ike A. Myers was in business even before he earned his business degree from the University of Texas in 1959.

As a full-time student, Myers started three enterprises, including a catering service that sold sandwiches and other items at UT dorms and sorority and fraternity houses. Myers also managed to become the No. 1 Bible salesman in the country.

"I probably put 3,000 miles a year on my car," said Myers, who grew up near Wichita Falls, Texas. "I was a busy guy during school."

Myers moved on to School of Law where he received his LLB in 1963, but his school-day endeavors merely foreshadowed his future success. He is chairman of the board and owner of Myers Financial Corporation, Myers Bancshares, Inc., and Myers Development Corporation.

Myers received the university's Distinguished Alumnus Award in 1996, and that was a fitting honor for a man who's been giving back to UT from almost the very moment he left. As a further token of gratitude for Myers and his history of generosity, a statue of his likeness was unveiled at the 2013 Clyde Littlefield Texas Relays in the northeast corner of the facility that also bears his name.

"He's one of our great friends, and we're very thankful for that," former UT Men's Athletics Director DeLoss Dodds said before the unveiling.

After Myers left law school, he became an administrative assistant for then-Governor John Connally, who managed to double the appropriation for higher education during his term. Working under a governor who valued education, and being the son of a teacher, Myers became a major supporter of eight different UT schools and colleges, as well as UT Athletics.

Myers is co-founder of the Foundation for Texas Excellence Scholars, and has served as president of the Texas Longhorn Education Foundation and chairman of the UT's Chancellor's Council. As trustee of the UT Law School Foundation, Myers helped create the Kay Bailey Hutchison Chair in Latin American Law.

"When you grow up in a small town, going to The University of Texas is like a dream come true,"



Myers said. "I want to help people understand that dream the way I was able to."

Myers grew up an athlete, and was a proud competitor in the Texas Relays. When Dodds arrived in 1981, he and Myers became fast friends. Myers invited Dodds and his wife, Mary Ann, up to his Colorado summer vacation home not long after Dodds was hired.

"At first, I just wanted to get to know him," Myers recalled. "Then after I got to know DeLoss and understand his integrity, I knew I would always be a big supporter of his."

And, thereby, a supporter of UT Athletics.

Myers' history of generosity was honored officially in 1999 with the opening of the Mike A. Myers Stadium and Soccer Field.

Myers has also turned one of his passions — the game of golf — into another business endeavor. He has developed six country clubs in Texas, but his favorite is the University of Texas Golf Club at Steiner Ranch.

After learning that UT was one of the few schools in the Big 12 without a home golf course, Myers spent several years surveying the area for the right location, and he found one in the hill country that overlooks Lake Austin.

Aside from the hilltop views, the course also gives the UT Men's and Women's Golf teams a permanent home — a fact that pleases Myers as much as any other.

"Everything he touches ends up doing well," Dodds said of Myers.



CLYDE LITTLEFIELD

FATHER OF THE TEXAS RELAYS

ike most Texans born before 1900, Clyde Littlefield started out life somewhere else. He was born on Oct. 6, 1892, in Oil City, Pennsylvania. After his mother died during his boyhood, Clyde moved with his father to Texas. A few years later, when the elder Littlefield decided to pursue his petroleum career in Mexico, young Clyde, after ninth grade in Beaumont, was trundled off to school in San Antonio.

There, he attended Peacock Military Academy for two years, and followed that with a year at the Marshall Training School. In the fall of 1912, he came to Austin, intent on university studies and perhaps a career in geology. A career was waiting for him at The University, but it was in sports rather than geology. Littlefield earned 12 varsity letters at Texas — four each in basketball, football and track. In football, his strong throwing arm coincided with an NCAA rule change that allowed forward passes longer than the previous 20-yard limit. Thanks in large part to his passing, Littlefield contributed to a perfect 8-0 season as a junior in 1914, and in his final year, he and his teammates were the first UT 11 to play in the newly formed Southwest Conference.

After graduation and military duty, he coached high school football successfully in Greenville, where his 1919 team outscored rivals 283-0. That prompted an invitation to return to UT as freshman basketball and football coach and head cross country and track coach. Littlefield accepted, passing up better-salaried offers from TCU and Texas A&M, and re-arrived in Austin in fall 1920.

An eventual promotion made him head football coach for seven seasons, 1927-33, producing a 44-18-6 record and four wins in five outings versus Oklahoma. Thereafter, he resigned that position to focus fully on the sport he loved: track and field.

Littlefield's track team placed fifth in the conference his first spring in 1921, but improved to second in 1922 and then won five straight titles starting in 1923. A key adventure of the era was a trip to the Kansas Relays, which planted an impressionable seed in the coach's brain. The 1924 SWC meet closed out the track life of Clark Field, and when Memorial Stadium was dedicated at Thanksgiving, Littlefield seized the opportunity of the new venue to father the Texas Relays. The story goes that he gave sportswriters a firm calendar date first, and sought approval from superiors only second, worried that Rice would beat him to the starting line with its own event.

The first Relays on March 27, 1925 included Jackson Scholz, the Olympic gold medalist at 200 meters, and Harold Osborn, whose 1924 Paris golds derived from the high jump and decathlon. Also on hand was two-time Olympian Joie Ray, winner of eight U.S. mile titles, who had given Paavo Nurmi, the "Flying Finn," a close chase in January at Madison Square Garden, losing by three yards.

In that first Texas Relays mile, Ray, nursing a strained tendon, was overtaken by Texas' Jim Reese on the last lap. He surrendered and ended up limping to the finish. In June, Reese won the NCAA mile, the first national collegiate championship for a Littlefield trackster.

Littlefield was an expert in analyzing form and technique, and excellent one-on-one with athletes. He also was superb one-on-four (meaning the relays). Texas put extraordinary practice hours into stick passing and demonstrated the not always understood fact that when it comes to sprint relays, better efficiency can conquer better speed.

An example occurred at the 1936 Penn Relays, where anchor Chink Wallender found himself in the final exchange zone with Eulace Peacock of Philadelphia's Temple Owls, who had beaten Jesse Owens four times in a row. The Longhorns were smooth in their baton passes, whereas the preceding Owls were a bit sloppy on the backstretch. Peacock got the stick five yards back, strained to close the gap down the straightaway and popped his hamstring. Meanwhile, Texas earned a famous victory.

The 1930s threatened Littlefield's proudest creation, the Texas Relays. Depression woes cancelled the meet from 1932 to 1934. He and friends recovered from the bobble, resolutely picking up and carrying forward the tradition on another more promising (1935) race day. Later, when World War II depleted the ranks of available competitors, they improvised and called increasingly on high school talent, giving the meet more of its present flavor.

Littlefield perhaps reached his zenith in the late 1940s and 1950s, when he produced three Olympians — Jerry Thompson, Dean Smith and Eddie Southern — and served as a member of the 1952 U.S. Olympic coaching staff in Helsinki, Finland. There, he was privileged to watch Smith, running leg one and handing off to Harrison Dillard, earn U.S. gold in the 400-meter relay. At retirement in 1963, Littlefield had claimed 25 Southwest Conference track titles, coupled with 14 runner-up finishes, five world records and a goodsized list of NCAA champions.

Clyde Littlefield is one of two honorees from the UT athletics program to be named to the National Track & Field Hall of Fame, with Stan Huntsman being the other. Word of that selection came sufficiently early, but actual induction came posthumously a few months after Littlefield's death on May 20, 1981. **RELAYS ADMINISTRATION**
