomination in the Best Male College Athlete category.

Still responsible for the development of McLeod, Case coached the Jamaican hurdle talent through several major competitions during 2016, watching on as the four-time NCAA champion implemented his techniques to race to a World indoor championship, a second Jamaican national title and an Olympic gold medal.

His work isn't limited to the track as Case developed the abilities of All-American pole vaulter Andrew Irwin who in his time with Arkansas won two NCAA championships and five SEC titles. Case's work with Irwin has won the Mt. Ida, Ark., native five All-America honors, SEC Freshman Field Athlete of the Year awards both indoor and out, the SEC Field Athlete of the Year for the 2012 outdoor season and USTFCCCA South Central Region Field Athlete of the Year accolades.

Prior to joining his mentor on the Arkansas coaching staff, Case was a very successful coach at Northern lowa, leading his student-athletes to two individual national championships, 43 All-America honors and 68 national championship qualifiers. His athletes dominated the Missouri Valley Conference with 97 individual and relay championships in his time with the Panthers and set school records in 10 events.

While Case is proud of the efforts of all of his former competitors, 800-meter runner Tyler Mulder and pole vaulter Jacob Pauli hold a special place with Case after the tandem won national titles in 2008 and 2001, respectively. Mulder earned his title with a spectacular 1:49.20 at the national meet and Pauli went on to finish third at the 2007 USA Outdoor Championship.

Case's career path saw him make a stop at Arkansas State before taking the head coaching position at Drake and eventually Northern Iowa. At Arkansas State, the Red Wolves won nine Sun Belt Conference titles and Case recruited 52 outdoor and 49 indoor individual conference champions, four All-Americans, seven Olympic Trials qualifiers and three Olympians. His three-year stint at Drake included three school records and a ninth-place finish by the distance medley relay at the NCAA Championship.

A former Northern Iowa sprinter, Case set eight school records between 1982 and 1986 and was an all-conference performer. A native of Marshalltown, Iowa, Case received his bachelor's degree from UNI in 1987 and served as a graduate assistant with the Panthers the next two seasons. He and his wife, Chris, have four children: Kelsey, Lauren, Cameron and Regan.

TRAVIS GEOPFERT

ASSISTANT COACH - 8th SEASON

JUMPS, THROWS, MULTIS

Travis Geopfert begins his eighth season at the University of Arkansas and his 14th as a collegiate coach. He is charged with coaching the field and multi-event athletes with the Razorbacks while also acting as the recruiting coordinator for the Arkansas cross country/track & field programs.

In his 14 years on the sideline at Arkansas, Geopfert has built an impressive resume that includes two Olympians, 8 NCAA individual national titles, 65 first-team All-Americans, 119 NCAA qualifiers, 69 conference champions and 132 all-conference performers. Those numbers don't include the myriad of honors bestowed upon the student-athletes that Geopfert has recruited, an array of performers that have been among the top 10 recruiting classes in the nation in each of the past three years.

The work that Geopfert has done has not gone unnoticed to his peers. In 2008 he received the United States Track & Field Cross Country Coaches Association's (USTFCCCA) Midwest Assistant Coach of the Year award for outdoor track and took the same honor indoors in 2013. His most recent honor led him to the USTFCCCA National Assistant Coach of the Year award for the 2013 indoor track season.

Geopfert's 2013 track season was not just rewarding for him as an individual, but from a team standpoint as he helped Arkansas claim its 41st NCAA Championship during the indoor track season and win the John McDonnell Program of the Year award. The team also won its second straight SEC triple crown and Geopfert's fingerprints were all over Arkansas' team success in 2013 as he coached student-athletes to a national title in the heptathlon, 14 All-America honors and an SEC Champion.

In 2014 Geopfert repeated at the USTFCCCA National Assistant Coach of the Year for the indoor season following guiding one of his student-athletes to an individual national title for the second-consecutive year. In addition to the first-place finish five more from his training group earned All-American honors with three out of Geopfert's six finishing among the top-five in their events at the national meet.

While his overall credentials are staggering, his numbers since arriving in Fayetteville are even better. He has coached three national champions, nine SEC titlists, five SEC runner-ups, 27 first-team All-Americans and 22 second-team All-Americans.

Kevin Lazas, the 2013 NCAA heptathlon champion, tallied 6,175 points on the way to his national title, a total that ranks No. 3 in NCAA history. The lofty numbers are not limited to just the multi-events. Geopfert's first and third national champions were long jumpers Alan Bailey (2010) and Jarrion Lawson (2014). Lawson whose mark of 27-6.5 earned him a world No. 1 ranking at the time went on to finish second at the USATF Championships to cap his second season as a Razorback.



During the 2015 season Geopfert returned Lawson to the national spotlight guiding the junior to a silver medal in the long jump at the NCAA Indoor Championships. Picking up where they left off from the indoor season, Geopfert watched over Lawson's outdoor progressions developing him into a dual-threat national contender in the 100-meter run and the long jump. With Geopfert's mentoring, Lawson finished among the top-three competitors in both events at the NCAA Outdoor Championships bringing his All-American honors total to 12 in three years as a Razorback.

Geopfert's seventh campaign at the helm of Razorback jumps, multis and throws brought several accomplishments including five SEC individual champions as well as multiple marks on Arkansas' top-10 all-time bests list. In Lawson's final year with the Razorbacks the Texarkana, Texas native found his rhythm under Geopfert's watch, sweeping the SEC and NCAA long jump titles in dominant fashion. Along with his collegiate success which saw him match Jesse Owens' 100, 200, long national sweep Lawson landed international notoriety, leaping to a world-lead in the long jump at the U.S. Olympic Trials of 28-1 3/4.

Geopfert followed through with Lawson's training all the way through the Olympic Games, molding the natural talent into a top-five finisher on the most elite stage in track and field. For his efforts in 2016 Lawson was selected as the NCAA National Outdoor Athlete of the Year and nominated as a finalist for the Bowerman Award and for the Best Male Collegiate Athlete ESPY Award.

Only one of Geopfert's many talented student-athletes Lawson was joined on the national and Olympic stage by Jamaican triple jumper Clive Pullen who captured the NCAA indoor title and became the first Jamaican to qualify for an Olympic Games since the 1970s.

In addition to his duties with the Razorbacks, Geopfert is a rising star on the national stage and in 2013 coached his second Thorpe Cup, a decathlon competition between the United States and Germany. A long-time advocate of the competition, Geopfert was also a member of three Thorpe Cup championships as a competitor between 2003 and 2006.

Familiar with Coach Bucknam's philosophies and coaching style, Geopfert was an athlete during the head Razorback's run at Northern Iowa before joining the coaching staff. The long-time Panther even took over the program for





one season, after Bucknam left for Arkansas, before joining his mentor one year later. His coaching at Northern Iowa led to Missouri Valley Conference indoor and outdoor championships in 2009 as well as coach of the year honors both seasons. In six years as a coach at UNI, Geopfert was a part of numerous conference championships and his recruits continue to hold 12 UNI school records.

Geopfert's coaching career began at Central Missouri State where he spent two years as an assistant coach. In that time he coached two Divison II national champions, one national runner-up, six All-Americans, five conference champions and 10 all-conference performers.

A standout student-athlete for Northern Iowa, Geopfert earned All-America honors and was a three-time MVC champion. Including his professional career as an athlete, he was a two-time Drake Relays decathlon championships, three-time member of the Thorpe Cup and a six-time USA Championships qualifier in the decathlon.

A native of Panora, Iowa, Geopfert earned his bachelor's degree from Northern Iowa in 2002. He and his wife Nicole have one daughter, Ellyn and two sons, Jones and Jax.

Former Razorback distance harrier Josphat Boit is in his first season as a volunteer assistant coach with the Arkansas distance crew.

Boit was a two-time NCAA Champion while running for the Hogs. He took the 2006 NCAA Indoor 5K title and followed that up by winning the 2006 NCAA Outdoor 10,000-meter race.

Boit earned eight All-America certificates and was a six-time SEC Champion during his time at Arkansas. He was also a 10-time All-SEC performer.

He remains the second fastest 8K cross country performer in Razor-back history from his 22 minutes 59.10 seconds showing at the 2005 SEC Championships and is one of only three Razorbacks to win consecutive SEC individual titles (2004-05).

Boit also still holds the second fastest 10K on Arkansas' all-time bests list with his 28:07.27 in 2005.

Following his time with the Razorbacks Boit began competin on the professional circuit, setting a new PR in the 10K of 27:40.44 in Palo Alto, California.

In 2014 Boit finished 21st at the IAAF World Half Marathon Championship, recording a time of 1:01:33 over the 13.1 mile course in Copenhagen, Denmark.

He received his bachelor's degree in criminal justice in May, 2006. Boit, who lives and trains in Fayetteville, married the former Shenan Moiseichik on May 22, 2008.

Matthew Downs enters his first season as the director of operations for the Arkansas men's cross country and track and field program.

As the Razorbacks' director of operations Downs is charged with complete oversite of the team's administration responsible for coordination of travel, meet operations, student-athlete eligibility, team equipment and gear and assisting with the promotion of the program.

Downs comes to Fayetteville from Eugene, Oregon where he was employed in a similar capacity with the Oregon Ducks for the last four years.

At Oregon Downs was instrumental in the production and coordination of four NCAA Outdoor Championships at Hayward Field.

In addition to home meet oversight Downs played an integral role in the Ducks day-to-day operations, acting as a the team's athletic department liaison with compliance, eligibility, meet operations, finance, marketing and promotions and public relations.

Downs came to Oregon after spending three years (2009-12) as the director of track and field operations at the University of Virginia. In addition to his role as home meet director for the Cavaliers, he also assisted with the program's alumni relations and with the planning, fund-raising and development of Virginia's \$7 million track and field facility.

Previously, Downs also worked with the SunTrust National Marathon in Washington, D.C., as well as college football's Military Bowl and the NCAA Frozen Four.

Downs, from Richmond, Va., was a three-time all-conference runner for the University of Mary Washington and team captain from 2006-08. He graduated from Mary Washington in 2008 with degrees in history and economics, and received his Masters in sport leadership from Virginia Commonwealth in 2009.

Prior to Virginia, Downs was an assistant track and field coach at St. Christopher's High School in Richmond from 2008-09. Downs is also a USATF certified official with six years of experience.

2015 REVIEW

The Arkansas men's cross country and track and field team capped an astounding 2015 season establishing its reputation as the most complete program in the Southeastern Conference with a national top-10 finish in three out of the past three seasons.

The Razorback men's cross country team entered the year as the 17th-best program in the nation. Prepared with a roster which boasted incredible depth, Arkansas featured a different top finisher in every race in which the Razorbacks competed. Their talent, made more apparent as the season wore on, helped the team improve in rank, climbing inside the top 10 to No. 8 by the time championship contests arrived.

Arkansas' regular season was highlighted by two SEC Runner of the Week honors for exceptional performances from Alex George and Austen Dalquist as they raced to personal bests at the Chile Pepper Festival and Pre-Nationals races, respectively.

The Razorbacks continued their run of success in the SEC and South Central Region as they collected their 23rd conference title and 35th regional crown. Their season came to a close with a sixth-place finish at the NCAA Cross Country Championships marking their best finish since 2006. The first two Razorbacks to cross the line at the national meet, Jack Bruce and Frankline Tonui earned All-American honors placing individually inside the top-40 best runners in the country.

"The 2015 season was a huge stepping stone for us as a team," former captain Gabe Gonzalez said. "Having a strong season and finishing sixth in the country propelled us to have a great indoor and outdoor season. No one expected us to finish as high as we did because we were outside of the top 25 during the preseason but that shows you the leadership and determination of the team."





NCAA Individual Champions



Joe Falcon - 1987

One of the most decorated distance runners in Arkansas history, Joe Falcon compiled seven NCAA titles, 15 SEC crowns and was named an All-American 11 times. He was the 3,000-meter champion in 1987 and 1988, indoor mile champ in 1988, outdoor 10,000-meter champion in 1987, outdoor 1,500-meter champion in 1988 and NCAA cross country champion in 1987.

His NCAA win in 1987 propelled Arkansas to its third NCAA Cross Country team title. Falcon and the squad recorded a team score of 87 to edge out Dartmouth (119 points).

Falcon was ranked among the top distance runners in the world throughout his career by Track and Field News, including a No. 1 ranking at 5,000 meters in 1989 and 1,500 meters in 1990. He was the champion of the annual Oslo Dream Mile in 1990 in Oslo, Norway with a time of 3:49.31, a race that saw his fastest 1,500-meter split: 3:33.6.



Godfrey Siamusiye - 1995, 1996

A two-time Olympian for his native Zambia, Godfrey Siamusiye competed at 5,000 meters in the 1993 Barcelona Games and in the 3,000 meter steeplechase at the 1996 games in Atlanta. He finished 10th in his semifinal heat of the steeplechase with a time of 8:37.41. At Arkansas he was a two-time NCAA Champion in cross country (1995-96), and a back-to-back champion in the outdoor 10,000 meters (1995-96).

Siamusiye's race win in 1995 led Arkansas to its eighth NCAA Cross Country team title. The '95 squad scored 100 points to beat Northern Arizona's 142 points. Arkansas earned an NCAA runner-up finish in the team race behind Siamusiye's win in 1996.

Arkansas' records book still reflects the impact of Siamusiye on the program's long-distance legacy. He still owns the No. 2 time in the steeplechase with a time of 8:25.49 which he ran during the 1996 season. Siamusiye is also 10th on Arkansas' all-time 5K list with a 13:37.80 performance in 1996. He never lost a cross country race as a Razorback.





HALL OF HONOR

Each year the membership of the University of Arkansas "A" Club votes on nominations for the University of Arkansas Sports Hall of Honor. To be on the ballot, a former Arkansas student-athlete must have been at least a two-time letterwinner, a starter, all-conference or All-American and five years past their last competition for Arkansas. Current coaches or administrators are eligible after 10 years' service.



Head Coach John McDonnell, 1990

A member of the Arkansas coaching staff for 36 seasons, former head coach John McDonnell led Arkansas' historic rise into the NCAA and world records books in cross country and track and field. His squads won 40 NCAA titles, five NCAA triple

crowns, 84 conference championships, 34 straight conference cross country championships and 21 conference triple crowns. During McDonnells' term, 184 Hogs were named All-Americans and they combined to earn a stunning 643 All-America honors. McDonnell was named National Coach of the Year 12 times in indoor track, 11 times in outdoor track and seven times in cross country for a total of 30 awards. He was also selected Conference Coach of the Year a remarkable 48 times, and Region Coach of the Year on 62 occassions.



Niall O'Shaughnessy, 1994

A six-time All-American in cross country, indoor track and outdoor track in 1973-78, Niall O'Shaughnessy is recognized as one of the early leaders in Arkansas' climb to national prominence in track. He anchored the first Southwest Conference cross

country championship team under Coach John McDonnell.

Twice he finished second in the mile at the NCAA Indoor Championships and he participated in the 1976 Olympic Games in Montreal. He was named to the University of Arkansas Sports Hall of Honor in 1994.



Joe Falcon, 1996

An 11-time All-American while competing in cross country, indoor track and outdoor track at the University of Arkansas, Joe Falcon won seven individual NCAA titles during a very successful era for Razorback track and field. He won the 1987 national cross country title, twice won

the indoor mile and 3,000 meters and won the 10,000 and 1,500 meters outdoor. He was inducted into the University of Arkansas Sports Hall of Honor in 1996.



Frank O'Mara, 1997

Athree-time All-American, Frank O'Mara won the 1,500-meter championship at the 1983 NCAA Indoor Championships and was twice an All-American as a member of Arkansas' distance medley relay team. He ran the 5,000 meters for Ireland at the Olympic Games of 1984, 1988 and 1992. He

was inducted into the University of Arkansas Sports Hall of Honor in 1997.



Paul Donovan, 1998

A 10-time All-American during his brilliant career at Arkansas, Paul Donovan won the 1,500-meter championship at the NCAA Indoor Championships in 1985 and was the 3,000-meter champion in the 1986 indoor event. He was also a member of the

1986 NCAA Indoor Championship 3,200-meter relay team. He was an All-American three times in cross country, five times in indoor track and twice outdoors. He represented Ireland at the 1984 and 1992 Olympic Games. He was inducted into the University of Arkansas Sports Hall of Honor in 1998.



Stanley Redwine, 1999

A four-time All-American from 1980-83, Stanley Redwine was one of the premier middle distance runners of his era. He was second at 600 meters at the 1981 NCAA Indoor Championships and finished second in the 880 indoors in 1983. He ran for five Southwest Conference Championship

teams.

After serving as an assistant track coach at Arkansas, he became head coach at the University of Tulsa. He currently serves as the head coach at the University of Kansas. He was inducted into the Arkansas Sports Hall of Honor in 1999.



Reuben Reina, 2001

An eight-time All-American, Reuben Reina helped lead the Hogs to nine NCAA championships and 11 Southwest Conference crowns. He was a two-time national individual champion in the 3,000 meters winning the indoor title in both 1990 and 1991. Reina captured seven

individual conference championships including the 1988 SWC Cross Country crown. A four-year letterman in cross country, indoor and outdoor track at Arkansas, Reina garnered a spot on the U.S. Olympic team that competed in the 1992 Barcelona Games.



HALL OF HONOR



Seneca Lassiter, 2004

A standout distance runner for the Hogs from 1995 through 1999, Seneca Lassiter was a part of nine national championship teams, including the 1998-99 squad that captured Arkansas' unprecedented fifth NCAA triple crown. During his career he earned 13 All-America honors, including

two NCAA 1,500- meter titles. He is the only Razorback in Arkansas' legendary track history to capture multiple 1,500-meter crowns. He was also able to claim the United States 1,500-meter championship in 1997 and 2001 and went on to represent Team USA at the World Championships.In addition to his success on a national level, Lassiter was an 11-time Southeastern Conference Champion, earning five during the indoor season and six at the conference outdoors championships.



Daniel Lincoln, 2008

A four-time NCAA champion, Daniel Lincoln won three straight in the 3,000-meter steeplechase (2001-03) and the 10,000 meters in 2003 for John McDonnell's Razorbacks. He was a four-year letterman as a member of the

cross-country and track and field teams, and was a 14-time All-American honoree. He was a seven-time Southeastern Conference champion, winning the indoor 5,000 meters (2002-03), three straight steeplechase titles (2001-03), and the 5,000 and 10,000 meters (2002). He was named the 2003 NCAA Division I National Scholar Athlete of the Year by the U.S. Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association. He was a member of Team USA at the 2004 Athens Olympics and is the American record holder in the 3,000-meter steeplechase (8:08.82).



Alistair Cragg, 2009

Alistair Cragg dominated any event he competed in, ranging from the fastpaced 1,500 meters outdoors and the mile indoors to the grueling 10,000 meters. A 13-time All-American and seven-time NCAA Champion, Cragg is one of Arkansas'

most dominant and decorated distance runners. He won nine SEC individual titles during his time at Arkansas; four indoors and five outdoors. He was named the SEC Athlete of the Year for his performances during the 2003 and 2004 indoor seasons and for the 2004 outdoor season. Cragg remains as the SEC meet record holder in the indoor 5,000 meters (13:42.95) and the outdoor 5,000 meters (13:41.04).On the NCAA level, Cragg owns seven NCAA individual titles; five indoors, including three straight in the 5K (2002-04), and two outdoors (5,000 meters, 2003; 10,000 meters, 2004).




Godfrey Siamusiye, 2011

During his time in Fayetteville, Godfrey Siamusiye was a four-time NCAA champion, eight-time All-American and was part of four NCAA title teams for the Razorbacks. Siamusiye excelled on the national stage for the Razorbacks during his time in Cardinal and White. He became the second NCAA

cross country champion in program history, joining former Arkansas great Joe Falcon, when he captured the national individual title in 1995. Siamusiye backed that up with a repeat performance at the NCAA cross country meet in 1996. He is Arkansas' only two-time cross country national champion. The long-distance standout added two more NCAA titles to his resume with back-to-back victories at 10,000 meters at the 1995 and 1996 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Siamusiye was also a two-time NCAA Regional champion in cross country.



Holds the Candian national records in the 1,000 meters, the mile and the 1,500 meters - Ran on the 1985 indoor distance medley relay team that finished second at the NCAA Championshiops - Also earned All-America honors in the indoor 1,000

meters (1986) and outdoor (1,500 meters).



Sean Kaley - Canada 2000 Sydney 10,000 meters

Competed in the 10,000 meters and ran 28:36.07 in the semifinals - Was a nine time All-American during his Razorback career - Grabbed three consecutive SEC titles in the 5,000 meters in 1997, '98 and '99 - Finished second at the NCAA Indoor

Championships in the 5,000 meters in 1997 and 1998 - Finished third in the indoor 3,000 meters and 5,000 meters in 1999.

BEYOND CAMPUS

OLD MAIN

One of the original buildings on Arkansas' campus, Old Main symbolizes the strong connection to the past and the focus upon the future which come together in the present at the University of Arkansas. Completed in 1875, Old Main stood the test of time until the mid-1980s when age and modern building codes threatened to send it to the wrecking ball as had happened to its sister building at the University of Illinois. A major fundraising campaign by alumni totally renovated Old Main. Reopening in 1992, the building maintains the feel of a Victorian-era building with high ceilings and elaborate wooden trim. Just below the surface of the period hardwood floors, Old Main is hard-wired to the internet and built to last well into its second century.

Even with renovation, Old Main remained unfinished until 2005. One of the gifts during the Campaign for the Twenty-First Century specified the installation of a clock, originally planned for the blank faces of the south tower.

As mentioned, Old Main was built from shared plans with its counterpart on the Illinois campus, with one important difference. The north tower of Arkansas' Old Main is taller than the south tower. Legend says this was symbolic of the Civil War as the lead engineer was a northern veteran.



RANDAL TYSON TRACK CENTER



In a re-dedication ceremony held Feb. 12, 2011, during the 2011 Tyson Invitational in Fayetteville, the Randal Tyson Track Center was recognized as "The Home of the Fastest Indoor Track in the World." The Razorbacks' home indoor track was resurfaced prior to the start of the 2011 track and field season.

In 2000, the Randal Tyson Track Center first opened on the University of Arkansas campus with the specially designed track, originally built by Mondo for the World Championships in Toronto, Canada. Since opening, the Razorbacks' home facility has played host to several world-class indoor meets, including six SEC Championships—most recently, the 2011 indoor conference meet—and 10 NCAA Championships.

Widely considered as the fastest indoor surface ever constructed, the Tyson track has been home to numerous world records, American records and an impressive 65 percent of all current NCAA Championship meet records. Arkansas will increase its number of national hosting duties to 11 with the 2013 NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships which will be held March 8-9, 2013, in Fayetteville.

In its first year of operation, the \$8 million facility hosted the Tyson Invitational, a meet on the Golden Spike Tour, the 2000 Southeastern Conference Championships and the 2000 NCAA Indoor Championships. In 2001 and 2002, the Randal Tyson Track Center once again served as the host for the Golden Spike Tour's Tyson Invitational and the NCAA Indoor Championships.

During the 2003 season, three events were held at the state-of-the-art facility: the SEC West Challenge, the Tyson Invitational and the NCAA Championships. The 2004 campaign saw four exciting events take place at the Randal Tyson Track Center, including the Arkansas, Razorback and Tyson Invitational meets and the national championships

The schedule was full in 2005 as the Arkansas, Razorback and Tyson Invitationals and the SEC and NCAA Championships were all held at the Tyson Track Center.

A new 36x20 custom video scoreboard system by Daktronics was installed in time for the 2005 NCAA Championships. It features a 23x13 video display screen with instant replay, electronic timing and scoring capabilities.

The track itself is a 200-meter, 60-degree banked track that has 55-meter straightways running the entire length of the facility. It also includes men's and women's jumping runways and pits. The surface of the track is red and gray Mondo and was repainted in 2003.

With all of the big name events that are held in the facility, the Tyson Track Center was built to handle the demands for the many media outlets. The press box is two-tiered offering 50 seats and has an announcer's booth. There are four elevated camera positions located around the track. A media room is also available in the north concourse.

FOWLER FAMILY TRAINING CENTER



The facility provides approximately 52,000 square feet of climate-controlled practice space, including a full size practice infield, throwing area, batting areas and ancillary team spaces. For track and field it provides an expansive check in and warm up area for track meets and will allow all indoor meet throwing events to be held on site.

The Fowler Family Baseball and Track Training Center provides an expansive check in and warm up area for track meets and will allow all indoor meet throwing events to be held on site.

The weight throw and discus practice/competition area is separate from the baseball training area allowing for dual training in the facility. For track competition, this facility will allow for all throwing events to be held at the Fowler Family Baseball and Track Training Center instead of the Walker Pavilion.

The facility also includes four (4) 60 meter sprint lanes for track meet warm-up prior to events.

With addition of this venue adjacent to Tyson Indoor Track Facility, track events will conduct clerking/warm-up here and make existing warm-up space in Tyson Indoor being converted to a shared strength and conditioning space and satellite training room.





JOHN MCDONNELL FIELD



Serving as the outdoor home to the most successful program in NCAA history, John McDonnell Field is one of the top outdoor track and field facilities in the nation. Named for legendary head coach John McDonnell, the winner of 40 NCAA national championships during his career at Arkansas, the facility will add to its list of competition duties with the recent announcement as the host of the 2014 NCAA West Preliminary.

The state-of-the-art competition areas include a nine-lane Mondo track, a grass infield as well as a full hammer cage and multiple throw areas. The pole vault and jumping pits are reversible and contain two sets of runways to accommodate multiple events. Capacity is currently set at 7,000 with the potential to hold 10,000 with additional construction.

John McDonnell Field played host to the 2006 Southeastern Conference Championships, the 2008 NCAA Mideast Regional Championships, the 2009 NCAA Outdoor Championships, in addition to the annual John McDonnell Invitational. The 2006 SEC and 2009 NCAA meets were the first in what promises to be a long line of prominent events slated for the facility.

JERRY & GENE JONES STUDENT-ATHLETE SUCCESS CENTER



The new Jerry & Gene Jones Family Student-Athlete Success Center is designed to address the academic, nutritional, personal and professional development of more than 460 student-athletes, creating an integrated academic support program focused on graduation of all student-athletes at the University of Arkansas. The Student-Athlete Success Center will become the new home of the Bogle Academic Center and will help meet the needs of student-athletes by providing multiple learning environments including academic advising and course preparation, leadership training through the Razorback Leadership Academy career planning and service learning. The facility is being constructed at the corner of Meadow and Stadium between Pomfret Hall and John McDonnell Field.

Overview

To support the health of student-athletes and meet the specialized needs of sports nutrition, a dining hall and a full-service kitchen will be integral components of the building. The facility will also include offices for the sports psychologist, nutritionist, and student-athlete development staff.

Details

The Jerry and Gene Jones Family Student-Athlete Success center will help address the academic, nutritional, personal and professional development of more than 460 student-athletes in a 55,000 square foot facility, creating an integrated academic support program focused on graduation of all student-athletes at the University of Arkansas.

The facility will accommodate multiple learning environments including academic advising and course preparation, leadership training through the Razorback Leadership Academy, career planning and service learning. The center will also house student-athlete educational programs designed to foster healthy life choices and maximize performance through nutrition.

Academics

The facility will include tutorial rooms, group study rooms, quiet study areas, computer labs and learning labs focused on mathematics, writing, and language skills as well as a 138-seat auditorium, which could be made available to campus for special events.







CHANCELLOR DR. JOSEPH E. STEINMETZ

Joseph E. Steinmetz became the sixth chancellor of the University of Arkansas on January 1, 2016. Prior to this appointment, he was Ohio State's chief academic officer. As executive vice president and provost, he oversaw the administration, coordination, and development of all academic functions of the university.

Dr. Steinmetz joined Ohio State in 2009 to serve as vice provost for arts and sciences and executive dean of the then-new College of Arts and Sciences. With his leadership, the former five independent colleges of arts and sciences were unified into the largest arts and sciences college in the country.

Before Ohio State, Dr. Steinmetz was dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences at the University of Kansas, where he was also a university distinguished professor. Before Kansas, Dr. Steinmetz spent 19 years at Indiana University, Bloomington where he served as Chair of the Department of Psychology, Executive Associate Dean of Arts and Sciences and a Distinguished Professor of Psychological and Brain Science.

A nationally respected behavioral neuroscientist, Dr. Steinmetz was recognized in 1996 by the National Academy of Sciences for his contributions to the fields of experimental psychology and neuroscience. In 2012 he was named an AAAS Fellow.

His research interests include neuroanatomical and neurophysiological substrates of learning and memory; the effects of alcohol on neural and behavioral function; neurobiological and behavioral models of fetal alcohol syndrome; and the neurobiology of simple human learning, memory, and cognitive function.

Dr. Steinmetz earned his bachelor's and master's degrees at Central Michigan University and his doctorate at Ohio University. He and his wife, Sandy, have two sons and four grandchildren.





VICE CHANCELLOR AND DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS JEFF LONG

In his seventh full year as Vice Chancellor and Director of Athletics, Jeff Long has helped transform the University of Arkansas' Department of Intercollegiate Athletics into one of the most successful and nationally respected programs in the country. Along the way, Long has gained national attention and earned numerous awards for his progressive leadership of a program encompassing 19 sports and more than 460 student-athletes.

Long's appointment as the first ever chairman of the College Football Playoff Selection committee provided further evidence that he is already one of the most respected and influential leaders within intercollegiate athletics.

Long chairs a committee of 13 individuals that collectively features more than 230 years of college football experience two former top-level university administrators, five current athletics directors, three members of the College Football Hall of Fame, three former college football head coaches, a former United States Secretary of State, a former member of Congress, and a retired three-star general. As the playoff's selection committee's first chairman, Long will not only lead the distinguished group in selecting the best four college football teams for the inaugural playoff in 2014, but will help the committee define the parameters for selections for years to come.

Even before his appointment as the College Football Playoff Selection Committee's Chairman, Long's leadership and unwavering commitment to the student-athletes and maintaining integrity within intercollegiate athletics has not gone unnoticed. In 2013, Long was named as an Under Armour Athletics Director of the Year for the Football Bowl Subdivision. In 2012, Long was named a finalist for the SportsBusiness Journal and SportsBusiness Daily Athletic Director of the Year. In the spring of 2012, the Donald W. Reynolds Foundation and longtime chairman Fred W. Smith made a combined gift of more than \$1.25 million to the program in recognition of Long's leadership of Razorback Athletics.

Long leads a comprehensive athletics program committed to the development of student-athletes academically, athletically and socially. A member of Chancellor G. David Gearhart's Executive Committee, Long is helping to chart the course for the future of higher education at the University of Arkansas while integrating Razorback Athletics into the campus community.

In each of the past five years, Razorback Athletics has transferred funds totaling more than \$1 million to support the university's academic mission. For 2014-15, the department's total support of university and student programs and initiatives will include \$2.25 million in direct funding of academic programs including financial support for a new classroom and laboratory building to serve the entire University of Arkansas student population.

In Long's tenure, Arkansas has captured 19 conference championships and advanced to 94 post-season competitions, including the school's first Bowl Championship Series appearance in football and a national title at the 2013 NCAA Men's Indoor Track and Field Championships. In the Learfield Sports Directors Cup, a year-long competition ranking the nation's most successful intercollegiate athletic programs, Arkansas has finished in the top 30 programs nationally six times in the past seven years.

In the classroom, the Razorbacks continue to set new standards including posting a school record student-athlete grade point average of 3.18 in 2013-14. It marked the sixth consecutive year Razorback student-athletes posted a GPA exceeding 3.0. In 2014, for the second consecutive year, Arkansas exceeded the national APR multi-year rate in all 19 sports and had three teams earn NCAA Public Recognition awards. Graduation success rates continue to rise with a total of 112 current or former Razorback student-athletes graduating in 2013-14.

Student-athlete development has also been a priority including the establishment of the Razorback Leadership Academy, the first of its kind in the Southeastern Conference. In the community, Razorback student-athletes are more active than ever volunteering more than 6,500 hours of time for more various agencies, organizations and schools around the state.



One of the nation's most active athletic directors on Twitter, Long embraces the opportunity to interact with members of the Razorback Nation whether in person or through social media. He currently has more followers than any other athletics director.

Long was selected to replace legendary athletic director and former Razorback football coach Frank Broyles and even before he officially took the reins on Jan. 1, 2008, Arkansas announced that it would combine its previously independent men's and women's athletic programs into one combined athletic program. Long adeptly blended the men's and women's athletic departments into one unified department and established a new administrative structure.

Under Long's leadership, the program has fortified its financial standing ensuring more support for the development of student-athletes. According to USA Today, Arkansas is one of only 23 financially self-sustaining Division I-A athletic programs in the nation. As economic indicators were beginning to point toward challenging economic times, Long signed Arkansas to a deal with IMG College to form Razorback Sports Properties that guarantees the Razorback program \$73 million during the course of the decade-long agreement.

Long also negotiated an extensive all sports apparel and footwear agreement with NIKE, Inc. that will outfit all 19 Razorback sports programs through the 2014-15 season. In December 2012, Forbes Magazine estimated the value of the Razorback Football program at \$83 million, ranking the University of Arkansas in the top 10 nationally for the second consecutive year.

In 2010, Long moved to help meet the growing financial needs of fielding a nationally competitive all sports program. The athletic department launched the "Answer the Call" campaign through the Razorback Foundation which resulted in more than 2,600 new members and helped generate more than \$6.5 million in additional support for Razorback student-athletes. In 2012, Long guided the program to a record breaking fundraising year further bolstering Arkansas' financial strength.

With an eye towards the future, Long commissioned a comprehensive plan to assess the future facility needs of the program. Unveiled in October 2011, the Razorback Athletic Facilities Master Plan provided a vision and the road map for \$320 million of facility renovations and additions that will help all 19 Razorback sports remain competitive in the Southeastern Conference and nationally over the next 30 years. The first major project from the master plan, the \$40 million Fred W. Smith Football Center, opened in the summer of 2013. In the summer of 2014, the baseball and track indoor training center was completed. In addition, a Basketball Performance Center and Student-athlete Success Center are currently under construction.

According to a recent economic impact study, Razorback Athletics will have an estimated economic impact of more than \$1 billion in the next five years. The study estimated that Razorback Athletics generates \$153.6 million annually to the region's economy including the benefits of drawing more than a million fans annually to campus to cheer on the Razorbacks. Planned athletic construction during the course of the next five years will generate another \$239.7 million.

A veteran administrator with a track record of the highest commitment to the concept of "student-athlete," Long has had more than two decades experience in athletic administration at the Division I level including at the University of Pittsburgh, University of Oklahoma, University of Michigan, Virginia Tech University, Eastern Kentucky University and Rice University. Long also understands the coach's perspective from time spent in coaching staff positions at Duke University, University of Michigan and North Carolina State University.

His experience as an athletic director and administrator in five of the six Bowl Championship Series conferences – the Big 12, Big Ten, Big East, Atlantic Coast and SEC – gives Long a uniquely informed perspective on intercollegiate athletics.

On the forefront of NCAA governance, Long has served on the NCAA



Management Council, the NCAA's Sports Wagering Task Force and as a member of the Executive Committee of the Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association. Long served on the NCAA Championships/Sports Management Cabinet.

Prior to assuming his current roles at Arkansas, Long served for four years as the athletic director at the University of Pittsburgh. Long redefined Pitt athletics, most notably through the "Quest for Excellence" campaign that raised nearly \$34 million to enhance the student-athlete experience. During his tenure the Panthers' were selected as the No. 17 overall program in the nation in the December 2006 Sports Illustrated on Campus' All-Sport Rankings.

Before arriving at Pitt, Long was senior associate athletic director at Oklahoma for two and a half years overseeing external affairs for the Sooners. In addition, Long was the primary administrator for the Sooners' highly successful football and men's basketball programs, along with sport supervision of baseball, wrestling and both golf teams.

Long's first appointment as a director of athletics was at Eastern Kentucky where he served for two and a half years. Prior to Eastern, Long had a brief stay with Virginia Tech as an associate athletics director.

He began his career in college athletic administration at Michigan, hired by legendary coach and athletics director, the late Bo Schembechler. During his seasons with the Wolverines, Long was promoted through a series of posts to the position of associate athletics director.

A former two-sport athlete at Ohio Wesleyan, Long earned seven varsity letters for the Bishops in football and baseball before completing his degree in economics in 1982. He started his post-graduate career in athletics working on head coach Tom Reed's staff as a graduate assistant football coach at the cradle of coaches, Miami University of Ohio. Long earned his master's in education at Miami in 1983, moving on to football staff positions at Rice, Duke and N.C. State prior to joining Michigan.

Julie Cromer Peoples serves as associate vice chancellor for athletics, senior associate athletics director for administration and sports programs and senior woman administrator (SWA) for Razorback Athletics since joining the University of Arkansas on 2014.

As a member of the department's executive leadership team, Cromer Peoples provides strategic direction and oversight of department initiatives and units focused on sport administration, athletic performance, competitive success, student-athlete well-being and development and Title IX compliance. She serves as sport administrator for the football, women's basketball, volleyball and men's and women's track and field programs. In addition, she guides strategic planning for the executive staff while assisting with fundraising efforts and serving as a liaison to the Southeastern Conference, the Chancellor's Administrative Policy Council and various faculty groups.

Actively engaged in intercollegiate athletics nationally, Cromer Peoples has served on committees and working groups within the NCAA, various athletic conferences and several professional development associations. Cromer Peoples currently is a member of the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics and was recently elected to the Board of the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletics Administrators (NACWAA). She has delivered speeches, instructed seminars and served on expert panels at numerous national conferences and forums and was selected for the 1A AD Fellows Program. In June 2012 she received the National Association for Athletics Compliance (NAAC) Frank Kara Leadership Award for her contributions to the field of athletics governance and compliance, and she was named 2015 Nell Jackson Administrator of the Year by NACWAA. Locally, the Northwest Arkansas Business Journal honored her as one of its top 10 "Women in Business" in 2016.

Cromer Peoples joined the University of Arkansas after spending four years at Indiana University and previously working at the NCAA. As the executive associate athletics director and SWA at Indiana, Cromer Peoples was a member of the department's senior management team providing leadership, consultation and guidance to an intercollegiate athletics division with 24 varsity sports. In addition, she coordinated the department's sports administration efforts and she was one of the first women in the Big Ten to supervise all football operations, including staffing, scheduling and facility planning. While at Indiana, programs under her supervision won one NCAA team championship, five NCAA individual championships and two Big Ten team championships.

Early in her tenure, Cromer Peoples bolstered athletic compliance operations and guided the university's efforts to fulfill NCAA probation requirements. Cromer Peoples also directed the Indiana University Athletics Excellence Academy, an innovative and comprehensive student-athlete program designed to identify, assess and ensure progress toward each individual student-athlete's specific personal development and sports performance goals.

Cromer Peoples arrived at Indiana University after a distinguished tenure with the NCAA national office. As director of academic and membership affairs, Cromer Peoples coordinated the policy and NCAA legislative activities of various governance groups and created partnerships with faculty, coaches and administrative constituent organizations to advance NCAA academic reform, along with other national governance and policy initiatives. For this work, Cromer Peoples was honored in 2010 by the 1A Faculty Athletics Representatives and in 2007 she received the David Knight Award from the NCAA Faculty Athletics Representatives Association.

Prior to joining the NCAA, Cromer Peoples was the assistant athletics director and SWA at Wright State University and she started her career at the Midwestern Collegiate Conference, working in compliance and championships.

Cromer Peoples received an MPA in policy analysis from the Indiana University School of Public and Environmental Affairs and she is an Honors College graduate of Missouri State University

Legendary University of Arkansas cross country and track and field head coach John McDonnell announced his retirment on April 21, 2008 following 36 years, 40 NCAA championships and 84 conference titles.

McDonnell's 40 national titles are more than any coach in any single-gender program in the history of collegiate athletics. He won five national triple crowns, 21 conference triple crowns, 34 consecutive cross country conference championships, including 17 straight in the Southeastern Conference, and has been named national, regional or conference coach of the year a total of 140 times.

From County Mayo, Ireland, McDonnell became head cross country coach of the Razorbacks in 1972, and head track and field coach in 1977–78. Since 1984, he won 19 national championships in indoor track, 10 in outdoor track and 11 in cross country. Since 1984, a total of 69 national titles have been awarded in those three sports, and McDonnell's teams won all but 29 of them.

His five national triple crowns came in 1984–85, 1991–92, 1992–93, 1994–95 and 1998–99; his 84 league titles include 46 in the SEC and 38 in the Southwest Conference, and a streak of 25 straight in all three sports from 1987–95; his 40 national championships include a string of 12 straight indoor titles from 1984–95, the longest streak of NCAA titles by any Division I school in any sport in collegiate history; and his teams have won at least one national championship in 21 of the last 26 years.

McDonnell, who earned his bachelor's degree from Louisiana-Lafayette in 1969, and coached at New Providence (N.J.) High School (1969–70) and Lafayette (La.) High School (1971) before coming to Arkansas, has won 16 more national titles than his next closest competitor (Pat Henry, LSU and Texas A&M), and only one other school. Texas-El Paso with three, has won a triple crown.

In addition to the championships, his list of honors includes membership in the halls of fame for National Track and Field, United States Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA), USA Track and Field, Arkansas Sports and Louisiana—Lafayette as well as the University of Arkansas Hall of Honor. Arkansas' 7,000—seat outdoor facility, John McDonnell Field, is named in his honor.

A 30-time national coach of the year, 50-time conference coach of the year and 62-time region coach of the year, he coached all but three of Arkansas' 187 All-Americans. Those student-athletes combined to earn 656 All-America honors.

He also coached 25 Olympians, including a gold, silver and bronze medalist, 103 NCAA individual event champions and 326 individual event conference champions.

McDonnell won 46 of a possible 51 SEC championships (90 percent), including the 2008 indoor and outdoor conference titles.

McDonnell, who coached former Razorback Daniel Lincoln to the American record in the 3,000-meter steeplechase in July 2006, has been national coach of the year 12 times in indoor track, 11 times in outdoor track and seven times in cross country for a total of 30 awards. He was also been named the NCAA Mideast Regional Coach of the Year three of the five years it has been presented (2003-05).

His tenure at Arkansas began in 1972 coaching cross country and assisting Ed Renfrow with the track program. When Renfrow left coaching, former Athletic Director Frank Broyles promoted McDonnell in time for the 1977–78 academic year.


