SEC TEAM TITLES

Having claimed 21 SEC cross country titles over the past 30 conference meets, the Razorbacks have the most conference championships by a wide margin. Florida follows with six.

Arkansas has won the past eight SEC Championships in cross country, its longest stretch after winning five straight twice (91-95 & 98-02).



SEC INDIVIDUAL TITLES

In 2019 Katie Izzo became the 11th Razorback to claim an SEC title, improving Arkansas' total to 16 overall.

Lauren Gregory, a 2018 SEC bronze medalist, has led the Razorbacks in three meets, winning at Missouri and finishing second in Oregon and Florida State Pre-National. She has placed in the top 10 at SEC four consecutive years.

ARKANSAS ATTEMPTS TO WIN 9TH CONSECUTIVE SEC XC TITLE

No. 15 Arkansas seeks a ninth consecutive SEC Cross Country Championship title and it's 22nd overall this week in another title defense for the Razorbacks. The SEC Championships, hosted by Missouri and held on the Gans Creek course, will air live on the SEC Network at 10 a.m. this Friday, Oct. 29, with the women's 6,000m race starting at 10:50 a.m.

One of three SEC schools nationally ranked, Arkansas follows No. 5 Alabama and No. 11 Mississippi heading into the conference championship. The last conference titles for Alabama, who finished second in 2020, occurred in 1986 and 1987, while Mississippi, runner-up in 2016 and 2019, has never claimed a women's SEC cross

The Razorbacks have claimed 20 of the past 21 SEC championships held among cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field, and have totaled 40 SEC titles among the three disciplines since joining the league 30 years ago.

"We are going in as defending champions with eight consecutive

titles," said Arkansas women's head coach Lance Harter. "The competition continues to get steeper and steeper every year, and this year is an extraordinary year.

"Alabama, Ole Miss and ourselves are three nationally ranked teams. We each had great seasons last year and return the majority of their team. So, we will definitely have our hands full to try to defend."

Lauren Gregory, a three-time SEC Runner of the Week, has led the Razorbacks in three races this season. Gregory won the Missouri Opener on the Gans Creek course, leading Arkansas to a perfect score among four SEC schools. Then Gregory finished second at Oregon's Bill Dellinger Invitational and Florida State's Pre-National Invitational after leading each race in the latter stages.

A bronze medalist in the 2018 SEC Championship, Gregory has finished among the top 10 at the conference meet in four consecutive years. Fourth a year ago in leading Arkansas, Gregory is one of six Razorbacks who returned from last year's top seven in the SEC meet.

Krissy Gear, the fifth Razorback finisher in the 2020 SEC meet while placing 11th, won the Chile Pepper Invitational a week after not finishing the Oregon meet and placed eighth in the Pre-National race as the second Arkansas finisher.

Isabel Van Camp has shown marked improvement this season and as a result was third among the Razorbacks in placing 24th at Pre-National after being the second finisher in Oregon while placing 12th overall.

Razorbacks returning from last year's top seven in the conference meet include Logan Jolly, Meghan Underwood and Corie Smith.

"This meet will be the first time this season where we will put our team together, because of one issue or another," noted Harter. "I'm excited to put our top 7 to 12 together and let them represent us at the conference meet.

"We're going to have some people who have been in the program make big steps in a positive direction to carry the flag for Arkansas."

With three nationally ranked teams among the field, the deciding factor in determining the team title may come down to the fourth and fifth runners from each program.

"This year, it's interesting with the matchups from 1 to 4 are almost verbatim even," said Harter. "Then it comes down to, especially for us, our fifth runner and Alabama as well. Ole Miss has a little tighter group, but maybe not the firepower up front in the lead.

"For us, our fifth runner is going to be critical, as well as everybody else. That seems to be the theme at the conference meet, the regional meet, and the national meet. When people think of the idea of a team effort, the front three or four get a lot of the celebration, but

the true team development and definition of who is going to be successful always goes to that fourth or fifth runner for us.

Women's teams can enter 12 runners in the conference meet, which enables schools to build depth and aids in the development of a program.

"We're kind of blessed with a lot of depth," noted Harter. "Our number five through 10 could be anyone of five or six people. Hopefully, somebody has a great day and are able to make our team total as low as possible."

Finishing as the fifth runner for Arkansas this season has included Underwood, Carmie Prinsloo, Julia Paternain, and Gracie Hyde. Each has also finished higher than the fifth position in various races this season.

HOG FACTS

- Among its 21 SEC titles in cross country over the past 30 editions of the conference meet, the Razorbacks currently have won eight consecutive titles, the longest established by a women's team in SEC history. Previously, Arkansas put together a streak of five titles, twice, in 1991-1995 and 1998-2002.
- SEC success for the Razorbacks has included a total of 41 conference titles among the three seasons (21 cross country, 11 indoor, 9 outdoor). Arkansas completed its seventh SEC triple crown in 2020-21.
- In 2019, the Razorbacks totaled 21 points in claiming the SEC title, placing five runners among the top 10 for the second consecutive year. It was Arkansas' lowest score in the SEC since 2006 when they totaled 17. The 1999 Razorbacks produced a perfect score of 15 points, sweeping places first through fifth.
- Winning the 2019 NCAA Cross Country Championship, Arkansas completed a sweep of three NCAA titles after claiming the 2019 NCAA Indoor and NCAA Outdoor Championships. The Razorbacks joined Texas (1986) as the only programs to win three NCAA titles in the same year, while Oregon (2016-17) accomplished a trio of NCAA titles in an academic year.
- Arkansas last swept both men's and women's team titles in 2020. It has been accomplished 18 times since the Razorbacks competed in their first SEC meet in 1991.

RAZORBACK NOTES

Lauren Gregory, 2018 SEC bronze medalist, has finished among the top 10 in the SEC Cross Country Championships four consecutive years. Gregory was the fifth scorer on the team when the Razorbacks captured the 2019 NCAA title.

Gregory has led Arkansas in three meets this season, earning SEC Runner of the Week honors each week she has raced in 2021.

Gregory won on the Gans Creek course in the Missouri Opener over 5,000m. She also finished second in Oregon's Bill Dellinger Invitational and Florida State's Pre-National Invitational, leading the field during the late stages of both races.

Razorbacks with prior experience in other conference championships includes Logan Jolly (née Morris), Krissy Gear, Julia Paternain, Kennedy Thomson, and Gracie Hyde.

Jolly: Competed in three ACC Championships ... 19th in 2016, 27th in 2018 and 24th in 2019. Gear: Competed in three Southern Conference meets ... 13th in 2017, 9th in 2018 and 4th in 2019. Paternain: Competed in the two Big 10 meets with Penn State, finishing 10th in 2018, and placing 44th in 2019. Thomson: Competed in three Southern Conference meets ... 19th in 2016, 61st

in 2017 and 18th in 2018. **Hyde**: Competed in two Southland Conference meets ... 7th in 2018, and 8th in 2019.

Razorback **Taylor Ewert** was named 2020 SEC Freshman Runner of the Year. She suffered a foot injury in Oregon's Bill Dellinger Invitational and will not compete in this week's SEC Championship.

Last season Taylor won the SEC Preview 5k and was named co-SEC Runner of the Week. She also earned SEC Freshman of the Week after placing fourth over 6k at Missouri's Gans Creek Classic.

Ewert was the top freshman in the 2020 SEC meet, placing 10th, and it was the fourth time over the past five seasons a Razorback has achieved that feat. Previous Arkansas runners who were the top freshman finisher at the SEC Championships include Katrina Robinson (2nd, 2018), Lauren Gregory (8th, 2017) and Abby Gray (9th, 2016).

A Razorback newcomer who could contend for top freshman honors this season is **Carmie Prinsloo** of South Africa, who was twice named SEC Freshman Runner of the Week during the 2021 season.
